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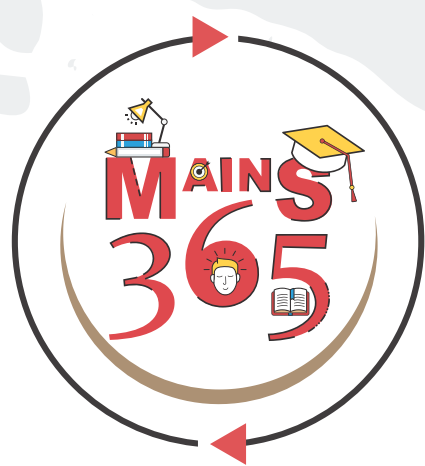


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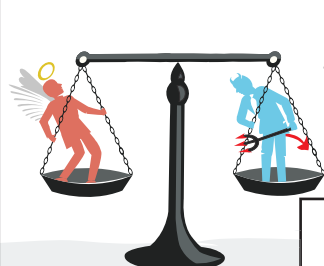
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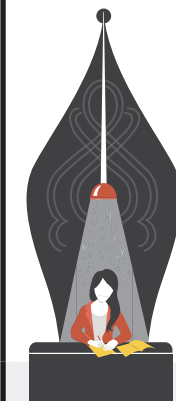

Shinde moves SC; Uddhav camp says rebels will be disqualified

Govt. counsel says they can be removed for anti-party activities outside House

The political turmoil in Maharashtra intensified on Sunday, with rebel Shiv Sena MLA and Minister Eknath Shinde moving the Supreme Court against the disqualification notice issued by the Deputy Speaker to him and 15 other legislators.

The party, led by Chief Minister Uddhav Thackeray, meanwhile, received another jolt as Maharashtra Technical and Higher Education Minister Uday Samant, a key Sena leader in the Konkan region, joined Mr. Shinde's rebel camp in Guwahati.

Mr. Shinde now has the support of nine Sena Ministers with Aaditya Thackeray being the only one in the Uddhav Thackeray camp left in the Assembly. The other two Thackeray loyalists Anil Parab and Subhash Desai are Legislative Council members.

The rebel faction challenged the appointment of Sena MLA from Mumbai Ajay Choudhari as the Legislature Party leader, and the rejection of their no-confidence motion against Deputy Speaker Narhari Zirwal.

On the other side, the loyalists of Mr. Thackeray, too, have geared up to take on the rebels with Arvind Sawant, MP, stating that the party had already initiated legal action to disqualify the

16 rebel MLAs by serving notices on them.

Advocate Devadatt Kamat, counsel for the Sena-led government, said that proceedings had been initiated by the Shiv Sena against 16 MLAs under para 2(1) (A) of the 10th Schedule of the Constitution.

He said there were several examples where even if a member committed anti-party activities outside the House, then he or she was liable to be disqualified.

"There were several meetings called by the Shiv Sena, but none were responded to by the rebel MLAs. Their action of going to another State and writing

letters against the MVA government makes them liable for prosecution for anti-party activities, and thus liable for disqualification," Mr. Kamat said.

Rejects rebels' claims

He said the claims by the rebel MLAs of retaining their posts on the grounds that they had two-thirds of the total of 55 Sena MLAs with them would only apply had they merged their group with another party. "Since they have already committed an anti-party act and still there is no merger, they face disqualification," he said.

The Centre granted se-

curity to 15 of the rebel MLAs with the Home Ministry providing Y-plus security cover by stationing Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF) jawans outside the homes of the rebel MLAs. The move comes as strident protests against the MLAs in the Shinde faction continued across the State.

Maharashtra Governor Bhagat Singh Koshyari, too, wrote to the Mumbai Commissioner of Police and the Maharashtra Director-General of Police asking them to provide additional security to the rebels.

SP loses its Azamgarh and Rampur bastions in bypolls

AAP candidate loses to Simranjit Singh Mann in Sangrur

The Bharatiya Janata Party on Sunday won the by-elections to the Azamgarh and Rampur Lok Sabha seats in Uttar Pradesh, wresting them from the Samajwadi Party, while in a setback, the ruling Aam Aadmi Party in Punjab lost the Sangrur Lok Sabha seat, which was vacated by State Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann in March, to the Shiromani Akali Dal (Amritsar).

The BJP candidate from Azamgarh, Dinesh Lal Yadav 'Nirahua', a Bhojpuri actor, defeated Dharmendra Yadav of the SP by a margin of 8,679 votes, according to the Election Commission.

Mr. Dinesh had lost to SP president and former Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Akhilesh Yadav in the 2019 Lok Sabha election. The seat fell vacant after Mr. Akhilesh won in the Uttar Pradesh Assembly election earlier this year.

In Rampur, BJP candidate Ghanshyam Singh Lodhi defeated Mohammed Asim Raja of the SP by a margin of 42,192 votes. The Rampur seat was vacated by SP leader Azam Khan, who also won in the Assembly election.

In Punjab, Simranjit Singh Mann, president of the Shiromani Akali Dal (Amritsar), won the Sangrur by-election, defeating Gurmail Singh of

the AAP by 5,822 votes.

In the Tripura Assembly byelection, Chief Minister Manik Saha won the Town Bardowali seat, while Malina Debnath and Swapna Das of the BJP won the Jubaraj nagar and Surma seats, respectively. Congress candidate Sudip Roy Barman won the Agartala seat, defeating his nearest rival Ashok Sinha of the BJP.

Soon after Mr. Barman's

victory, the Congress Bhavan in Agartala was attacked. "We demand an apology from BJP president J.P. Nadra and an investigation by Home Minister Amit Shah into why these attacks occurred," said party general secretary K.C. Venugopal in a statement.

'China upgraded firepower on LAC'

Intelligence inputs cite upgraded air defence systems and expanded runways

Vastly expanded troop accommodation within 100 km from the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in the western sector, long-range artillery and rocket systems, upgraded air defence systems, expanded runways and hardened blast pens to house fighter aircraft — these are some of the major upgrades undertaken by the Chinese People's Liberation Army (PLA) on its side in the past two years since the stand-off in the eastern Ladakh began, according to intelligence inputs.

"In the western sector across the LAC, the accommodation capacity was for 20,000 troops in 2020 before the stand-off began. That has now been expanded to 1.2 lakh billets — infrastructure and accommodation-wise," an official source said on condition of anonymity, citing intelligence inputs. "They have also set up captive solar energy and small hydel power projects all along the LAC. This enhances their winter sustenance capability manifold," the source said, adding that this is apart from the model villages they are building all along the LAC.

This is within 100 km on the Chinese side from the LAC, the source said.

Four PLA divisions under the Xinjiang military district are being rotated on the Chinese side facing eastern Ladakh. In 2020, when the stand-off began, the fourth and sixth divisions were deployed, which were rotated with eighth and 11th divisions in 2021. This year, the fourth and sixth divisions have been redeployed as part of rotation. "All these divisions are in the process of being converted into a combined arms brigade (CAB). Equipment upgrade is almost complete," the source said.

Weapons upgrade

On the weapons upgrade, sources said the fourth division, which has one armoured regiment, has inducted the ZTQ 15 (Type 15) third generation modern light tank, replacing the ZTZ-88 first generation tanks in service. The sixth division which operates the Type 96 A second generation tanks remains the same. In terms of technology upgrade, the fire control systems of the tanks have been upgraded, sources said.

Similarly, two mechanised brigades which operate wheeled armoured personnel carriers (APCs) have upgraded from the ZBL-08 to the latest ZTL-II APCs.

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Russia strikes Kyiv as G7 summit opens

Russian missiles struck the Ukrainian capital Kyiv on Sunday as G7 leaders gathered in Germany to discuss further sanctions against Moscow.

Up to four explosions rang out in central Kyiv, in the first such major attack on the city since June. Two more blasts were heard on the southern outskirts of the city later in the day, a Reuters reporter said.

"The Russians hit Kyiv again. Missiles damaged an apartment building and a kindergarten," said Andriy Yermak, head of the President's administration.

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AAP wins Rajinder Nagar bypoll

Durgesh Pathak wins by nearly 11,000 votes; dares BJP to hold municipal elections

Durgesh Pathak of AAP on Sunday won the Rajinder Nagar Assembly bypoll defeating his nearest rival - BJP's Rajesh Bhatia - by a margin of 11,468 votes. AAP managed to secure 55.78% of the votes.

AAP chief Arvind Kejriwal reacted to the victory saying that the party's victory was an appreciation of the "good work" done by his party and a "defeat of the BJP's dirty politics".

According to official data, Mr. Pathak, polled 40,319 votes, while Mr. Bhatia got 28,851 votes.

Buoyed by the victory, AAP threw a challenge to the BJP to conduct the municipal polls on any day of their choosing.

AAP's victory comes at a time when the Centre and the State government have been at loggerheads over a range of issues including the arrest of Delhi Minister Satyendar Jain by the ED and the Lieutenant-Governor's jurisdiction.

Poll after MCD merger
This is the first election in the Capital conducted since

the three financially-hit municipalities - North, East and South - were merged into one Municipal Corporation of Delhi and the municipal elections were postponed.

In his victory speech, Mr. Pathak said, "I want to tell the BJP that the people of Delhi have given up on you. They don't trust you anymore. They want to see Delhi as a Capital in which every Indian can take pride. I challenge them to conduct MCD elections. Delhi wants to get rid of the BJP completely."

Mr. Pathak said his victory was the victory of Mr. Kejriwal and the progress he has brought about in Delhi.

Reacting to his candi-

date's defeat, Delhi BJP chief Adesh Gupta said, "We accept the mandate of people. Our party workers will work even harder in future for electoral battles. While being in opposition we will keep raising people's issues. The public is supreme and we will always be eager to serve them and resolve their problems," Mr. Gupta said.

'Contest with CM'

Speaking to the press after his defeat, Mr. Bhatia said that the contest was not between two candidates but between him and Mr. Kejriwal. He said that the Chief Minister, who had not visited the constituency earlier, held multiple rallies to se-

cure the seat for his party's candidate.

Mr. Bhatia alleged that the people of the constituency felt they would lose out on the facilities provided by the government if AAP's candidate were to lose.

"I come from a humble background. I belong to a small village in Uttar Pradesh. No one from my village has even been elected a Zilla Panchayat Head, let alone being elected from an Assembly constituency," Mr. Pathak said.

He added that he came to Delhi to prepare for civil services exams. "I joined the Anna Andolan and then became a part of AAP. Today, a common man with a bank balance of mere ₹5 lakh has become an MLA," he added.

He said such a journey to politics was only possible in AAP as everyone in the party was "a common man".
Meanwhile, the Congress candidate Prem Lata managed to secure only 2,014 votes with a 2.79% vote share. "It has been a disappointing loss. We will learn from our mistakes. However, it is wrong to say that we did not put in our best," a Delhi Congress spokesperson said.

DCW asks police to file FIR for abuse of minor

The Delhi Commission for Women (DCW) on Sunday took suo motu cognisance of a viral video wherein a man can be seen hurling abuses at a minor girl and passing derogatory comments on her religion. The commission has sought an FIR in the matter.

DCW chief Swati Maliwal said the video shows a man hurling abuses at a minor

and "making hurtful comments on the religious community" of the girl.

The DCW has issued a notice to DCP (IFSO) K.P.S Malhotra, seeking urgent registration of an FIR as well as arrests in the matter. It has also asked for details on police action to take down the video off the internet and a detailed action taken report in the matter by June 29.

Till the report's publication time, no FIR had been

lodged in the matter, according to Mr. Malhotra.

"In the video, the man is clearly intimidating the little girl who can be seen as visibly frightened and shocked. The man also threatens a little boy in the same video and verbally abuses him and targets him for belonging to a particular religious community," Ms. Maliwal said, adding that the video also shows the man threatening to beat her.

Fake job racket busted

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HC issues notices on rainwater harvesting

the issue.
A Vacation Bench of Justice Jasmee Singh and Justice Dinesh Kumar Sharma also sought information on the steps undertaken to address traffic jams in Delhi during the monsoon. The Bench issued notices to the Union Ministry of Urban Development and Ministry of Road Transport, the Delhi government-Delhi Jal Board, the civic bodies, and Public Works Department, among others.
The High Court has listed the case for further hearing on July 4.

Rent Controller cannot ask landlord to carry out repairs: HC

‘Tenant needs to satisfy at least three conditions before approaching Controller’

There is no provision in the Delhi Rent Control (DRC) Act under which the Rent Controllers, officers in charge of fixing standard rents of properties, can call upon a landlord to carry out repairs of the tenanted premises, the Delhi High Court has observed.

The dispute
The High Court made this observation on June 3 while adjudicating a dispute between a tenant and an owner of a shop in Sadar Bazar.
Justice C. Hari Shankar also clarified that the Rent Controller, appointed under the DRC Act, could permit the tenant to carry out repairs if, after receipt of notice from the tenant in this regard, the landlord fails to repair the premises.
The tenant had moved a local civil court seeking di-

rections to his landlord to repair the roof of his shop which was affected by seepage.
The landlord, on the other hand, contested the plea claiming that under the DRC Act, such a plea was maintainable only before the Rent Controller.
On May 26, the civil court rejected the landlord's plea, following which he moved the High Court.
The landlord argued that Section 50 of the DRC Act prohibits civil courts from entertaining suits or proceedings which relate to fixa-

tion of rent, eviction of a tenant or any other matter for which the Rent Controller is empowered under the DRC Act.

Judicial exceptions
Justice Shankar, however, said that Section 9 of the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908 (CPC) empowers the courts to try all civil suits except those in which they are expressly or impliedly barred.
The High Court said the exercise of power by the Rent Controller is envisaged in Section 44 of the DRC Act.

The specific conditions which are required to be satisfied before a tenant invokes the jurisdiction of the Rent Controller are – the premises should not be habitable or usable except by carrying out repairs, a notice in writing is issued by the tenant to the landlord to carry out such repairs and the landlord should neglect or fail to make the repairs despite receiving such a notice.
“It is only when these three eventualities, chronologically and cumulatively are satisfied that the tenant may approach the Controller,” the High Court said.
“Even then, the power of the Controller is to permit the tenant to carry out the repairs and submit to it [the Controller] an estimate of the cost of repairs which, after hearing the landlord, the Controller may call upon the landlord to disgorge,” the High Court added.

Medical students on hunger strike

Medical students, who were rescued from war-torn Ukraine, sat on a hunger strike at Jantar Mantar here on Sunday demanding admission in the country's medical colleges as a one-time measure.
The parents of Indian medical students who were studying in Ukraine also wrote a letter to the Prime Minister stating, “There are nearly 12,000 medical students who need to be given admission... There are around 606 medical colleges in India, which means each college will have to accommodate only 20-21 students”. The students from sat on a hunger strike from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.
Thousands of students from India studying in various medical colleges across Ukraine had to abandon their courses and return home after Russian forces launched an offensive against Ukraine.

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Robot helps douse massive blaze in factory

A robot was used to douse a massive fire that broke out in a godown in Badli on Sunday, the Delhi Fire Service said.

DFS Chief Atul Garg said no one was injured in the incident, adding, “The fire broke out in a plastic granules godown.”

Mr. Garg said the DFS received information at 2.18 a.m. about the fire in Badli behind Rohini jail. “We had no idea what was inside the godown; it was sealed for the last two years. We exten-

sively used the robot to douse the blaze and spray water. It helped prevent exposure of the fire to our firefighters,” he added.

The DFS shared a video that showed the robot dousing the blaze even as thick plumes of smoke rose from the building.

As many as 36 fire tenders were pressed into service and the blaze was put out by 2.10 p.m., officials said. In May, the Delhi government had inducted two remote-controlled robots into the DFS to navigate narrow lanes leading up to the fire spot.

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Writing or drawing by hand is a natural process that every child is fascinated by. Children tend to exhibit their artistic skills on the walls of homes. In school, they are taught to write the alphabet with tools such as slates and chalk, graduating to pencils and pens. However, today, writing by hand has become obsolete.

What is initiated as an imitation of letters at the primary level continues systematically with the cloning of lines of the prescribed texts, through the academic years. Worse is the scene at the tertiary level, with students settling for easy options of either downloading texts or

buying projects from ghost writers who also cut and paste from websites. This has become common in the realm of research as well.

No curriculum
Lack of writing literacy is not new, as there has never been a curriculum for this. A dry grammar-based approach was adopted, which dealt with parts of speech, subject-verb concordance, and not so important aspects such as punctuations, capitals and so on. Learners were rarely initiated into the process of writing to generate and transmit ideas, which would characterise writers. Another critical reason that causes writing incompetency is the concurrent skill of reading. “Read a

thousand books and your words will flow like a river.” The skill of reading is also on the brink of collapse and so, the intertwining of these twin skills ought to be harnessed.

With few being enamoured by writing, technology arrived as a boon. The keyboard overpowered the skill of writing by hand, the autocorrect mode made learning of spelling, grammar and the mechanics of writing redundant. However, experts have established that handwriting is a complex skill that combines kinesthetic movement and cognitive process, leading to an enhanced learning power.

Human evolution has repeatedly reminded us that a

skill once lost is rarely retrieved. Therefore, although it may seem a regressive step, revival of writing by hand ought to be welcomed. Conventional wisdom has proved that physical writing strengthens memory and muscle power, and concentration span which augment the cognitive ability to process information. The charm of handwritten messages on special occasions still holds more power than a text message.

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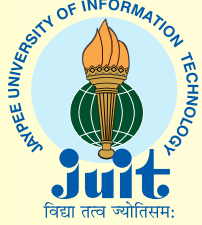


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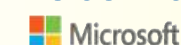
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Agnipath scheme against interests of the youth, says Satya Pal Malik

Meghalaya Governor appeals to PM to withdraw the scheme

Meghalaya Governor Satya Pal Malik on Sunday said the Agnipath scheme was "against the interests of the youth". He appealed to the Prime Minister to withdraw the scheme and requested the youth not to take the path of violence to register their protest.

Addressing the media during a private visit to Baghpata, Mr. Malik said the scheme would spoil the future of youngsters and they would not be able to find a

match [in marriage] and suitable employment after four years of service.

Referring to the Haryana Chief Minister, Mr. Malik said "those who were in their fourth year" [of elected posts] were promising jobs to the Agniveers. "What's the guarantee that he [Manohar Lal] would be back at the helm?" he asked.

Mr. Malik took umbrage with Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) Member of Parliament Kailash Vijayvarghaya's statement that he would appoint Agniveers to guard the BJP's

office.

The scheme, Mr. Malik said, once again showed the growing distance between the government and rural India.

"The government is yet to fulfil the farmers' demand to make a law on the Minimum Support Price (MSP)," he said.

Known for speaking out against the government, Mr. Malik said he was not seeking any political career after his stint as Governor but that he would continue to speak for the interests of farmers.

Amarnath yatra ready to host highest ever pilgrim footfall

Scaled-up infrastructure includes six base hospitals, drones, helicopter service

Preparations for the annual Amarnath yatra, being held after a gap of three years, have seen a massive scaling up, with officials comparing the arrangements to that of the Kumbh Mela.

Compared to 2.85 lakh pilgrims who visited in 2018, the Jammu & Kashmir administration is expecting eight lakh footfalls this year. The annual pilgrimage, conducted via the twin routes of the famous tourist destinations of Pahalgam and Sonamarg in south and central Kashmir, respectively, was cut short in 2019, ahead of the Centre's move to abrogate the erstwhile State's special constitutional position.

The highest ever number of pilgrims 6.35 lakh pilgrims visited the cave shrine in 2011. "We are expecting a high number of devotees for the annual pilgrimage this year,"

Manoj Sinha, Lieutenant-Governor of the Union Territory of J&K, who is also Chairman of the Shri Amarnath Shrine Board (SASB), said.

To meet the demand, the capacity of tents set up en route to the holy cave has been increased from 29,000 to 70,000. Six base hospitals have been established for the first time. COVID care hospitals are also being established with ICU facilities at Pahalgam, Baltal and Sonamarg.

"A 60-bed facility, including oxygen-fitted beds, has been set up by the Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) at Baltal, and a 50-bed hospital has been set up at Chandanwari. More than 300 doctors and paramedics will attend to the medical needs of the pilgrims," officials said.

The administration also utilised the services of Lieute-

nant General Syed Ata Hasnain (Retd.) and Major General Sudhir Bahl (Retd.) "to put disaster preparedness in place". A ten-day stock of essentials has been created to meet any eventuality. For the first time, female rescuers have been stationed at Sheshnag in south Kashmir's Pahalgam.

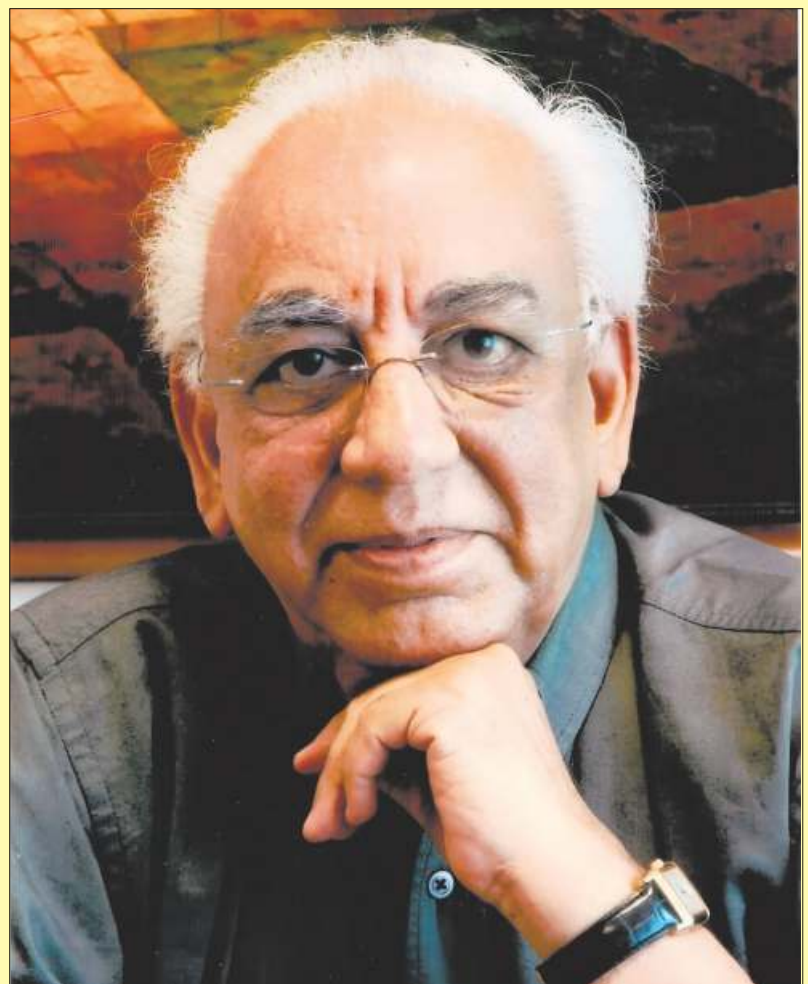
From drones to closed circuit cameras, cutting edge communication technology will monitor the movement of pilgrims in real time. All pilgrims will be tracked with Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) tags.

The administration is mulling over engaging 35,000 labourers, mostly locals, for the pilgrimage.

In another first, a helicopter service from the Srinagar airport will help pilgrims enjoy darshan in a day, without travelling by road to any destination in the Kashmir Valley.

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Keep up the pressure

India must seek the extradition of Sajid Mir for his role in the Mumbai attacks

Reports in Pakistan's newspapers, that a Pakistani court has convicted Sajid Majeed Mir, one of the men who planned the Mumbai 26/11 attacks, on terror financing charges, is welcome proof that the search for each of the masterminds must never be given up on. In the case of Mir, Pakistan's security agencies had gone so far as to falsely declare him "dead". He was reportedly sentenced to more than 15 years in jail and is serving his term in a Lahore jail. Mir, the LeT's former deputy chief of "international operations", has been wanted for his role in recruitment for the 26/11 attacks, being the handler for David Headley, who carried out the reconnaissance for the LeT during several visits to India, and for being in the Karachi "control room" during the Mumbai siege. Headley named Mir in his deposition to a U.S. court, after he was given a "plea bargain" by the U.S. government, as well as in depositions via video link for the 26/11 trial in India. Mir is also wanted for LeT conspiracies to attack a Danish newspaper accused of publishing blasphemous cartoons and bomb a nuclear installation in Australia. He was also convicted by a French court for recruiting LeT operatives, and is believed to have also recruited terror-volunteers in the "Virginia Paintball Jihad" case in the U.S. The timing of Mir's conviction appears to be linked to the final stages of Pakistan's grey listing at the FATF this June, that voted to allow on-site visits in Pakistan with a view to delisting it in the next few months. While Mir is not actually on the UN Security Council's 1267 list of terror-designated individuals that the FATF is mandated to pursue, the West has frequently brought his name up at FATF proceedings in demanding that Pakistan successfully convict leaders of terrorist groups.

If Mir is in fact behind bars, New Delhi must move quickly to demand his extradition to stand for trial in India. Admittedly, this is a virtually impossible task, given the poor state of bilateral ties. New Delhi must also rectify the error in not pursuing Mir's addition to the UNSC list thus far, and launch a concerted international effort for Mir to be prosecuted for the number of terror attacks he has been involved in – not just for terror financing. As with Hafiz Saeed, Zaki-ur-Rahman Lakhvi and other LeT members, it is necessary to keep the spotlight on Mir, given the predilection of Pakistan's legal authorities for reversing convictions and reducing the sentencing of terrorists once the heat from international agencies reduces. This will be particularly important, especially as Pakistan is expected to receive a full reprieve at the FATF in October, and it must be made clear that the Government will continue to pursue the legal process against each of the men behind the Mumbai attacks, until they are brought to justice.

Regressive, inhumane

By removing constitutional right to abortion, U.S. Supreme Court is on wrong side of liberty

When a democracy rolls back a constitutional right that has been in place for almost half a century, it must consider itself in deep peril. The U.S. stands at that fraught juncture now, after its Supreme Court, in a 6-3 majority, overturned the 1973 ruling in *Roe vs Wade*, and took away the constitutional right to abortion. In one blow, on June 24, it withdrew from women anywhere in the country their right to reproductive and bodily autonomy. With *Roe*, as well as the 1992 decision in *Planned Parenthood vs Casey* that upheld *Roe*, gone, the court returned "the issue of abortion to the people's elected representatives". States can now decide whether to ban abortion, and at what stage in a pregnancy and under what circumstances. The fight over abortion has been the U.S.'s most passionately waged ideological battle. With a focus that denies any space for compassion or respect for liberty, conservatives have prioritised the task of having *Roe* overturned for decades. With the court now having attained a conservative supermajority, the decision had been imminent – some Republican-ruled States have started banning abortion, with trigger laws in place in anticipation of such a judgment. Other Red States will follow.

This Supreme Court decision, *Dobbs vs Jackson Women's Health Organization*, has in effect divided the U.S. territorially – States where women have the right to abortion, and those where they do not. Where they do not, women with unplanned or unwanted pregnancies, including possibly in some jurisdictions those that endanger the mother's life or are a result of rape or incest, may have no option but to seek medical assistance in other States. This needs resources and support structures, and many women will be left with no option other than clandestine, unsafe abortions nearer home. Chillingly, there is fear that miscarriages could be subject to criminal investigations. On a positive side, major U.S. companies and some States (New York) have started offering financial support to employees and help for out-of-state abortion seekers who seek medical interventions in abortion-supporting States. This will, however, make already-bitter partisan polarisation worse. It must also alarm Americans that the logic of *Dobbs* – that abortion is not mentioned in the U.S. Constitution and is not covered by the landmark 14th Amendment of 1868 that safeguards liberty – has opened the process for other rights to be taken away. For now, President Joe Biden and his Democratic Party have vowed to put *Roe* on the ballot in November's mid-term elections. But the way the U.S. electoral system stacks up the numbers in the Senate against their efforts to break the filibuster, the effort to protect women will likely be carried out incrementally: legal challenges at multiple levels, support to women in Red States, and persuasive political campaigns at the grassroots.

Rewriting 'old history' for a New India

The proposed changes to history textbooks specifically target certain areas of India's past, causing an ideological shift

Recent investigative reports (*The Indian Express*, June 19-22, 2022) bring to light proposals for deletions and changes to school textbooks across the board. The aim, purportedly, is to reduce the load on school students who have suffered a loss of learning due to extended shutdowns during the novel coronavirus pandemic. However, the changes made in the history textbooks specifically target certain areas of India's past and will result in an ideological shift in history teaching at the school level.

Curricular changes

The Government is currently undertaking a series of curricular changes. The Parliamentary Standing Committee on Education, Women, Children, Youth and Sports recently tabled its Report on the Reforms in Content and Design of School Text books (November 30, 2021). The National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT) is already in the process of formulating the new National Curricular Framework, which will direct the syllabi of central and State educational boards. At the heart of this process is the rewriting of school textbooks. The Report of the Parliamentary Committee notes right at the beginning that, "School Textbooks, in our educational system, remain the

easiest way of sharing a single narrative across millions of students through the multitude of diversity that defines our country".

In the tabled report, the discussions in the NCERT and the public statements by members of the ruling establishment, there is an overwhelming emphasis on the need to rewrite history textbooks, to remove "un-historical facts and distortions about national heroes". This is not surprising in itself, since history is at the heart of the political discourse today. The majoritarian political rhetoric rides on the vilification of the Muslims of India as "outsiders" and "invaders". The real story of India, it argues, lies in the ancient period, which is imagined as the glorious Hindu past. Violence – through invasions, battles and bloodshed – is seen as the prime medium of change. The victorious, masculine hero is celebrated, and defeat is seen as an ignominious emasculation. This history focuses on heroes and kings, rulers and armies, even though the craft of history writing has long moved beyond this kind of understanding. However, the suggested changes look to enshrine this as the dominant perspective in history textbooks.

Points of concern

This raises two points of concern: One, this is a limited and unimaginative approach to school education in general and history education in particular. The discussions, especially in the tabled report suggest that the use of audio-visual resources and digital content through QR codes would make school textbooks interesting for students. Such changes are



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welcome. But these are pedagogic techniques, carriers of content. It is when the students are challenged in the realm of ideas that education becomes more engaging and a meaningful vehicle of change.

Two, this narrative makes a demand upon students to suspend critical thinking about the world around them and reduces the past to statist and static in their imagination. For example, there is a proposal to delete the description of some of the practices of Akbar's court. These include the translation of Sanskrit texts such as the *Ramayana*, the *Mahabharata* and the *Rajatarangini* into Persian, Akbar's engagement with diverse social and religious practices in the empire, and a section on the emergence of composite architectural traditions.

An example

Akbar's armies built a grand empire, stretching from Kashmir to the Deccan, from Kabul to Bengal. His court saw an assemblage of administrators, military commanders, the learned and the gifted from regions across India, and from central and west Asia. The administrative culture of the em-

pire and its language of politics emerged out of the engagements and dissensions in the courtly space.

The traditions of the Mughal court influenced the political culture of kingdoms across the sub-continent. If you have ever wondered about the mélange that is our modern Indian languages, or about the cusped arches on houses and temples in villages and small towns, the answer is not that the Mughal armies marched through these areas. Different traditions, courtly and popular, interlarded to produce new political, social and cultural forms. These populate our everyday practices, rituals and traditions, languages and food, artistic sensibilities and so on. However, this sense of history – as fluid, fractious and dynamic – is lost when Akbar is presented only as an emperor who won battles.

Akbar is just one example. The proposed changes in textbooks censor out the diversity in our past, and reduce the space for exploring other histories, like that of inequality – whether of caste or gender, or stories of challenges to hegemonic orders. By posing the history of India as a glory tale, it curtails the possibilities of asking questions of it.

The larger narrative

The proposed changes to the history textbooks fit within the larger narrative of this government. In a recent speech at the Delhi University, the Home Minister declared that since 2014, a 'New India' is being crafted. This New India needs a new history. However, this new history makes villains of some

communities and privileges a fragmented historical narrative which is subject to the demands of community sentiments.

In 1947, when India was emerging from the shadows of colonialism, Indian historians were faced with the question of their role in this nation in the making. In his Presidential address to the Indian History Congress in December 1947, four months after Independence and in midst of the events of Partition, Mohammad Habib asked the historians of the newly independent India to write histories which would create a 'national community', one which rose above all differences of community and caste, where citizens were to be subject to national laws. His address was both poignant and prophetic.

Habib's words ring out strongly today, when as citizens we see the very idea of the Indian nation being redefined, its Constitution challenged. They ring out even more strongly as history becomes the main battleground where this new idea of the nation is being manufactured, literally by the sword and the bulldozer, through blood and tears.

The stories of India's past are complex and diverse. It is unjust to fit it into simple accounts of golden and dark ages, of great and bad men, of remembered and imagined hurts. The proposed rewriting of the history textbook seeks to raise future generations of Indians on ahistorical ideas and a unity premised on falsehoods.

Making sense of New Delhi's Taliban rapprochement

As a 'civilisational state' and inspiring global power, India cannot behave as a transactional, opportunistic salesman

The Pakistan-led coalition's success and luck in toppling a United States-supported constitutional order in Afghanistan has brought to surface unexpected developments. While a growing number of the Taliban's western and regional lobbyists are distancing themselves from their pyrrhic victory, India pulled a rabbit out of its diplomatic hat by sending a senior diplomatic delegation to the Taliban-occupied Kabul. The visit was the culmination of Delhi's months of quiet diplomacy and signalling. Just hours after the Taliban's takeover, in 2021, India was the first country to immediately ban all Afghans travelling to India, including students and patients with a valid Indian visa. In a significant but not widely-covered decision, India chose to abstain from the UN Security Council's calling on the Taliban to open girl schools and continues to remain silent about a worsening situation in Afghanistan.

India's apparent reorientation can be described and understood as an example of realpolitik, supremacy of national interest and a superficiality of "values" and "sentiments" in the Hobbesian world of international politics. India's neutral stance on Russia's entanglement in Ukraine reveals the Indian version of "First India" foreign policy.

However, Delhi's flirtation with the Taliban raises a number of pertinent questions: What are India's key strategic interests in Afghanis-

tan? How can a potential India-Taliban rapprochement advance such interests? Does the Taliban have the intent and/or capacity to deliver on their promise and vice versa? How would India engage with the anti-Taliban constituencies? How will India's aspiration to become a global power be served by aligning with an unacceptable regime such as the Taliban?

India as alliance's target

Afghanistan is a security-centric concern, in particular, the nexus of Islamic militancy, illicit drugs and proxy warfare. India is a primary target for this alliance. The Taliban's victory realised two important ideological and strategic goals of militant Islamists and their Pakistani patron: establishing a "pure Islamic Government" in the Heart of Asia and securing Pakistan's "Strategic Depth". The two concepts are necessary pre-conditions for attaining another long-held vision of Islamists, Ghazwa-e-Hind.

There are both historical precedents and existing infrastructure in support of the nexus of religious zealots, tribal warriors and imperial ambitions. Mahmud Ghaznavi was the first to recruit tribal warriors from today's Afghanistan/Pakistan border region to attack and plunder India more than 1,000 years ago. The British applied a similar strategy in undermining and eventually toppling Afghanistan's progressive King Amanullah Khan in the early 20th century. In its first war against India in 1948, Pakistan mobilised a tribal army to attack India.

The central pillar of the West's anti-Soviet strategy in Afghanistan was to fund and support the Mujahideen via a Central Intelligence Agency (CIA)-led operation, named "Operation Cyclone". Pa-

kistan's geo-strategic vision for Afghanistan is to create a "Greater Waziristan", to be ruled by an isolated, ruthless and dogmatic Taliban's reign, funded by United Nations/western humanitarian assistance. In return, Greater Waziristan would become a major centre for producing, training and sheltering different brands of "tribal/Islamist warriors" for different markets. Afghanistan's over 6,000 religious madrassas will be further incorporated into Pakistan's plus 40,000 madrassas to create the world's largest network of militant-inspired educational institutions.

Wishful thinking

New Delhi also seems hopeful of capitalising on the personal grudge some Taliban commanders have against Pakistan and hence its wishful thinking to create an India-friendly faction within the Taliban. Pakistan's military-intelligence establishment has shown its ruthlessness and efficient way in dealing with dissident, "out-of-control" and "outdated" proxies. The fate of Pakistani politicians such as Benazir Bhutto, Nawaz Sharif, Imran Khan, or Pakistan's Afghan proxies such as Gulbuddin Hekmatyar, and former Taliban supreme leader Mullah Akhtar Mansour showed Pakistan's zealous determination to maintain its monopoly on its proxies. India's ruling par-

ty's anti-Muslim inclinations have also provided additional ammunition to the advocates of "Ghazwa-e-Hind".

The facts on the ground are often cited to justify a realistic foreign policy; a justification by those who advocate engagement with the Taliban. There are also other facts that should be taken into account. The U.S.'s peace agreement with the Taliban ended the U.S.'s half-hearted and confused hostility with the Taliban. It did not however terminate other drivers of the Afghan conflict. The following social media trends among Afghan users reveal the full picture of the sorrow conflict: SanctionPakistan; LetAfghanGirlsLearn; StopHazararGenocide; StopTajikGenocide; PartitionAfghanistan. The Taliban have excluded all non-Taliban Pashtuns from public space as is shown by the house detention of former President Hamid Karzai; there are also systematic violations of the human rights of the non-Pashtun communities which amount to crime against humanity, and ethnic cleansing which borders on genocide. For the first time, the partition of the country into Pashtun-dominated and Farsiwan-dominated polities has, sadly, become political discourse among the Farsiwan constituencies.

Fallacy of 'India First'

An "India First" policy seems to drive Delhi's Taliban rapprochement. If so, it will destroy a central pillar of India's foreign and security policy, the dismantling of the region's "terrorist infrastructure". The Taliban's victory is the best product of this infrastructure. It would defy logic to be simultaneously critical of a production system while embracing its premium product. India as a "civilizational

state" and an inspiring global power cannot behave as a bandwagoning, transactional, opportunistic salesman.

Notwithstanding India's strategic hesitancy and caution during the last two decades in Afghanistan, it attained two important benchmarks of becoming an ideal and trustworthy partner. Many Afghans looked at India as an example of a fellow developing nation that overcame the many challenges of building and sustaining a functioning democratic polity. More importantly, India was seen as a sincere friend of Afghanistan, unlike many double-faced actors. Even for an "interest"-based foreign policy, it is counter-productive to lose the trust and goodwill of Afghans toward India by embracing a policy that is doomed to failure on multiple grounds.

Since August 15, 2021, Afghanistan has descended from a Pax Americana experiment to a "Pax Pakistanana" ambition. The prospects for peace and stability in Afghanistan under a Pax Pakistanana lordship are not feasible as Pakistan itself is overwhelmed by multiple internal and external challenges. Afghanistan needs a strong UN mandate, including a UN-led political transition process supported by a UN peace keeping/making force. India can lend its support to such endeavours which are worthy of its character, ambition and Afghanistan's needs.

Bringing MSMEs into global value chains

These businesses are the ones that have faced the harshest of environments over the last few years

Though the growth and achievements of large businesses in India have received much attention, micro-, small and medium enterprises (MSME) actually account for over 99% of businesses. MSMEs are the largest employer in India outside of agriculture, employing over 11.1 crore people, or 45% of all workers. It is no exaggeration to call MSMEs - privately owned enterprise with less than ₹50 crore in investments in plant and machinery and turnover below ₹250 crore - the backbone of the Indian economy.

Every year on June 27, World MSME Day provides us with the opportunity to appreciate their valuable contribution to job creation and sustainable development across the world. Yet, these businesses are the ones that have faced the harshest of environments over the last few years.

The disruption of the pandemic severely impacted MSMEs, especially those in the services sector. Their small size and lack of access to resources meant that many were only beginning to mount a fragile recovery just when renewed war, supply shocks and soaring fuel, food and fertilizer prices presented a host of new threats. And all of this comes against the backdrop of the ongoing climate crisis, the greatest disruption multiplier of all.

At the same time, the potential of India's small businesses is truly immense. India faces a unique moment in history, a potential demographic dividend of tremendous proportions. To leverage this opportunity, India needs to create many jobs, especially for the one million young people entering the labour market every month.

Meeting standards

While some MSMEs operate at the highest industry standards, most do not meet today's standards on productivity, environmental sustainability, and health and safety of workers. This is further exacerbated by the high degree of informality in the sector, with many enterprises unregistered, and both employers and workers are lacking awareness of and commitment to comply with labour and environmental laws. As a result, informal enterprises cannot access



formal MSME support and financing nor participate in global value chains that require full compliance with all applicable regulations.

The Government of India has rightly identified the development of the country's MSME ecosystem as a top priority for achieving *Atma Nirbhar Bharat* (self-reliant India). India's ambitious "Make in India" campaign aims to catapult the country up the manufacturing value chain to position itself as a global manufacturing hub. Initiatives such as the production linked incentives (PLI) schemes and the recently launched zero defect zero defect (ZED) certification are helping to promote and boost the sector.

To help accelerate this process, the UN system in India is supporting these and other MSME development initiatives at the local, State and national levels. Agencies such as the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO), International Labour Organization (ILO), United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), UN Women, IFAD and others are working with MSMEs as they navigate a rapidly changing post-pandemic economic landscape shaped by large-scale transitions, chiefly digitalisation, greening and the reorganisation of value chains.

Firstly, digitalisation concerns the integration of digital technologies, such as big data, artificial intelligence and virtual reality, in business processes, also known as Industry 4.0. With few exceptions, digitalisation into smart manufacturing operations is still in its infancy. Therefore, there is a need for replicable digital solu-

tions adapted for MSMEs, including digital enhancements for machinery and equipment currently in use. Government initiatives such as the Digital Saksham and the interlinking of the Udyam, e-Shram, National Career Service (NCS), and Atmanirbhar Skilled Employee-Employer Mapping (ASEEM) portals show the promise of targeted digitalisation schemes.

Environmental impact

Secondly, "greening" reduces the environmental impact of MSME operations and fosters cleantech innovation and entrepreneurship to accelerate the transition to a circular and low carbon economy. Energy efficiency provides a case in point as business and climate benefits go hand in hand. For example, together with the Bureau of Energy Efficiency (BEE), UNIDO provided energy efficiency advisory services to 695 MSMEs in 23 clusters covering brass, ceramic, dairy, foundry and hand tool sectors. As a result, these MSMEs invested themselves during the cash-strapped COVID period ₹157 crore to save 13,105 tonnes of oil equivalent and ₹81 crore in annual operating costs and preventing 83,000 tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions.

Thirdly, to increase the resilience of supply in response to recent shocks, production locations for global value chains are increasingly shifting and diversifying across countries and regions.

To further leverage this opportunity, UNIDO is spearheading the notion of manufacturing excellence.

This means fostering a culture of continuous improvement and innovation that reduces waste and increases productivity, safety and quality. In one partnership with the Automotive Components Manufacturers Association (ACMA), the participating SME component manufacturers have achieved average reductions of in-house and client rejections of 82% and 73% respectively, eliminated hazardous work conditions, and achieved cumulative annual savings of over ₹4.2 crore.

Job creation

The Prime Minister's Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP) is also creating opportunities for self-employment and micro enterprises, with over 7 lakh micro enterprises assisted in becoming economically viable. Similarly, ILO, together with the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce & Industry (FICCI) and corporates, is supporting MSMEs in creating and retaining jobs, with over 150 MSMEs having improved productivity, aligned to international standards and integrated into global supply chains, and the Start and Improve Your Business programme helping over a lakh young people across five States launch enterprises.

A forward-looking mindset centres on policy makers and society at large fully recognising and supporting the central socio-economic role that MSMEs play in India, as across the world. In turn, to fully unlock emerging opportunities in the rapidly changing global value chain ecosystem and maximise the demographic dividend, MSME owners need to further commit to formalising their businesses, investing in improved productivity, compliance and most of all, decent work and jobs for India's aspiring youth. As UN Secretary-General Guterres has urged, "Let us renew our commitment to leverage the full potential of MSMEs, rescue the Sustainable Development Goals and build a more prosperous and just world for all."

How Hanoi and New Delhi are fortifying defence ties

The maritime domain has taken centre stage in talks

The furtherance of India's Act East Policy, maritime multilateralism, maritime security outreach and the building of stronger networks across the Indo-Pacific are some of the key elements which have made New Delhi and Hanoi natural partners. The two countries recently deepened bilateral cooperation with the signing of the Joint Vision Statement on India-Vietnam Defence Partnership towards 2030 during the recent visit of Defence Minister Rajnath Singh to Vietnam. The Joint Vision Statement is aimed at boosting the scope and scale of the existing defence cooperation between the two nations. Both sides undertook extensive deliberations to expand avenues of effective and practicable collaboration in bilateral defence engagements pertaining to regional and global issues.

In the meeting with his counterpart, Vietnam's Minister of National Defence General Phan Van Giang, the early finalisation of the \$500 million Defence Line of Credit extended by India to the latter along with the implementation of existing projects which would complement India's 'Make in India, Make for the world' and Hanoi's defence capabilities were also discussed. The two sides also signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on Mutual Logistics Support. This is the first agreement of its kind that Hanoi has entered into with any other country and elevates the standing of Comprehensive Strategic Partnership (CSP) which Hanoi shares with New Delhi since 2016 (along with only Russia and China).

Because of the volume of maritime trade that passes through sea lanes of communication in the Indo-Pacific and potential as well as estimated energy reserves in these waters, maritime cooperation between countries in the region have expanded exponentially. Undoubtedly, for India and Vietnam too, the maritime domain in particular has occupied a central focus. Both countries find convergence in their approaches towards the maintenance of stability and security of the Indo-Pacific which has translated into diplomatic and political support in the context of developments within the region.

The enhanced geostrategic prominence and attendant uncertainties vis-à-vis China's

expanding and often abrasive footprints in the Indo-Pacific have resulted in an overall increase in emphasis on cooperative mechanisms and frameworks across the region. Hanoi and New Delhi have not been strangers to these developments and have stepped up bilateral exchanges. Defence partnership between the two countries has been growing steadily following the signing of the Defence Protocol in 2000 and today covers extensive navy-to-navy cooperation spanning the exchange of intelligence, production and logistical support for Vietnam's defence requirements, development of naval facilities such as Nha Trang, defence dialogues, high-level visits and the supply of warships and cruise missiles.

Vietnam has and continues to be one of the most vocal countries with respect to China's periodic transgressions in the South China Sea. In India, Vietnam has found an equally uncompromising partner when it comes to the question of violations of freedom of navigation and threats to sovereign maritime territorial rights as enshrined under international maritime law. Indeed, it is believed that Hanoi used the term Indo-Pacific for the first time in 2018 in its Joint Statement with India. New Delhi has supported Vietnam's position in the South China Sea with respect to Beijing's destabilising actions and coercive tactics backing the verdict of the Permanent Court of Arbitration in the case brought by Manila in 2016 and reiterating the irrefutability of the UNCLOS. India has also not backed down from continuing ONGC Videsh Ltd (OVL)'s oil exploration project in Block 128 (which is within Hanoi's EEZ) despite China's protests. In 2020 China's incursion into Ladakh was quickly followed by the deployment of warships by India to the South China Sea in an instance of asymmetrical warfare and a signalling that India will not stand down. These instances together with the deepening of India's operational outreach in the Indo-Pacific have successfully indicated and cemented its role as a capable, willing and reliable partner.

Despite the fact that the China factor has provided impetus to the solidification of ties, it is also important to consider that mutual cooperation is not driven solely by it. Both countries have expanded areas of collaboration and are supportive of each other's individual and multilateral involvements within the rubric of the Indo-Pacific.

Three's a crowd?

The dispute around Amaravati versus 3 capitals for Andhra rages even after the HC verdict

The proposed three capitals for Andhra Pradesh continue to be in a limbo due to the protracted litigation in the High Court and the spirited battle being waged outside by thousands of farmers who gave up their fertile lands for the development of Amaravati as a single capital city.

The High Court said on March 3, 2022, that the State should develop Amaravati as the capital of Andhra Pradesh, consequent to its lack of legislative competence to change or trifurcate the capital.

In response, the State government filed a petition earlier this month, requesting that it be given five years' time, citing the difficulty in accomplishing the task in a short time (one month for infrastructure creation and six months for construction and development Amaravati from the date of judgement) and the severe financial constraints it is grappling with since bifurcation.

Meanwhile, the State government claimed to have resumed the works which were suspended soon after the YSR Congress came to power in May 2019 and said it is in the process of raising loans from banks.

Here lies a big problem: banks have made it clear that only a consortium of banks (a single bank cannot lend huge sums) can provide the credit required by the government.

Quest for loans

A bigger hurdle is the stipulation by the banks that the "revenue stream of the borrower (the government) should be reflected in the financial model" and "any budgetary support for servicing repayment obligations will not be considered".

These conditions have essentially tied the government in knots as complying with those procedures and obtaining final approvals from the lending institutions is itself a time-taking process and the government had to struggle to bridge the revenue deficit

that is widening over the years.

Besides, the economy is going through a turmoil largely due to the COVID-19 pandemic. As it is, the government is running on a shoestring budget, which leaves no scope for it to meet the large expenditure entailed by the development of Amaravati even in separate tranches.

On the other side is Chief Minister Y.S. Jagan Mohan Reddy's strong desire to have the three capitals in Amaravati, Visakhapatnam and Kurnool, about which he is clear in spite of the setback suffered by the government in the court.

At the time of repealing the Andhra Pradesh Decentralisation and Inclusive Development of all Regions Act 2020 and the Andhra Pradesh Capital Region Development Authority Repeal Act in the State Legislature, he was on record, saying that the government would come up with a fresh Bill to give the three capitals a tangible shape sooner than later.

However, the new law proposed by the Chief Minister has so far not been introduced in the Legislature due to the risks involved in doing so as such a move is bound to be considered contempt of court and may lead to escalating the dispute to the Supreme Court.

Justice Gopala Gowda, retired judge of the Supreme Court who had been a vocal critic of the three capitals proposal, said in a recent workshop organised by the Amaravati Parirakshana Samithi, that the High Court judgment is the law till it is set aside by the Supreme Court as per Article 13 of the Constitution.

He said that not only the Chief Secretary but also all members of the State Legislature, including the Ministers, were jointly and severally liable to action for not implementing the order.

Therefore, it remains to be seen whether the Chief Minister will stick to Amaravati or proceed with the idea of three capitals and if the move derives any electoral mileage for the YSR Congress in the north Andhra districts and Rayalaseema.

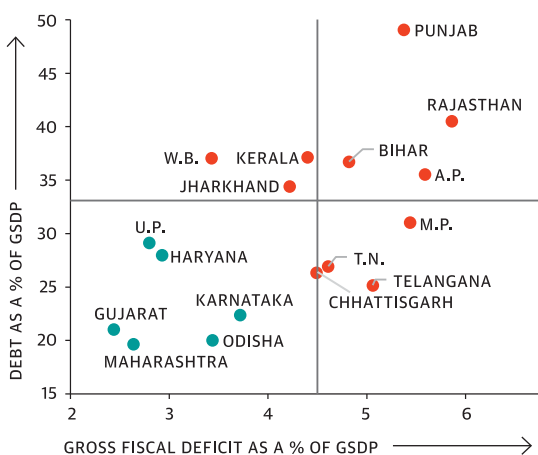
States under fiscal constraints

The pandemic has worsened fiscal positions of State governments. Declining tax revenue, a high share of committed expenses (interest payments, pensions, administrative expenses etc.) and rising subsidy burdens meant that States were overtly dependent on Central transfers. A decline in revenue and increase in spending meant a sharp rise in debt. Punjab, Rajasthan, Kerala, West Bengal, Bihar, Andhra Pradesh, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh and Haryana had the highest debt burden in 2020-21. The revenue expenditure of many of these States constitute 80-90% of the total expenses and therefore they have poor capital spending



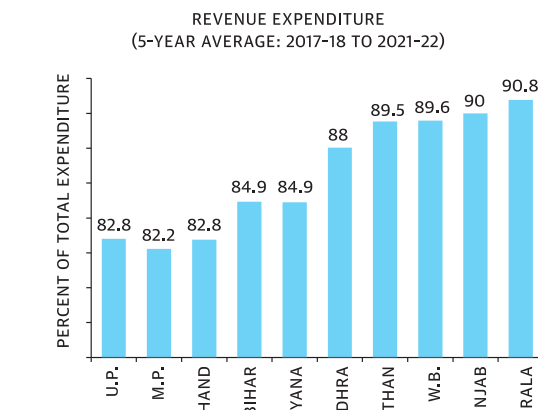
1. FISCAL DEFICIT AND DEBT TARGET

3. HIGH REVENUE EXPENDITURE

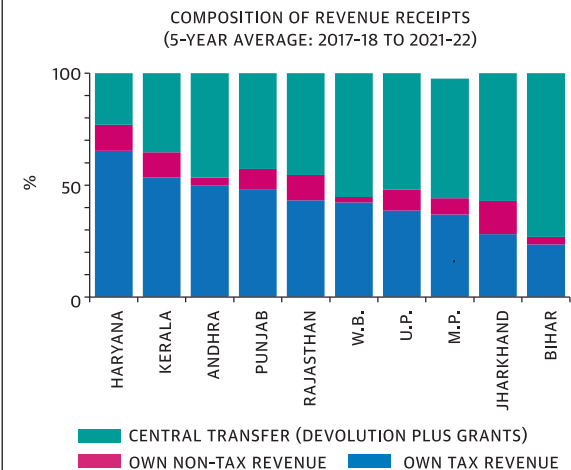

The ten selected States account for around half of the total revenue collected by all states and UTs. They also account for around half of the total expenditure by all State governments in India

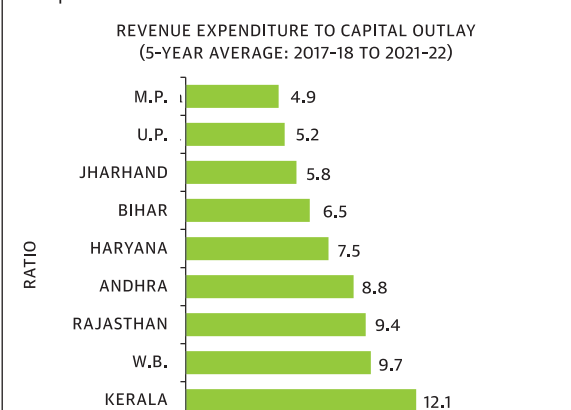
2. DEPENDENCY ON CENTRE

Sri Lanka seeks aid from China

Sri Lanka Premier Mrs. Sirimavo Bandaranaike who arrived in Peking yesterday to an unprecedentedly warm and enthusiastic reception speaking later the same night called for China's continued support and co-operation to realise the acceptance of all powers in the world of the proposal to make the India Ocean a peace zone. She said the China could help clear the many hurdles which still lay ahead of the proposal, could become a reality. The Chinese Premier, Mr. Zhou Enlai pledging China's firm support for this "just proposal" urged all countries to respect, the resolution on the declaration of the Indian Ocean as a peace zone adopted by the United Nations General Assembly last December. The appeals by the two Premiers were made at a grand banquet given by Mr. Chou in honour of Mrs. Bandaranaike and her party in the banquet hall of the Great Hall of People. Although in her speech Mrs. Bandaranaike stated that she had gone to China primarily to express her appreciation "for friendship and co-operation which your country has been extending to Sri Lanka" there are indications that there are more concrete subjects on the agenda of talks which will take place in the coming few days. In particular it seems likely that China will be providing material assistance to strengthen both Sri Lanka's defence forces and its civilian police. Mrs. Bandaranaike indicated that she was expecting more aid from China "in fields in which it would be mutually beneficial and appropriate to us".

A HUNDRED YEARS AGO JUNE 27, 1922

Vacuum sweepers for streets

Plans are being considered according to the "Daily Chronicle" Special Correspondent at New York for making New York a dustless city by using motor-driven vacuum sweepers for cleaning the streets. Prominent businessmen who have urged this method argue that the machines will remove daily the germs that now are only laid by rain, and thus reduce the mortality of the population considerably. They will cart of the dust that is now merely turned over by the ordinary sweepers. The saving in laundry bills will be large. Open windows will no longer mean dusty rooms, and the labour of the housewife will be greatly lightened. Finally it is estimated that 2,000 street sweepers will be released for other work, which will mean a saving of much money to the city.

Assam floods

25 In lakhs, the number of people still facing difficulties in 27 flood-hit districts of Assam, according to the Assam State Disaster Management Authority. As many as 2.33 lakh have taken shelter in 637 relief camps of the northeastern State, which had been battling floods and landslides for the past two weeks. Four more persons died on Saturday in the floods in different parts of Assam, raising this year's toll in the State due to flood and landslides to 121. Since March 1, the State has recorded 1,891.90 mm of rainfall. PTI

Short-term role

56,960 The number of applications received by the Indian Air Force under the Agnipath recruitment scheme till Sunday; three days after the registration process started. Registration closes on July 5. Unveiling the Agnipath scheme, the government had said youth between the ages of 17-and-a-half and 21 years (revised to 23 later) would be inducted for a four-year tenure after which 25% of them will be inducted for regular service. PTI

India-Egypt wheat trade

1.8 In lakh tonnes, the amount of wheat Egypt has contracted to buy from India, according to Egyptian Supply Minister Aly Moselhy. Shipment will happen once the cargo "reaches the ports" in India, Mr. Moselhy added. Egypt has strategic reserves of wheat sufficient for 5.7 months. The country has procured 3.9 million tonnes of wheat in the harvest so far. The strategic reserves for sugar are sufficient for more than six months, 6.3 months for vegetable oils while rice reserves will be enough for 3.3 months. REUTERS

Need for coal

0.8 In million tonnes, the amount of coal that will be produced by two mines in Assam if they were cleared to operate. Coal India unit North Eastern Coalfields is in the process of seeking clearances for putting them into operation in the current financial year. This is in the wake of efforts being made to avoid the recurrence of power outages faced by the country at the beginning of the summer season. Mining operations at North Eastern Coalfields were halted due to environment-related issues in 2020. PTI

Stepping off the gas

40 In percent, the amount by which Russia cut gas supplies to Europe blaming delayed equipment repairs in the Nord Stream 1 pipeline. The move left Germany and other states racing to find alternative supplies to head off the risk of rationing when winter comes. Europe fears President Vladimir Putin will use a scheduled maintenance programme on the pipeline from July 11 to 21 to turn the screws, putting a brake on efforts to refill inventories in retaliation for far-reaching sanctions over Moscow's invasion of Ukraine. Indian laws on abortions

What are the conditions under which Indian women can safely terminate pregnancies?

THE GIST

■ In order to reduce maternal mortality owing to unsafe abortions, the Medical Termination of Pregnancy (MTP) Act was brought into force in 1971. This law is an exception to the Indian Penal Code (IPC) provisions of 312 and 313 and sets out the rules of how and when a medical abortion can be carried out.

■ Under the Medical Termination of Pregnancy (Amendment) Act, 2021, abortion is permitted after medical opinion under stipulated circumstances. The 2021 Act increased the upper limit of the gestation period to which a woman can seek a medical abortion to 24 weeks from 20 weeks permitted in the 1971 Act. But this renewed upper limit can only be exercised in specific cases.

■ Several women annually approach the apex court and High Courts, when medical boards reject their application to access MTP beyond the gestational upper limit, seeking permission to abort a pregnancy, mostly in cases where it is a result of sexual assault or when there is a foetal abnormality.

The story so far: In a significant step backwards for women's rights in the U.S., the Supreme Court overturned the landmark *Roe v. Wade* judgement of 1973, which gave women in America the right to have an abortion before the foetus is viable outside the womb or before the 24-28 week mark. With the setting aside of the historic judgement on abortion in the U.S., here's a look at the laws that govern abortion in India.

How did abortion laws come about in India?

In the 1960s, in the wake of a high number of induced abortions taking place, the Union government ordered the constitution of the Shantilal Shah Committee to deliberate on the legalisation of abortion in the country. In order to reduce maternal mortality owing to unsafe abortions, the Medical Termination of Pregnancy (MTP) Act was brought into force in 1971. This law is an exception to the Indian Penal Code (IPC) provisions of 312 and 313 and sets out the rules of how and when a medical abortion can be carried out.

Under Section 312 of the IPC, a person who "voluntarily causes a woman with child to miscarry" is liable for punishment, attracting a jail term of up to three years or fine or both, unless it was done in good faith where the purpose was to save the life of the pregnant woman. Section 313 of the IPC states that a person who causes the miscarriage without the consent of the pregnant woman, whether or not she is in the advanced stages of her pregnancy, shall be punished with life imprisonment or a jail term that could extend to 10 years, as well as a fine.

How has the MTP Act evolved from 1971 to 2021?

The latest amendment to the MTP Act was made in 2021. Before that new rules were introduced in 2003 to allow the use of then newly discovered abortion medicine misoprostol, to medically terminate a pregnancy up to seven weeks into it. Broader amendments to the original Act were introduced in 2020 and the amended Act came into force in September 2021.

Under the Medical Termination of Pregnancy (Amendment) Act, 2021, abortion is permitted after medical opinion under stipulated circumstances. The 2021 Act increased the upper limit of the gestation period to which a woman can seek a medical abortion to 24 weeks from 20 weeks permitted in the 1971 Act. But this renewed upper limit can only be exercised in specific cases. Gestational age, calculated in weeks, is the medical term to describe how far along the pregnancy is and is measured from the first day of the woman's last menstruation or period.

Another major amendment was that MTP could not be accessed on the opinion of a single registered medical practitioner up to 20 weeks of the gestational age. From 20 weeks up to 24 weeks, the opinion of two registered medical practitioners is required. In the previous version of the Act, the opinion of one registered doctor was required to access a medical abortion up to 12 weeks of pregnancy, while two doctors were required to endorse the abortion up to 20 weeks.

What is the MTP (Amendment) Act, 2021?

Under the 2021 Act, medical termination of pregnancy is permitted if it is backed by medical opinion and is being sought for at least one of the following reasons – (1) If the continuation of pregnancy would involve a risk to the life of the pregnant woman (2) If its continuation would result in grave injury to the woman's physical or mental health (3) In the case of a substantial risk that if the child was born, it would suffer from serious physical or mental abnormality.

The pregnancy can be terminated upto 24 weeks of gestational age after the opinion of two registered medical practitioners under these conditions – (1) If the woman is either a survivor of sexual assault or rape or incest (2) If she is a minor (3) If her marital status has changed during the ongoing pregnancy (i.e. either widowhood or divorce) (4) If she has major physical disabilities or is mentally ill (5) On the grounds of foetal malformation incompatible with life or if the child is born, it would be seriously handicapped (6) If the woman is in humanitarian settings or disaster, or emergency situations as declared

by the government.

Besides, if the pregnancy has to be terminated beyond the 24-week gestational age, it can only be done on the grounds of foetal abnormalities if a four-member Medical Board, as set up in each State under the Act, gives permission to do so.

The law, notwithstanding any of the above conditions, also provides that where it is immediately necessary to save the life of the pregnant woman, abortion can be carried out at any time by a single registered medical practitioner.

Unmarried women can also access abortion under the above-mentioned conditions, because it does not mention the requirement of spousal consent. If the woman is a minor, however, the consent of a guardian is required.

Have there been judicial interventions in cases of abortions?

Despite the fact that existing laws do not permit unconditional abortion in the country, in the landmark 2017 Right to Privacy judgement in the *Justice K.S. Puttaswamy v. Union of India and others*, the Supreme Court had held that the decision by a pregnant person on whether to continue a pregnancy or not is part of such a person's right to privacy as well and, therefore, the right to life and personal liberty under Article 21 of the Constitution.

Several women annually approach the apex court and High Courts, when medical boards reject their application to access MTP beyond the gestational upper limit (now 24 weeks), seeking permission to abort a pregnancy, mostly in cases where it is a result of sexual assault or when there is a foetal abnormality.

A report authored by advocate Anubha Rastogi for the Pratiya Campaign said that in the 15 months leading up to August 2020, High Courts across the country were hearing 243 petitions of women seeking permission to abort. In February this year, the Calcutta High Court allowed a 37-year-old woman, who was 34 weeks into her pregnancy, to get a medical abortion as the foetus was diagnosed with an incurable spinal condition. This judgment allowed abortion for the furthest gestational in the country so far.



What are the criticisms against the abortion law?

According to a 2018 study in the *Lancet*, 15.6 million abortions were accessed every year in India as of 2015. The MTP Act requires abortion to be performed only by doctors with specialisation in gynaecology or obstetrics. However, the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare's 2019-20 report on Rural Health Statistics indicates that there is a 70% shortage of obstetrician-gynaecologists in rural India.

As the law does not permit abortion at will, critics say that it pushes women to access illicit abortions under unsafe conditions. Statistics put the annual number of unsafe and illegal abortions performed in India at 8,00,000, many of them resulting in maternal mortality.

Understanding the Supreme Court verdict on the Zakia Jafri protest petition

When did the SIT submit its report? Why did the apex court find fault with two former Gujarat State officers?

The story so far: The Supreme Court dismissed the protest petition filed by Zakia Jafri, widow of late Congress leader Ehsan Jafri, challenging the clean chit given to Prime Minister Narendra Modi, then Chief Minister of Gujarat and 63 other senior officials of the State for their alleged role in the 2002 communal riots. The apex court in its 452-page verdict rubbished allegations of a "larger conspiracy" in the Gulberg Housing Society case in which Ehsan Jafri was among those killed. The massacre took place shortly after the Godhra train tragedy which had claimed the lives of 59 kar sevaks on February 27, 2002.

What was the apex court's verdict?

The three-judge Bench headed by Justice A.M. Khanwilkar held that the inaction of "some officials of one section of the State administration" cannot be the basis to infer a pre-planned criminal conspiracy by the State government, and found no fault in the Special Investigation Team (SIT) report. "There is no material worth the name to even create a suspicion indicative of the meeting of the minds of all concerned at some level; and in particular, the bureaucrats, politicians, public prosecutors or the members of the

state political establishment – for hatching a larger criminal conspiracy at the highest level to cause and precipitate mass violence against the minority community across the State," the judgment said. The court further upheld the report of the SIT, stating, "No fault can be found with the approach of the SIT in submitting final report dated 8.2.2012". It held "the final report backed by firm logic, expositing analytical mind and dealing with all aspects objectively".

"The SIT has not found any conspiracy, linking separate and disparate acts of arson and looting or outrageous claims made in sting operations or individual utterances/publications of purported hate speech." The Bench upheld the decision of the Additional Metropolitan

Magistrate to accept the closure of the SIT – which was itself appointed by the Supreme Court in 2008 – rejecting the protest petition filed by Zakia Jafri.

What were the criticisms of the Supreme Court?

The court came down heavily on two State officers, Sanjiv Bhatt and R.B. Sreekumar and former Home Minister of Gujarat Haren Pandya, stating, "At the end of the day, it appears to us that a coalesced effort of the disgruntled officials of the State of Gujarat along with others was to create a sensation by making revelations which were false to their own knowledge. The falsity of their claims had been fully exposed by the SIT after a thorough investigation."

The court held that the officers were not part of the meeting to decide the future course of action when the violence had broken out on Feb 27, 2002. Mr. Bhatt, it may be recalled, had told the Supreme Court that on the night of Feb 27, 2002, Mr. Modi had asked the police brass to let the Hindus vent their anger. Likewise, Mr. Sreekumar had in his deposition before the Nanavati-Shah commission pointed to a dubious role by the administration during the violence.

Such officials need to be in the dock for "keeping pot boiling" the court said,

pointing out, "Intriguingly, the present proceedings have been pursued for last 16 years with the audacity to question the integrity of every functionary involved in the process of exposing the devious strategem adopted. As a matter of fact, all those involved in such abuse of process, need to be in the dock and proceeded with in accordance with the law."

Incidentally, the SIT headed by former CBI director R.K. Raghavan had submitted a closure report almost a decade ago. Back in 2012, it gave a clean chit to Mr. Modi and 63 others, finding no prosecutable evidence against them. The Metropolitan Magistrate accepted the report following which Zakia Jafri went to Gujarat High Court. In October 2017, the State High Court dismissed her petition. In September 2018, Ms. Jafri knocked the doors of the Supreme Court and filed a protest petition against acceptance of the SIT report. In December last year, the apex court reserved its judgment.

What happened in Gulberg Society?

As tensions were on a high in Ahmedabad after the Godhra tragedy, around 90 local residents had gathered at the Gulberg residence of Ehsan Jafri, hoping for safety at the former Parliamentarian's place from the mob on the rampage. Mr. Jafri, apprehending violence, called many

officers and leaders for help. In the absence of any practical aid, Mr. Jafri had lost hope. Around 9.30 in the morning, the first attack took place. The police assured help but soon a mob laid siege to Gulberg Society. Gas cylinders were hurled inside the premises from outside and kerosene cans were lobbed from the road. The house was set on fire. Mr. Jafri stepped out, pleading with the mob for the life of the people inside the house. He was then dragged to the road, mutilated and then killed. His body was not recovered. Sixty-nine people were killed, as claimed by local residents; officially 39 casualties were reported.

Further, as an eyewitness recalled in Rakesh Sharma's National award-winning documentary *Final Solution* based on the Gujarat violence, "The police removed the names of the main culprits of the Vishwa Hindu Parishad, Bajrang Dal from the FIR. We were offered money to take the case back, not to recognise the culprits."

What was the aftermath of the verdict?

Within hours of the Supreme Court judgment, human rights activist Teesta Setalvad, said to be behind Ms. Jafri's prolonged legal battle, was detained by the police. Mr. Sreekumar was also arrested. Mr. Bhatt is already under custody.

Implications of India's new VPN rules

Will virtual servers be able to bypass the new CERT-in rules on virtual private networks?

The story so far: On April 28, India's cybersecurity agency passed a rule mandating Virtual Private Network (VPN) providers to record and keep their customers' logs for 180 days. It also asked these firms to collect and store customer data for up to five years. It further mandated that any cybercrime recorded must be reported to the CERT-In (Computer Emergency Response Team) within six hours of the crime. The new directives, if passed, will be effective from June 28. In response to the CERT-In rules, Nord VPN, one of the world's largest VPN providers, has said it is moving its servers out of the country. Two other firms, Express VPN and Surfshark, said they will shut down their physical servers in India and cater to users in India through virtual servers located in Singapore and the U.K.

Who all will be affected by the new rules? CERT-In directions are applicable to data centres, virtual private server (VPS) providers, cloud service providers, virtual asset service providers, virtual asset exchange providers, custodian wallet providers and government organisations. Firms that provide Internet proxy-like services through VPN technologies also come under the ambit of the new rule. Corporate entities are not under the scanner.

What is a virtual server, and what are its uses? A virtual server is a simulated server environment built on an actual physical server. It recreates the functionality of a dedicated physical server. The virtual twin functions like a physical server that runs software and uses resources of the physical server. Multiple virtual servers can run on a single physical server. Virtualising servers helps reallocate resources for changing workloads. Converting one physical server into multiple virtual servers allows organisations to use processing power and resources more efficiently by running multiple operating systems and applications on one

partitioned server. Running multiple operating systems and applications on a single physical machine reduces cost as it consumes less space and hardware. Virtualisation also reduces cost as maintaining a virtual server infrastructure is low compared to physical server infrastructure. Virtual servers are also said to offer higher security than a physical server infrastructure as the operating system and applications are enclosed in a virtual machine. This helps contain security attacks and malicious behaviour inside the virtual machine.

Express VPN and Surfshark have said that they will shut down their physical servers in India and cater to users in India through virtual servers located in Singapore and the U.K.

Virtual servers are also useful in testing and debugging applications in different operating systems and versions without having to manually install and run them in several physical machines. Software developers can create, run, and test new software applications on a virtual server without taking processing power away from other users.

Can server relocation and virtualisation help VPN providers circumvent the new rules?

The FAQs published by the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeiTY) regarding the cybersecurity directions offers some clarity on relocation and virtualisation. It says the rules are applicable to "any entity whatsoever" in the matter of cyber incidents and cyber security incidents, regardless of whether they have a physical presence in India or not, as long as they deliver services to Indian users. The service providers who do not have a physical presence in India but offer services to the users in the country, have to designate a point of contact to liaise with CERT-In. Also, logs may be stored outside India as long as the obligation to produce logs to CERT-In is adhered to by the entities in a reasonable time. VPN companies, like Surfshark, on the other

hand believe that by removing their physical servers to countries outside India they will comply with the laws applicable to their activities, the company said to *The Hindu*.

How will the law impact India's IT sector? In response to *The Hindu's* queries on the impact of removal of physical servers from the country on jobs, SurfsharkVPN said "It would be difficult to estimate the exact number of individuals impacted in terms of employment because we were renting servers from Indian providers."

VPN suppliers leaving India is not good for its burgeoning IT sector. Taking such radical action that highly impacts the privacy of millions of people in India will most likely be counterproductive and strongly damage the IT sector's growth in the country, the company said in a release last week.

It estimated that 254.9 million Indians have had their accounts breached since 2004 and raised its concern that collecting excessive amounts of data within Indian jurisdiction without robust protection mechanisms could lead to even more breaches.

The Netherlands-based company further said that they have never received a similar directive on storing customer logs from any other governments in the world.

Does China have similar rules regarding VPN usage?

Though not all VPNs are officially banned in China, only government-approved VPNs are officially permitted to function, Syed Ali Akhtar, Fellow at the National Law University, Delhi told *The Hindu*.

Visitors and Chinese citizens use VPNs to circumvent China's Great Firewall, which has blocked access to many websites, keywords and even IP addresses.

Government-approved VPNs have to register with the Chinese government and have to comply with data requests during investigations. However, cases of tourists being penalised for using non-government approved VPNs have not been reported, Akhtar said.

Don't get bent out of shape now

Is doing well or doing good the better response?

What is the meaning and origin of the expression 'get bent out of shape'? (K. Naresh, Chennai)

This is an expression that is frequently used in American English in informal contexts. When someone 'gets bent out of shape', he becomes very angry about something. The individual takes offence at something, and in the process, loses his cool. This doesn't necessarily mean that the person has a short temper. Something has occurred to make the person angry. We all get bent out of shape every now and then.

Mohan has always been known for his integrity. So, it didn't surprise anyone that when he saw the rampant corruption in his new department, he was so bent out of shape that he fired everyone.

When his best friend didn't invite him to the party, people thought Bala would be bent out of shape. But, he wasn't.

As for the exact origin of this expression, nobody is really sure.

What is the correct response to the question, 'How are you?' Is it 'I'm doing well' or 'I'm doing good'? (M. Aditi, Bengaluru)

A lot of people generally say, 'I'm fine, thank you' or just 'Fine, thank you'. In the past, it was common to hear people reply 'I'm doing well', but never 'I'm doing good'. The reply 'I'm doing good' was considered ungrammatical because in this sentence 'good' is being used as an adverb – according to the rules of grammar, 'good' can be used as an adjective (good boy/book), but not as an adverb (ran good/wrote good). In such sentences, 'well' was to be preferred over 'good' because it could be used an adverb. 'He ran well in the race' and 'He wrote well in the exam'. This was the standard explanation as to why 'I'm doing good' was unacceptable as a reply. In the past few decades, however, 'I'm doing good' is frequently heard as the standard response to 'How are you doing?' and 'How are you?' – especially, in American English in informal contexts. While those that believe that grammar rules must be followed shudder whenever they hear 'I'm doing good', there is nothing they can do about it. It has become a legitimate reply.

How is the word 'cupboard' pronounced? (Mukesh Khanna, Pune)

The first syllable is pronounced like the word 'cub', and the following 'oar' sounds like the 'a' in 'china'. The word is pronounced 'KUB-ed' with the stress on the first syllable. The 'p' and 'b' in the spelling are reduced to single sound – 'b'. We all know what a cupboard is. It is a piece of furniture with shelves which we use to store things – clothes, utensils, grocery, etc. Nowadays, of course, we have inbuilt cupboards and closets. When it was first used, the term 'cupboard' referred to a 'board' or a small side table on which one placed the cups, plates and cutlery. With the passage of time, the word took on a wider meaning.

Uddhav camp says rebels will be disqualified

Stepping up the offensive against the rebels, Aaditya Thackeray said the rebels lacked courage. At a rally in Kalina, Mr. Aaditya said, "Mr. Shinde and the others could have staged their rebellion somewhere in Maharashtra. Remember, the road from Mumbai airport to Vidhan Bhavan, the State Legislature Complex, goes via Worli [Mr. Aaditya's constituency]," he warned.

"Even if all Sena MLAs go over to the rebel camp, victory will still be of the Shiv Sena in the end. True Shiv Sainiks have not left the party. Uddhav Thackeray will remain CM for next 25

years," Mr. Aaditya said. "The BJP-ruled Centre, which ought to have given CRPF security to Kashmiri Pandits, are today giving security to the rebel MLAs. Their food bills run to ₹8 lakh to ₹9 lakh daily in a State [Assam] that is afflicted by floods. I feel bad that while flood-hit people are suffering, [rebel MLAs] are enjoying there," he said.

Reiterating his support for the Sena under Mr. Uddhav Thackeray, NCP chief Sharad Pawar, speaking in Delhi, said, "The NCP's line is clear. We will keep supporting CM Uddhav Thackeray till the end."

SP loses its Azamgarh and Rampur bastions

In Delhi, Durgesh Pathak of the AAP won the byelection to the Rajinder Nagar Assembly seat, which was vacated by Raghav Chadha of the AAP in March when he became a Rajya Sabha member.

The Congress candidate in the Mandar Assembly

byelection in Jharkhand, Shipriya Naha, defeated the BJP's Gangotri Kujur, by a margin of 23,690 votes.

The YSRCP candidate, Mekapati Vikram Reddy, won the byelection to the Atmakur seat in the Andhra Pradesh Assembly by 82,888 votes.

'China upgraded firepower along LAC'

Following the confrontation on the Kailash range on the south bank of Pangong Tso in August 2020 when India and China deployed tanks on the peaks at over 15,000 feet, the Indian Army too has issued a tender for the procurement of light tanks.

Similarly, air defence and airbases closer to the LAC have been upgraded, including blast pens and extended runways, an official source said citing inputs.

The People's Liberation Army (PLA) has developed heliports at Shigatse and Rudok and airbases have been upgraded with extended runways and blast pens at Gargunsh, Lhasa and Guangzhou, the source said.

In terms of long range firepower, the PLA has upgraded its artillery by replacing the towed howitzers with truck-mounted howitz-

ers having a range of 50 km. This gives better mobility, faster shoot and scoot ability and less deployment time, officials noted.

In addition, the PLA has deployed the PHL-3 Multi-Rocket Launch Systems (MRLS) with a range of over 100 km and has better targeting than earlier versions. This is a Chinese version based on the Russian Smerch MRLS, three regiments of which are in service with the Indian Army.

In the eastern sector, opposite Arunachal Pradesh, China has moved artillery guns within 50 km range from the LAC, the first source said.

Since the stand-off, India too has significantly expanded its military capability and augmented infrastructure on its side of the LAC.

Gujarat Police to probe Teesta, Sreekumar's role

Gujarat Anti-Terrorist Squad Deputy Inspector-General Deepan Bhadrani heads the SIT. Superintendent of Police Sunil Joshi and Deputy Commissioner of Police, Ahmedabad Crime Branch, Chaitanya Mandlik are members.

The police will collect the documents submitted by the three accused - Ms. Setalvad, Mr. Sreekumar, and former IPS officer Sanjiv Bhatt - in connection with the 2002 riots cases.

"The investigation is under way and we are procuring documents submitted by the accused before the Commission of Inquiry, SIT, formed by the Supreme Court to investigate 2002 riots cases, and different courts," said Mr. Mandlik.

He added that the affidavits and other documents were the main basis for the FIR lodged against the accused. The investigators are not ruling out the involvement of other people in creating false documents, using them in judicial processes to implicate people in cases of serious crimes such as communal riots.

"The FIR lodged by the DCB is based on the observations made by the Supreme Court in its judgment, which said, 'As a matter of fact, all those involved in such abuse of process need to be in the dock and proceeded with as per law,'" Mr. Mandlik said.

Ms. Setalvad and her NGO Citizens for Justice and Peace were co-petitioners with Zakia Jafri in the petition filed against the then Chief Minister Narendra Mo-

di and others in the Supreme Court alleging "larger conspiracy" during the 2002 communal riots in which more than 1,000 people were killed across the State.

Ms. Zakia Jafri's husband and former Congress MP Ehsan Jafri was killed during the riots in Gulberg Society massacre in which 70 people were killed.

Mr. Mandlik said Mr. Sreekumar and Ms. Setalvad were not "cooperating" with the police following their arrest.

The police have also begun the process of getting a transfer warrant for Mr. Bhatt's custody in connection with the FIR.

The FIR lodged by the police inspector of the DCB invoked Sections 468, 471 (forgery), 194 (giving or fabricating false evidence with intent to procure conviction of capital offence), 211 (institute criminal proceedings to cause injury), 218 (public servant framing incorrect record or writing with intent to save a person from punishment or property from forfeiture), and 120 (B) (criminal conspiracy) of the Indian Penal Code.

On Ms. Setalvad's allegation that she was roughed up and her apprehension about threat to life, the Crime Branch DCP said "the process was followed" and added that she was free to lodge a complaint before the court on her grievances.

After placing her under arrest on Sunday, the police took her for a medical check-up.

Should never forget dreadful period of Emergency: Modi

PM says the people of India re-established democracy in a democratic way

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday said today's youth and the coming generations should never forget the dreadful period of the Emergency, as an attempt had been made to crush the country's democracy.

"It was the month of June (1975) when Emergency was imposed. In that, all the rights were taken away from the citizens of the country. One among those rights was the 'right to life and personal liberty'... at that time an attempt was made to crush the democracy of India. The country's courts, every constitutional institution, the press, were put under control," he said during his "Mann Ki Baat" address.

The Prime Minister said the condition of censorship was such that nothing could be printed without approval. "I remember when famous singer Kishore Kumar refused to applaud the government, he was banned. His entry on the radio was done away with. But even after many attempts, thousands of arrests and atrocities on

lakhs of people, the faith of people of India in the democracy did not shake... the people of India got rid of the Emergency and re-established democracy in a democratic way," he said.

Mr. Modi said, "During the Emergency, I had the good fortune to have been a witness; to be a partner in the struggle of the countrymen, as a soldier of democracy."

Vaccine numbers

The Prime Minister said that close to 200 crore COVID-19 vaccine doses had been administered in the country so far, asking people to take the booster shot after the second dose.

"If it is time for a precaution dose after your second

dose, then you must take this third dose. Make your family members, especially the elderly, take a precaution dose," he said.

Highlighting the country's recent accomplishments in the space sector, Mr. Modi said one of them was the creation of an agency named In-Space. "Till a few years ago, in our country, in the space sector, no one even thought about start-ups. Today their number is more than a hundred... Chennai and Hyderabad have two start-ups - Agnikul and Skyroot. These start-ups are developing launch vehicles that will take small payloads into space. Through this, the cost of space launch is estimated to come down significantly," he said.

The Hyderabad-based Dhruva Space is working on high-technology solar panels for satellite deployer and satellites. "I also met Tanveer Ahmed of Digantara, another space start-up, who is trying to map waste in space. I have also given him a challenge that they should evolve work technology, which can solve the problem of waste

in space. Both Digantara and Dhruva Space are going to make their first launch from ISRO's launch vehicle on June 30," he said.

The Prime Minister said about 750 school students, mostly from small towns, were working on 75 satellites in the country.

With regards to the field of sports, Mr. Modi said Olympic gold medallist Neeraj Chopra won the gold in Kurland Games. He broke his own record in javelin throw.

"In the recently held Khelo India Youth Games too, our players set many records... 12 records have been broken in these games. Not only that, 11 records have been registered in the names of female players," he said.

On the cleanliness drive, Mr. Modi appreciated the efforts of local agencies, voluntary organisations and people in making efforts to clean the river 'Chitite Lui' in Aizawl, Mizoram. The polythene waste was used to build a road. Another such effort was made in Puducherry where organic waste was made into compost and the rest was recycled.

Modi interacts with Indian diaspora

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday said he was looking forward to "fruitful discussions" with world leaders on topical issues such as climate, energy, food security, counterterrorism, environment, gender equality and democracy as he arrived in Munich, Germany to attend the G7 Summit.

Mr. Modi is attending the summit, being held on June 26 and 27, following an invitation by German Chancellor Olaf Scholz. The summit is being hosted by Germany in its capacity as the chair of G7, a grouping of the world's seven richest nations.

"Landed in Munich to participate in the G-7 Summit. I look forward to fruitful discussions with world leaders during the Summit," Mr. Modi tweeted.

Addressing the Indian diaspora during a massive event at the Audi Dome indoor arena here, Mr. Modi said that democracy was in the DNA of every Indian.

"Forty-seven years ago, an attempt was made to hold that democracy hostage and crush it. Emergency is a black spot on India's vibrant democracy," Mr. Modi said, targeting the Congress Party.

"We Indians feel proud of our democracy wherever we live. Every Indian can say with pride that India is the mother of democracy," he said.

Ukraine crisis

"At the invitation of @Bundeskanzler Olaf Scholz, PM

@narendramodi arrives in Germany for the G7 Summit. Besides participating in @G7 discussions on climate, energy, food security, health, gender equality and more, PM will also hold several bilateral meetings on the sidelines," Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) spokesperson Arindam Bagchi said in a tweet.

The G7 leaders are expected to focus on the Ukraine crisis that has triggered geopolitical turmoil besides fuelling a global food and energy crisis.

"During the sessions of the Summit, I will be exchanging views with the G7 countries, G7 partner countries and guest International Organisations on topical issues such as environment, energy, climate, food security, health, counter-terrorism, gender equality and democracy," Mr. Modi said in a statement ahead of his visit.

Foreign Secretary Vinay Mohan Kwatra said on Friday that Mr. Modi would hold bilateral meetings and discussions with the leaders of the G7 and also the guest countries on the sidelines of the summit.

Besides India, Germany, the host of the G7 Summit, has also invited Argentina, Indonesia, Senegal and South Africa as guests for the summit to recognise the democracies of the global south as its partners.

Sanjay Raut chastises rebel camp for 'loyalty' remark

Sena MP claims that a section of rebel MLAs want to return

As Maharashtra's political turmoil triggered by inter-caste strife within the ruling Shiv Sena entered its sixth day on Sunday, Sena MP Sanjay Raut revealed that had the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) kept its promise of sharing the Maharashtra Chief Minister's post with his party for two-and-a-half years, then Sena chief Uddhav Thackeray himself would have put forward rebel Sena Minister Eknath Shinde's name as the Chief Minister.

Mr. Raut, who had earlier said that the Shiv Sena's doors were closed for Mr. Shinde and the rebel MLAs, also said that he was still in talks with a section of legislators holed up in Guwahati while hinting at the possibility that they would be taken into the Sena's fold if they returned to Mumbai.

At the same time, he chastised the rebel camp for sitting in Guwahati and teaching Mr. Uddhav Thackeray and the Sena in Maharashtra about loyalty to party founder Bal Thackeray.

"Sitting in Guwahati, do not preach to us about loyalty to Balasaheb Thackeray. Uddhav Thackeray has made it clear that the rebels cannot use his father's name. Why don't you [rebels with Mr. Shinde] use your father's name to start a new party? You claim you are Balasaheb's staunch followers, but such 'staunch followers' do

not stab the Sena in the back," he said, warning the rebels not to mislead people by claiming to be the 'real Shiv Sena'.

Earlier, Mr. Raut had tweeted that the rebels could not stay indefinitely in Guwahati and that they would soon have to come to Mumbai's 'Chowpaty'.

He accused the BJP of sponsoring hotel parties of rebel Sena MLAs who had joined Mr. Shinde in Guwahati while floods ravaged the north-eastern State of Assam.

Open dare

Challenging the MLAs in the Shinde camp, Mr. Raut said, "If you have the guts, then resign and show the courage to win elections from your respective constituencies. Even when [Union Minister and BJP leader] Narayan Rane exited the Sena, he resigned and contested elections," said Mr. Raut, expressing confidence that the Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA) government would survive.

Remarking that the rebellion of Mr. Shinde and the 40 or so MLAs with him was "no political earthquake", the Sena MP, in his column 'Rokhthok' in the party mouthpiece *Saamana*, said that the Sena had endured several such 'earthquakes' to emerge unscathed.

Stating that Mr. Shinde would have stood a better chance of becoming Maharashtra's Chief Minister had he remained in the party instead of revolting, Mr. Raut warned the rebel camp that the BJP was out to make 'slaves' of the 40 MLAs.

Pooh-poohing the BJP's claims of innocence in the ongoing political drama, the Sena leader said that if the latter claimed not to have a hand in sparking the crisis, then what was the need of such elaborate arrangements to keep the Sena rebel faction lodged in BJP-ruled States.

Observing that all those who revolted against the Sena - like Chhagan Bhujbal and Narayan Rane - saw their later political careers run into rough weather, Mr. Raut stressed that a split in the Sena's Legislative party did not translate into a split in the Shiv Sena as a whole.

Meanwhile, responding to Mr. Raut, BJP Maharashtra president Chandrakant Patil denied having any knowledge of a 'secret meeting' between rebel Mr. Shinde, Home Minister Amit Shah and Mr. Fadnavis in Gujarat's Vadodara.

'Silchar flood man-made; embankment breached'

Assam CM promises strong action against the miscreants

Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma on Sunday said the unprecedented flooding of Silchar town was a man-made disaster.

He also said relief material could not reach many of some 2.8 lakh marooned people in the southern Assam town, the nerve-centre of Barak Valley.

"Silchar's flood was man-made. It would not have happened had the embankment at Bethukandi not been breached by some miscreants," Mr. Sarma told journalists after visiting the flooded town for the second time in less than a week.

He assessed the situation partly in an inflated boat of the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) and partly by wading the flooded streets in Silchar, where the water rose up to 12 feet in some areas.

The Chief Minister said the culprits who left a gaping

hole in the Barak river embankment at Bethukandi, more than 3 km from the town, would be brought to book.

Lapses, if any, on the part of officials would also be probed, he said.

Mr. Sarma said the Cachar District Disaster Management Authority had issued an advisory but many residents did not take it seriously as the town had never seen such a flood.

Following complaints of irregular or partial distribu-

tion of relief, the Chief Minister instructed officials to help as many people as they can.

Clean drinking water has been one of the scarcest commodities in the town with many drinking the floodwater after boiling it on any floor or structure above the water level.

Many NGOs have issued appeals and launched fundraisers for procuring at least 1 lakh litres of potable water for the town's marooned people.

Dalbir Kaur, sister of Sarabjit Singh, dies

'Restoration of trust between States and Centre essential for GST system'

States should get direct taxation powers, extension of revenue guarantee, says chairman of the Congress Data Analytics Department

The GST Council is meeting in Chandigarh on Tuesday and Wednesday even as the tax regime completes five years in operation on June 30. Opposition parties and States have serious concerns regarding the continuation of the indirect tax regime premised on 'one nation, one tax, one market' principle. Praveen Chakravarty, chairman of the Congress Data Analytics Department, was an early critic of the GST (Goods and Services Tax) regime. He thinks restoration of trust between the States and the Centre is essential for the smooth continuation of the GST system. Edited excerpts:

You were sceptical when the GST regime was rolled out. You feel vindicated?

I wish I was proven wrong. My view on GST was shaped by my understanding of federalism, and by using an economic lens. Indian States are extremely diverse economically, apart from being politically diverse. GST was a misfit in India. India has pol-

itical parties that are confined to the boundaries of particular States. I understated the ill-effects of GST in my original critique. They have only exacerbated in the last five years, partly due to the Centre's other centralising measures that accompanied the implementation of GST. The trust deficit between the Centre and the States has grown. I would not deny the

fact that it is efficient. Efficiency comes at a certain cost though - political, social, and constitutional.

Will the GST system survive the current crisis?

The fact is that the country is half pregnant with the GST system, and we cannot go back. There are three issues that form the backdrop of the GST Council meeting this week. First is the complete breakdown of trust between the States and the Centre. Second is the Supreme Court order that said the Council's decisions are not binding on the States. Third is the lapsing of the revenue guarantee, which the Centre had promised the States for five years. I don't see GST will continue smoothly unless the trust issues are resolved,

and the revenue guarantee is extended. Everybody acknowledges the fact that the GST regime has not lived up to the hype and hope.

'One nation, one market' - how has that idea evolved through the past five years,

particularly through the pandemic?

The pandemic exposed GST's deficiencies. Had there been no GST, the States could have managed the situation better through their resource mobilisation and allocation. They ended up fighting with the Centre, and the Finance Minister invoked the Act of God principle to default on payments to them. Businesses are liking it for its efficiency. An economist would, however, not miss the point that its impact on the economy was not anywhere near the two percentage points (of growth) as was expected. The assumption that easy flow of goods across the country would boost growth did not turn out to be true. Maybe five years is early to make a judg-

ment on that; may be it will happen in the coming years.

Is there something that is happening in the Congress which championed GST while in power? Was this discussed at the Udaipur Chintan Shivir?

I cannot disclose what was discussed in Udaipur, but can tell you that I discuss this issue internally in the party, as allowed. We must ask for a reassessment, re-evaluation of the GST as it stands today. Yes, the UPA government championed the GST, and the then Gujarat CM who happens to be PM today opposed it. In my defence, in the week of the launch of the GST, I, along with the current Finance Minister of Tamil Nadu PTR (Palanivel Thiagarajan), who was then an MLA,

wrote a joint piece raising concerns.

Shall we say the views of the then PM were less accurate than the views of the then CM of Gujarat, when the idea of GST was taking shape?

The views of the current PM are less accurate than those of the current former PM. The notion that the crisis of GST is one of implementation is not true. GST implementation was shoddy, but the fundamental problem is that it is an economic square peg in the federal round hole. It would have been difficult for any government, and this government made it significantly worse, with a messy structure. I don't think even if the implementation had been smooth,

there would have been no contestations.

Did Indian political parties fail to comprehend what was coming?

Economists and technocrats were viewing it through the prism of efficiency alone. They failed to see what it does to federalism, when regional parties see that they have no taxation powers.

Do you think the current GST regime can be rescued by tweaking it?

Restoration of trust is the most fundamental challenge. In order to reverse the centralising direction of governance, the Centre should consider giving States powers of direct taxation that they have only in agriculture.

Sasikala begins roadshow in Tiruvallur

Release Setalvad and Sreekumar, says CPI(M)

'Arrest is an ominous threat to democratic-minded citizens'

The Communist Party of India (Marxist) on Sunday demanded withdrawal of the cases and release of social activist Teesta Setalvad, retired Indian Police Service officer R.B. Sreekumar and others.

"The Polit Bureau of the Communist Party of India (Marxist) condemns the arrest of Teesta Setalvad who fought relentlessly for justice for the victims of the 2002 Gujarat violence. Her arrest is an ominous threat to all democratic-minded citizens not to dare question the role of the state or the government under whose regime communal violence takes place. This is abhorrent to democratic rights of citizens," said the party in a statement.

The CPI(M) said, "However, the action of the Gujarat administration in her arrest has been enabled by the questionable verdict of the three-member Bench of the Supreme Court which has

justice for 16 years is described in unusual derogatory terms as keeping the 'pot boiling for ulterior design'," said the party.

Senior party leader Abhishek Manu Singhvi on Saturday had said that the Supreme Court judgment should not be politicised.

On Sunday, Mr. Singhvi had tweeted, "The charge by BJP spokespersons that Teesta Setalvad acted at the behest of Congress president Shri. Sonia Gandhi is wholly bogus and baseless. The Congress party condemns these allegations most forcefully. These allegations are in direct contempt of the Supreme Court's judgment."

Simranjit Singh Mann makes a comeback

SAD(A) leader defeats AAP in Sangrur

Punjab's ruling Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) had a major setback on Sunday as it lost the Lok Sabha byelection to the Sangrur seat.

Simranjit Singh Mann, a known radical Sikh leader of Shiromani Akali Dal (Amritsar) won the Sangrur Lok Sabha seat by securing 2,53,154 votes. He defeated his nearest rival of the AAP, Gurmial Singh, by 5,822 votes. Mr. Singh secured 2,47,332 votes.

The byelection is being seen as the first major test to ascertain the popularity of the three-month-old AAP government, which went into the Assembly polls earlier this year on the plank of its development work, and stern action against corruption, illegal mining and other "mafias" in the State.

Losing Sangrur is being seen as a big blow against the party, especially for

Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann, as the constituency is his home turf. The byelection was necessitated as the seat fell vacant after Mr. Mann contested and won from the Dhuri Assembly seat in the Assembly elections. Mr. Mann has won the Sangrur Lok Sabha seat twice, in 2014 and in 2019.

During the campaign, the Opposition cornered the AAP government on the deteriorating law and order situation, especially the rise in gangster-related crimes against the backdrop of the killing of Punjabi singer Sidhu Moosewala, and several other crimes.

The CM was targeted for being "remote-controlled" from Delhi by the party supremo, Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal.

BJP win in U.P. seats breaks myths

Muslim-Yadav family factor was attributed to SP's strength in Azamgarh

The Bharatiya Janta Party wrested the Samajwadi Party's strongholds of Azamgarh and Rampur as the Lok Sabha byelection results were declared on Sunday. In Azamgarh, in a first, Dinesh Lal Yadav 'Nirhau' of the BJP won a closely contested triangular contest by defeating Dharmendra Yadav of the SP by 8,679 votes.

In Rampur, Ghanshyam Singh Lodhi of the BJP defeated Asim Raja of the SP in a straight contest by over 42,192 votes. The bypolls were necessitated because Azamgarh and Rampur were vacated by SP president Akhilesh Yadav and senior party leader Azam Khan after they decided to retain their Assembly seats.

The victory is significant because it broke the myth of the Muslim-Yadav family factor that is said to work for

the SP consistently in Azamgarh. In 2014, SP patriarch Mulayam Singh won the seat, followed by Akhilesh Yadav in 2019.

Rampur, with around 58% Muslim population, was being seen as a cakewalk for Mr. Raja, a protégé of Azam Khan who came out of jail just before the polls on bail and made emotional appeals in favour of his confidant.

Addressing a press conference in Lucknow, Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath described the win as "the double victory of the double-engine government of the BJP".

The victory in the "challenging battles", he said, has a "far-reaching message for the 2024 Lok Sabha polls."

"This mandate is a reflection of the PM Narendra Modi's credo of Sabka Saath, Sabka Vikas, Sabka Prayas."

"People of Uttar Pradesh are not ready to support political parties which provide support to casteist and communal forces and shelter to the professional mafia," he added.

'Misused power' Azam Khan addressed a press conference after the counting, and held the BJP government responsible for the loss as it "misused the administration".

"It is the victory of *Thoktantra* (vindictive policies) over *Loktantra* (democracy)," he said, charging the police administration with not allowing the Muslim voters to come out and vote.

The Bahujan Samaj Party's role also proved crucial in both the seats. In Rampur, it did not field a candidate, while in Azamgarh, the party fielded Shah Alam, alias Guddu Jamali, who secured more than 29% of the votes.

The BJP "goons" had earlier attacked Mr. Barman and he sustained serious injuries in the incident.

Instances which "overturn" a State administration like breakdown of law and order caused by "spontaneous mass violence" or the second wave of the pandemic cannot be called the results of a "larger conspiracy" hatched at the highest level of political dispensation, the Supreme Court judgment in the Zakia Jafri case has held.

"The breakdown of law and order situation in the State, attributable to the alleged inaction of the [State] duty holders, owing to spontaneous mass violence cannot be a safe measure to infer as being a part of a criminal conspiracy at the highest level of political dispensation..." a three-judge Bench led by Justice A.M. Khanwilkar held.

The judgment observed that "larger conspiracy" can be alleged only if there is clear evidence to show a "meeting of minds" at the highest level to commit or promote the commission of a crime.

"To make out a case of larger criminal conspiracy, it is essential to establish a link



indicating a meeting of minds of the concerned persons for commission of the crime(s), it noted.

With this, the court made it clear that the onus of proof is on the person who alleges the existence of a "larger conspiracy".

'No tangible material' In Gujarat, the court concluded that the inaction or lack of effective measures taken by officials *per se* did not imply criminal conspiracy on the part of the State authorities which led to the 2002 violence.

There was also no "tangible material suggestive of a chain or any perceivable link or connection with the unfolding of mass violence

across the State".

The judgment has created a buffer for top political leaders in power who may have to bear the brunt of allegations of "state-sponsored breakdown of law and order situation".

The verdict also endeavours to insulate the highest levels of political dispensation from the failures of a few possibly inept or overworked officials whose actions may not have helped to contain the breakdown of law and order on the ground.

"Inaction or failure of some officials of one section of the State administration cannot be the basis to infer a preplanned criminal conspiracy by the authorities of the State government or to term it a state-sponsored crime (violence) against the minority community," the court held.

The judgment gains significance in the background of recent communal violence in several States.

Pandemic attack The court has said that a "larger conspiracy" cannot be readily inferred merely

on the basis of the inaction or failure of the State administration. On the other hand, the State administration may have simply been overrun by the enormity of suddenness of events. The court pointed to the recent pandemic attack as an example.

"The overrunning of State administration is not an unknown phenomenon. It has been witnessed all over the globe during the second wave of pandemic, where the countries with even best of medical facilities crumbled and their management skills were overrun under the pressure. Can it be said to be a case of hatching of a criminal conspiracy?" Justice Khanwilkar asked.

Further, the court said, breakdown of law and order for a short duration cannot take the colour of a constitutional crisis.

"There must be credible evidence regarding State-sponsored breakdown of law and order situation; not spontaneous or isolated instances or events of failure of State administration to control the situation," the court noted.

Meghalaya vows action on attack

Meghalaya Home Minister Lakhmen Rymbui has said that the miscreants responsible for attacking two students from Kerala on June 24 would be brought to book.

The two students from the Central University of Kerala have been interning with a Shillong-based NGO for a month. They were assaulted by some 30 motorcycle-borne youth in Jaiaw, a locality dominated by the Khasi tribal people. Two others, including a traffic police constable, were also assaulted.

Mr. Rymbui said the police were monitoring some critical areas of the capital. He denied that the authorities were turning a blind eye to assault cases that had become quite frequent. "Registering of FIRs means action is being taken. Many people have been arrested and charge sheets have been filed in such incidents in the past," he said.

Should India worry about endemicity of COVID-19?

'At the moment we have to calibrate when we have to launch an outbreak-like response... vaccination should remain a public health activity'

Has COVID-19 become endemic or not, that is the question. While the world over, the debate rages on whether COVID-19 has reached an endemic phase, in India there seems to be broad consensus that it has in the country, though epidemiologists might have taken various paths to get there.

Interestingly, another question, whether endemicity is significant at all in the current context, is also creating this wave of discussion among professionals, and might even take over the debate in the not so near future.

Dr. Jacob John, retired Professor of virology, Christian Medical College, Vellore, says the terms endemic and epidemic are based on patterns, and no one has attempted yet to post numbers that could establish the stage the SARS-CoV-2 virus is at currently. However, he uses a comparison with the numbers of the past, more a rule of thumb criteria to argue

that the infection has entered the endemic stage in India.

Considering the seven-day average of cases during the peak of the epidemic, the daily numbers have not crossed the 10% of that figure since the decline in numbers began, he points out. Despite the rise in cases in the past few days, the number has remained below 10% of the seven-day average of cases during the peak of Omicron, Dr. John says.

"If you look at Bharat COVID-19 or World-o-meter, the disturbances in the flat line since the drop have been very minor," he says, adding that similar to what happens in an epidemic, the numbers have been going up only in certain cities in Maharashtra, Kerala, Delhi and Tamil Nadu. "It is still virtually a flat line." Even when a disease is in the endemic stage, there can be seasonal outbreaks, and the spike in cases that a few cities in India are seeing now, could be equated to that, he reasons.

Dr. Chandrakant Lahariya, epidemiologist and public policy and health systems specialist, treads another path to arrive at his conclusion. Endemic and pandemic are all academic terms, not dependent solely on scientific parameters, he says. He draws attention away from the endemic-pandemic binary to a more experiential angle. "We know the extent of social and economic impact that COVID-19 had on the world. So, I believe

that the idea is for societies to agree that the infection is an acceptable risk, as some countries are already doing so, despite the numbers going up. None of these countries are saying the disease is endemic, but they are saying life is returning to normal."

Dr. Lahariya also says it is his firm belief that it is irrelevant to India to debate endemicity or not of the virus in the country. "We should approach it from the practical position of 'acceptable risk' - of whether or not it is disrupting social and economic life in the country." India has reached a stage where the virus is not creating great havoc in terms of death or morbidity. "Three years down the line, a nation could look back and mark the point of time in which it turned endemic, but it is not logical or practical to look for these signs now," he explains.

Individual challenge

While he advances the view that the disease is no longer a population-level public health challenge, but rather an individual one, and recommends that our responses change appropriately, once again professionals are split in their opinion on this too. While Dr. Lahariya recommends protection of the vulnerable, continued economic surveillance, tracking the parameters (but don't worry) and COVID-19 appropriate behaviour, he believes that the onus has moved on to the individual, from the

health system.

"I agree with the view that endemic or not, our action right now must be linked to where we are in terms of vaccination coverage (public health coverage), and continuing surveillance," says Dr. Prabhdeep Kaur, Deputy Director, ICMR National Institute of Epidemiology, Chennai. "This virus is fascinating in terms of its evolution, it keeps springing surprises on us. It is not like anything we have read in our textbooks."

At present, she says, COVID-19 does not conform to the textbook definition - by being present all over the world, though it waxes and wanes. That is probably why, she reasons, epidemiologists find themselves ranged on different points of the endemicity spectrum.

"The point is if we know that a disease in a community is present at a certain level, we do not have to react to it. There are different thresholds for different diseases and they also may be seasonal thresholds, but we have not been able to estab-

lish the threshold for COVID-19, because of several reasons - including changing practices for testing and surveillance. At the moment we have to calibrate when we have to launch an outbreak-like response," she adds.

COVID will continue to remain a disease of importance that has the ability to cause outbreaks, Dr. Kaur explains, listing why she believes vaccination should continue to be a public health activity.

If we fail to do this, there is potential to cause great damage in terms of mortality and morbidity. Dr. John says: "Somewhat vaccination in India seems to have lost steam along the way. People are now asking why vaccinate when the peak is over. And as far as the government goes, the outreach and public education activity on why a booster dose is required, has not been sufficient. There is a difference between individual vaccine for averting risk, and a population-based vaccine. We still have to focus on the latter."

Centre asks firms to arrange Tricolour

Govt. to start 'Har Ghar Tiranga' drive

The Centre is set to launch a large-scale campaign to encourage Indians to fly the National Flag at their homes to mark the 75th Independence Day and has reached out to manufacturers and e-commerce sites to boost the availability of the Tricolour, according to officials aware of the programme.

As part of the *Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav*, the Culture Ministry is planning on celebrating August 11 to 17 as "Independence Week" across the country, Culture Secretary Govind Mohan said. During the week, the 26 crore households in the country would be encouraged to hoist the Tricolour as part of the 'Har Ghar Tiranga' campaign. Mr. Mohan said the Ministry had been in touch with textile manufacturers to make sure the production of the flag was adequate. He added that meetings with e-tailers such as Amazon and Flipkart were being held, to make sure these sites would be a platform to buy flags.

The Ministry was in talks with States and Union Territories to coordinate the programme as well, with some States like Maharashtra already coming out with their plans, he said. The Government-e-Marketplace (GeM) portal, through which Government Departments and Ministries procure pro-

ducts, had also written to Ministries that they could place orders for flags for their offices through the portal.

On the demand side of the plan, Mr. Mohan said an awareness campaign to inspire individuals to hoist the national flag would be launched in July. The campaign would be rolled out in mid-July in railway stations, airports and Metro stations as well as at the panchayat-level in rural areas. A song by renowned musicians had also been commissioned.

In order to facilitate the campaign, the Union Home Ministry had last year amended the Flag Code, which earlier only allowed hand-woven or hand-spun flags to be made, to allow flags to be polyester and machine-made. According to two sources, the aim of the campaign was to inspire people, rather than carry out a distribution drive.

From July 1, Himachal to buy back single-use plastic

The government will pay students ₹75 for a kg of single-use plastic items they deposit with the school

As the Centre has decided to ban the use of single-use plastic from July 1, the hill State of Himachal Pradesh is all set to kick-start a buy-back scheme in schools and colleges to purchase the single-use plastic items from students in a bid to instil a sense of environment preservation by "catching them young".

Under the novel scheme, the students would be encouraged to bring single-use plastic items from their home and deposit it with the school, for which they will be paid ₹75 a kg by the government.

"Across the State, we have 3,000 eco-clubs in schools and in 100 colleges under the National Green Corps programme - these eco-

clubs are an association of student-teachers that work to inculcate environmental awareness and protection. As a pilot project, we will start the buy-back scheme in 100 schools from July 1. Later, we will scale it up and implement the scheme in all the schools and colleges through the eco-clubs. We will pay the students ₹75 a kg for the single-use plastic items they bring. The purpose is to catch the students in their early years and teach them about environmental conservation. We believe that once a habit towards environment protection is inculcated during childhood it could stay lifelong." Lalit Jain, Director, Environment, Science-Technology and Member Secretary, Himachal Pradesh Council for

Science, Technology and Environment (HIMCOSTE), told *The Hindu*.

The HIMCOSTE is the State nodal agency for the National Green Corps - Eco-club Programme of the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change of Government of India - and is

implementing the national scheme in 3,000 eco-club schools and 100 colleges in Himachal Pradesh. Besides the students, the scheme also aims to involve teachers, school management committees and parents by creating awareness surrounding the ill-effects of

plastic waste at the district-level through the eco-club schools, covering both rural and urban schools.

"The single-use plastic items collected from the schools would then be handed over to the Public Works Department and this plastic will be used in bitumen to construct roads in the State. The roads built with plastic-bitumen are durable and long-lasting, besides it would help to dispose of the waste plastic," said Mr. Jain.

At Senior Secondary School in Shimla district's Theog, Deepak Sharma, in charge of the school eco-club, is enthused by the new scheme to be launched. "We are hopeful that monetary assistance offered by the government will motivate students and teachers to bring

the single-use plastic items to school for their disposal. At our school, we have been making students and the local community aware of the ill-effects of plastic, single-use plastic in particular. To curtail plastic use, we encourage the use of steel bottles for carrying drinking water to the school. We have already been organising inter-house competitions in the school. In the first week of June, the students held an awareness rally at Theog market to highlight the dangers of plastic on the environment, conveying the proper use of plastic and avoiding its littering. Making use of social media platforms, we show students motivational videos on nature conservation and biodiversity."

Odisha to install siren to caution elephant movement in forest

Officials have been deployed to assess its operability

The Forest Department in Odisha is experimenting with a siren system, which would go off automatically sensing elephant herds crossing the National Highway to reduce human-elephant encounters.

"We in association with a

non-government organisation have started a pilot project on siren system to alert traffic to elephant movement. The system has been installed at two places at Ratsingha and Haldihabahal," said Dhenkanal Divisional Forest officer Prakash Chand Gogineni.

Mr. Gogineni said, "The Forest Department officials have been deployed at two places to assess its operability and how seamless it can work to prevent encounters with wild elephants."



Steps are being taken to prevent elephant-human encounters.

"The siren system detects elephant herds approaching National Highway by its infrared sensor system. There is an in-built programme to

identify jumbos from their sizes and other attributes. Once detected, the siren would go off alerting traffic from both sides," he said.

"We have found the system working when elephants were crossing NH. However, we will carry out overall assessment. We will evaluate how the system is responding to elephant herds and single elephant during crossing of roads," said the Dhenkanal DFO.

As cropping season has begun, wild elephants would

start coming out from forests. The Dhenkanal forest division has identified five crossing points for elephants. Invariably, elephant herds cross NH two to three times in week. There are chances of elephants getting collided with speeding vehicles. Sometimes, people riding two-wheelers bump into elephant herds.

Similarly, the Khadi Village Industries Commission is implementing apiculture programme to keep elephants at bay in neighbour-

ing Angul district. In cooperation with Athmallik Forest Division, about 100 bee boxes have been set up at border of Laxmipur village in Angul district. Marauding elephants stray into the village frequently damaging large crop areas. Sometimes, human-elephant encounters result in human casualties. Elephants are expected to be stung by bees if their boxes are hit. It would drive elephants back. CCTV cameras have been installed to capture reaction of elephants.

Russia strikes Kyiv as G7 summit opens

One killed, 6 injured as missiles damage residential buildings and kindergarten in the Ukrainian capital

Russia shattered weeks of relative calm in the Ukrainian capital with long-range missiles fired toward Kyiv early Sunday, an apparent Kremlin show-of-force as Western leaders meet in Europe to strengthen their military and economic support of Ukraine.

Kyiv Mayor Vitali Klitschko said the missiles hit at least two residential buildings, and killed one person and injured six others, including a seven-year-old girl and her mother.

"The Russians hit Kyiv again. Missiles damaged an apartment building and a kindergarten," said Andriy Yermak, head of the President's administration.

Mr. Klitschko told journalists he thought the airstrikes were "maybe a symbolic attack" ahead of a NATO summit in Madrid that starts on Tuesday.

A former commander of U.S. forces in Europe said the strikes also were a signal to the leaders of G7 meeting on

Sunday in Germany.

As Europe's biggest land conflict since Second World War entered its fifth month, the Western alliance supporting Kyiv was starting to show signs of strain as leaders fret about the growing economic cost, including surging food and energy prices.

'United front'

U.S. President Joe Biden called the attacks "barbarism" after he arrived in Germany for the Group of Seven summit.

British Prime Minister Boris Johnson said the West needed to maintain a united front against Russian President Vladimir Putin.

"In order to protect that unity, in order to make it work, you've got to have really, really honest discussions about the implications of what's going on, the pressures that individual friends and partners are feeling," he told reporters.

"But the price of backing down, the price of allowing Putin to succeed, to hack off huge parts of Ukraine, to

continue with his programme of conquest, that price will be far, far higher."

Life had been returning to normal in Kyiv after fierce resistance held off Russian advances in the early phase of the war, although air raid sirens regularly sound across the city. There had been no major strikes on Kyiv since June.

Mr. Klitschko said that Sunday's strike had partially destroyed a nine-storey apartment building and caused a fire.

"There are people under the rubble," Mr. Klitschko said. "They have pulled out a seven-year-old girl. She is alive. Now they're trying to rescue her mother."

Russia denies targeting civilians, but Ukraine and the West accuse Russian forces of war crimes in a conflict that has killed thousands, sent millions fleeing the Ukraine and destroyed cities.

The strategic eastern battlefield city of Sievierodoneck fell to pro-Russian forces on Saturday after Ukrainian troops retreated.

The fall of Sievierodoneck is a major defeat for Kyiv as it seeks to keep control of the eastern Donbas region, a key military objective for the Kremlin.

The war has had a huge impact on the global economy and European security, driving up gas, oil and food prices, pushing the EU to reduce reliance on Russian energy and prompting Finland and Sweden to seek NATO membership.

The fall of Sievierodoneck – once home to more than 1,00,000 people but now a wasteland – transforms the battlefield in the east after weeks in which Moscow's huge advantage in firepower had yielded only slow gains.

Russia's Interfax news agency, citing separatist fighters, said pro-Russian forces had also entered Lysychansk across the river.

Russian missiles struck near the central Ukrainian city of Cherkasy on Sunday, killing one person and hitting a bridge that helps connect western regions with eastern battle zones, officials said.

Iran launches rocket into space ahead of nuclear talks

Washington calls the move 'unhelpful', warns of sanctions

Iranian state television said on Sunday that Tehran had launched a solid-fuelled rocket into space, drawing a rebuke from Washington ahead of the expected resumption of stalled talks over Tehran's tattered nuclear deal with world powers.

It's unclear when or where exactly the rocket was launched, but the announcement came after satellite photos showed preparations at Imam Khomeini Spaceport in Iran's rural Semnan province, the site of Iran's frequent failed attempts to put a satellite into orbit.

State-run media aired dramatic footage of the blastoff against the backdrop of heightened tensions over Tehran's nuclear programme, which is racing ahead under decreasing international oversight.

Iran had previously acknowledged that it planned multiple tests for the satellite-carrying Zuljanah rock-

et, named for the horse of Imam Hussein, the grandson of the Prophet Muhammad. It was not immediately clear whether Iran successfully launched the satellite carrier into its intended orbit.

The White House said it was aware of Iran's announcement and described such actions as "unhelpful and destabilising." It said it was committed to using sanctions and other measures to prevent further advances in Iran's ballistic missile programme.

The news comes after the European Union's foreign policy chief, Josep Borrell,

traveled to Tehran in a push to resuscitate negotiations over Iran's nuclear programme. Several sticking points remain, including Tehran's demand that Washington lift terrorism sanctions on its paramilitary Revolutionary Guard.

Mr. Borrell said that talks over the nuclear deal would resume in a Persian Gulf country in the coming days, with Iranian media reporting that Qatar would likely host the negotiations.

Former President Donald Trump withdrew the U.S. from the nuclear deal in 2018 and reimposed sanctions on Iran. Tehran responded by ramping up its nuclear work and now enriches uranium closer to weapons-grade levels.

In a further escalation that limits international oversight into its nuclear program, Iran removed over two dozen International Atomic Energy Agency cameras from its nuclear sites this month.

At least 21 dead in South African club, cause not yet known: police

At least 21 teenagers, the youngest possibly just 13, died after a night out at a township club in South Africa, in a tragedy whose cause remains unclear.

Many are thought to have been students celebrating the end of their high-school exams.

There were no visible wounds on the bodies. Officials have ruled out a stam-

pede as a possible cause and said autopsies would determine if the deaths could be linked to poisoning.

Crowds of people, including parents whose children were missing, gathered on Sunday outside the club where the tragedy happened in the city of East London, while mortuary vehicles collected the bodies.

Senior government officials rushed to the southern city. "It's a terrible scene,"

Police Minister Bheki Cele told reporters.

The provincial government of Eastern Cape said eight girls and 13 boys had died. Seventeen were found dead inside the club. The rest died in hospital.

"Forensic (investigators) will take samples and test to see if there was any poisoning of any sort," Unathi Binqose, a safety government official, said, adding the bar was overcrowded.

G7 proposes \$600-bn global infra plan to rival China

The G7 group on Sunday announced an attempt to compete with China's formidable Belt and Road Initiative by raising \$600 billion for global infrastructure programmes in poor countries.

The Partnership for Global Infrastructure and Investment, unveiled with fanfare by U.S. President Joe Biden and G7 allies from Canada, Germany, Italy, Japan and the European Union, aims to fill a huge gap left as communist China uses its

economic clout to stretch diplomatic tentacles into the furthest reaches of the world.

Mr. Biden said the target was for the U.S. to bring \$200 billion to the table, with the rest of the G7 another \$400 billion by 2027.

Funding the kinds of projects that China currently dominates – everything from roads to harbours in far-flung corners of the world – is not "aid or charity," Mr. Biden said.

Highlighting the geostrategic thinking behind the G7

plan, Mr. Biden said such projects "deliver returns for everyone, including the American people and the people of all our nations."

This is "a chance for us to share our positive vision for the future" and for other countries to "see for themselves the concrete benefits of partnering with democracies," he said.

European Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen echoed this, saying "it is up to us to give a positive, powerful investment impulse to the world, to show our

partners in the developing world that they have a choice."

Although China was not referred to by name, the rivalry loomed large over the leaders' presentation, a re-launch of a first attempt at a Western infrastructure fund that Biden laid out during last year's G7 summit in Britain.

Private firms in key role

Unlike China's state-run BRI initiative, the proposed G7 funding would depend largely on private companies be-

ing willing to commit to massive investments and is therefore not guaranteed.

Meanwhile, the world powers on Sunday agreed to ban gold exports from Russia, at a G7 meeting designed to take fresh concerted action to deplete Moscow's war chest.

They are seeking to close ranks for Ukraine against Russia's invasion while grappling with the intensifying global fallout of the war.

"We have to stay together," Mr. Biden told German Chancellor Olaf Scholz.

Fuel price hike squeezes Sri Lankans

This comes amid U.S. officials' visit aimed at alleviating the island's economic crisis

Sri Lanka hiked fuel prices on Sunday, creating further pain for ordinary people as officials from the U.S. arrived for talks aimed at alleviating the island's dire economic crisis.

Ceylon Petroleum Corporation (CPC) said it raised the price of diesel, used widely in public transport, by 15% to 460 rupees a litre while upping petrol 22% to 550 rupees.

The announcement came a day after Energy Minister Kanachana Wijesekera said there would be an indefinite delay in getting new shipments of oil.

Mr. Wijesekera said oil due last week had not turned

up while shipments scheduled to arrive next week would also not reach Sri Lanka due to "banking" reasons.

Mr. Wijesekera apologised to motorists and urged them not to join long queues outside pumping stations.

Many have left their vehicles in queues hoping to top up when supplies are restored.

Official sources said remaining fuel supply was sufficient for about two days, but that authorities were sav-

ing it for essential services.

A delegation from the United States Treasury and the State Department arrived for talks to "explore the most effective ways to support Sri Lankans in need", the country's Embassy in Colombo said.

"As Sri Lankans endure some of the greatest economic challenges in their history, our efforts to support economic growth and strengthen democratic institutions have never been more critical," U.S. Ambassador Julie Chung said in a statement.

The Embassy said it had committed \$158.75 million in new financing in the past two weeks to help Sri Lankans.

Prince Charles accepted cash from Qatar: report

His office says 'got charity donations'

Prince Charles' office has denied there was any wrongdoing in the heir to the British throne accepting bags full of cash as charity donations from a Qatari politician.

The *Sunday Times* said the Prince was given a total of €3 million by Sheikh Hamad bin Jassim bin Jaber Al Thani, the former Prime Minister of Qatar. It said the money was handed over to Prince Charles at private meetings between 2011 and 2015 – on one occasion in a suitcase, and on another in shopping bags from London's Fortnum & Mason department store.

The newspaper said the money was deposited into the accounts of the Prince of Wales's Charitable Fund. It did not allege that anything illegal was done.

Prince Charles' office, Clarence House, said in a

statement that the donations "were passed immediately to one of the Prince's charities who carried out the appropriate governance and have assured us that all the correct processes were followed."

The charitable fund told the newspaper it had verified "that the donor was a legitimate and verified counterparty... and our auditors signed off on the donation after a specific enquiry during the audit. There was no failure of governance."

Second day of protests over U.S. abortion ruling

8 States impose ban on the procedure

Abortion rights defenders fanned out across America on Saturday for a second day of protest against the Supreme Court's thunderbolt ruling, as State after conservative State moved swiftly to ban the procedure.

The deeply polarised country grappled with a new level of division: between States that will now or soon deny the right to abortion, enshrined since 1973, and those that still allow it.

A few thousand people thronged the streets on Saturday outside the fenced-off Supreme Court in Washington, in hot summer weather, carrying signs that read "War on women, who's next?" and "No uterus. No opinion."

"What happened yesterday is indescribable and disgusting," said Mia Stagner, 19, a political science major

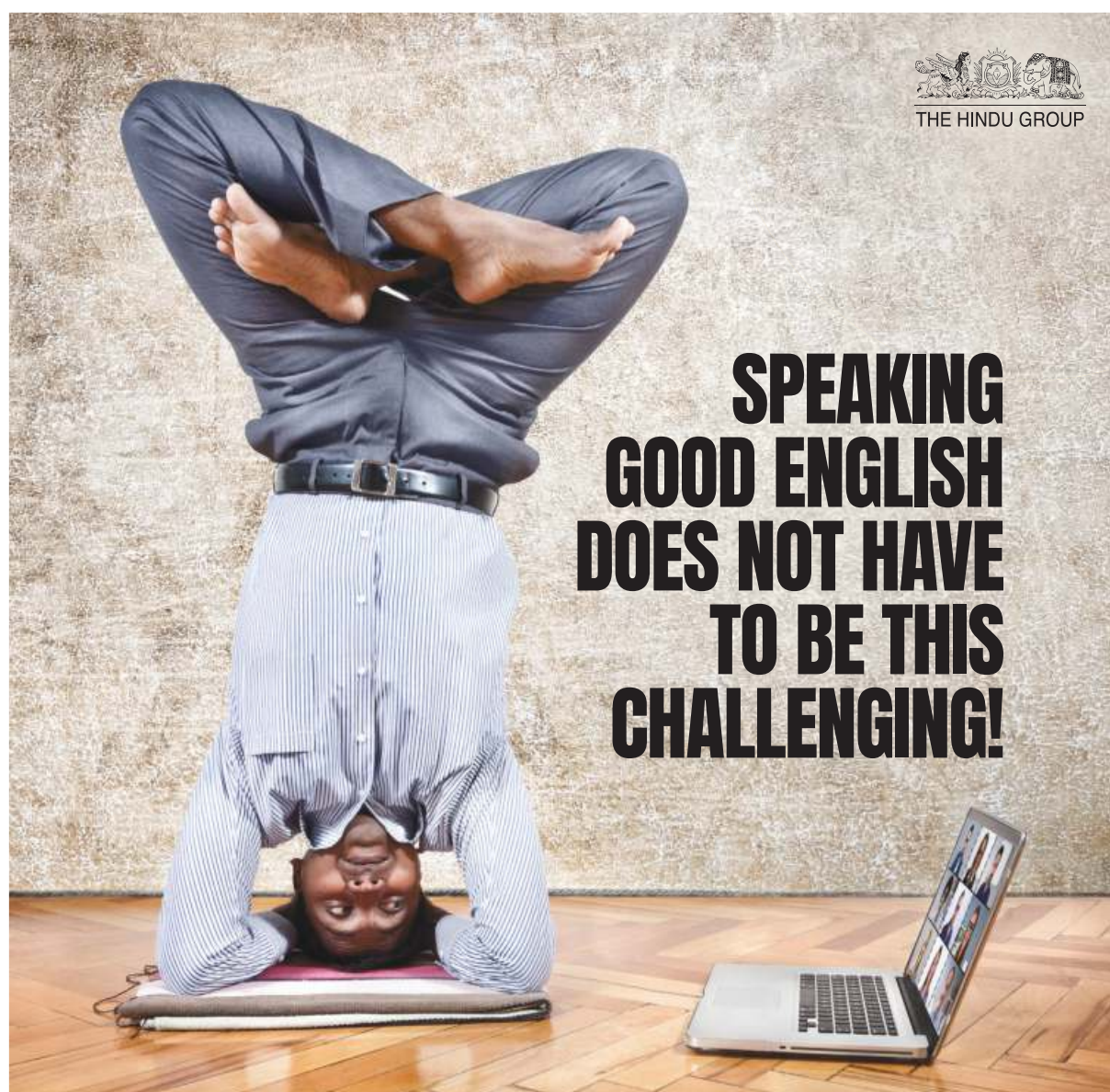
in college. Demonstrations also took place in Los Angeles, with dozens of smaller rallies from coast to coast.

At least eight right-leaning States imposed immediate bans on abortion – with a similar number to follow suit in coming weeks.

Fuelling the mobilisation, many now fear that the Supreme Court might next set its sights on rights like same-sex marriage and contraception.

Women in States that severely restrict abortion or outlaw it altogether will either have to continue with their pregnancy, undergo a clandestine abortion, obtain abortion pills, or travel to another State where it remains legal.

But "most women don't have the time of day or the financial resources to travel across state lines to get an abortion," Mikayla Marcum, a 23-year-old said.

VIDYA BALA

Q. I am 60 years old. I retired from a PSU seven months back and have a kitty in NPS (auto choice). In addition, I have lump sum retirement funds which I have/propose to invest in safe options like SCSS/PMVVY/RBI floating rate bond and MIS, etc. I will have some surplus left after the above. As I have been getting good and safer returns from my NPS account, I do not wish to exit it in full. Is it possible to buy annuity worth 40% of the amount and reinvest balance 60% in NPS with same or different PRAN? What will be tax implication if above route is possible? I have the option of buying annuity directly from my retirement lump sum fund but I wish to avoid that as it will attract GST.

VIVEK RAJU SAXENA

A. If you had applied for continuation of NPS account or deferment of lumpsum withdrawal at least 15 days before your retirement, you could have continued with same PRAN as detailed here: <https://www.npscra.nsdl.co.in/nps-exit-option.php>

But you can still open a new account and contribute and also claim tax deduction as is the case with regular NPS. However, make sure you get these points right: one, make sure you have sufficient sources of monthly cash flow through other incomes. Two, your equity allocation should not be high as it is possible that you may not keep this invested for too long. Three, from our understanding, if you invest this afresh, then you will need to commute another 40% again with an annuity, when you withdraw.

And the annuity income will be taxable. Four, you will have a lock in of 3 years. Please check these points before you invest. Finally, I don't think paying tax should come in the way of buying some immediate annuity plans as long as the plan is a good one.

Also, the other option is for you to go with low-risk debt funds in categories such as corporate bond funds or banking & PSU debt funds if you want the money to grow and yet have liquidity.

If you need income, then you can use ultra-short debt funds in addition to the above and do a systematic withdrawal plan.

Q. I am doing investments of around ₹1.2 lakh per year consisting of ₹70,000 in LIC and ₹50,000 in HDFC tax saving scheme. My monthly income is ₹65,000. My queries are as follows: Recently a friend told me that if we do investments that are non-taxable even then we need to pay tax on the interest on the total sum at time of maturity. Is this true? For example, if I am investing ₹50,000 in HDFC policy (tax-free) for 5 years. Maturity of policy date is 10 years and I get ₹9 lakh after 10 years. So, will this ₹9 lakh be added to my taxable income for that year and I have to pay tax on it again? Second, I want to buy a house 2 years from now. How should I do my investments so that I have at least ₹10 lakh in hand in 2 years.

HARSHIKA CHAUDHARY

A. We are assuming both the policies you are mentioning are money back policies - either ULIPs or traditional ones. The amount you receive from such policies are tax free under Section 10(10D) of the Income Tax Act, 1961. However, in case you are invested in tax-saving mutual fund (called ELSS), then the profit will be taxed as capital gain at 10%. If you are young, our advice would be that you don't get into too many money-back policies.

Their returns are abysmal. You are better off going with tax-saving mutual funds and invest other savings (outside of tax saving) in equity index funds or ETFs.

On saving withing 2 years - the time frame is not sufficient to take any risks. Hence, it is best to invest in bank FDs - perhaps with small finance banks that give higher interest or go with short duration debt funds. Assuming you do get moderate return of 7% you will need to invest ₹40,000 per month at least to get there.

Q. I am 21 and I have some savings. Where can I invest it? Is post office a good option? What are the different savings schemes available at post office? What returns can be expected after the end of 4 to 5 years.

BHARATHI JK

A. Post office recurring and time deposits offer anywhere between 5.5% (1 year) to 6.7% (for 5 years) and this is not attractive for a young investor like you.

You can start with PPF, which you can invest through major banks as well, if you are looking at long term investment. PPF offers 7.1% at present that this will keep changing when rates change. At present you can expect it to go up but it may also come down in future.

It is still among the better returning government scheme options. It also gives you tax deduction, in case you are in a job and have income that is taxable. If you will take some risks and willing to wait for minimum of 7 years, then there are also mutual funds that you can look at. Doing a SIP in a Nifty based index equity fund is a good way to start. For shorter durations like 2-3 years, use short term debt funds.

Q. In a response to an earlier query that appeared in this column, it was stated that there is some risk in placing FDs with small finance banks. As deposits with such banks are covered by insurance up to ₹5 lakh what other risk is expected.

T K KANNAN

A. There is safety in the form of insurance for up to ₹5 lakh as you have pointed out. But as a class of banks, small finance banks can be riskier than traditional banks given that their mandate is to lend primarily to priority sectors. And such sectors are fraught with risk of default. Hence their risk profile is typically higher than regular FDs. But as long as you are investing under ₹5 lakh in such banks and have sufficient corpus in large systemically important banks (SBI, HDFC Bank, ICICI Bank) then it is indeed fine.

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Decrypting the CRYPTO MYTH

Bitcoin and its peers fail to deliver on any of the promises boasted on the packaging — be it security or anonymity

Bitcoin and other cryptocurrencies are generally perceived as assets, currencies or both. As impactful as 'cryptocurrencies' have been as tools of speculation in current financial markets, the narrative behind the existing technology holds the key to breaking it and most fads down.

Cryptocurrencies are computer-managed ledger entries that can function as money if someone is willing to value these entries as money and use them in transactions.

Cryptocurrencies inherently possess no value whatsoever, but are valued at high prices. The reason why cryptocurrencies are the behemoth instruments seen today lies in the narratives propagated surrounding them.

The primary narrative which appeals to most cryptocurrency enthusiasts is the idea that cryptocurrencies, due to some advanced technical brili-

ance, excel as a currency compared with a dull old currency note.

Moreover, the benefits boasted by Bitcoin (the most prominent cryptocurrency) promoters are anonymity and security. Additionally, the use case of Bitcoin (and other cryptocurrencies) involves it being used as a currency to purchase goods and services.

Claims of untraceability have been falsified in multiple instances in which governments have traced, recovered stolen Bitcoins

Finally, Bitcoin is promoted as a financial asset which can be used as a storehouse of value analogous to gold.

Furthermore, Bitcoin is said to function in the same vein as gold because it is limited in numbers and not a productive asset.

As we have seen in recent times, Bitcoin and its peers fail to deliver on any

of the promises so proudly boasted on the packaging.

For a currency to be a viable medium of exchange, the primary requirement is for it to be relatively stable in value.

Bitcoin has spectacularly failed in this respect, falling more than 56% over six months (at the time of writing this piece).

Moreover, it has also been unable to weather an interest rate increase of merely 1.75%, while the U.S. Federal Reserve has promised further stiff hikes to curb inflation.

Bitcoin vs gold

Gold, in comparison with Bitcoin, has been able to hold its own. Gold has been a mainstay in human society for millennia. However, like Bitcoin, it also derives a significant portion of value from the price people place on it (apart from the other use cases gold has, for example in electronics).

Bitcoin proponents' claim of supposed anonymity and untraceability

has been falsified in multiple instances in which governments have tracked criminal activity and recovered stolen Bitcoins.

An added defence by Bitcoin enthusiasts is quoting British economist Henry Dunning Macleod's idea of Gresham's law, which states that bad money (or money with lower intrinsic value) drives out good money (or money with higher inherent value). Gresham's law implies that the scenario eventually hoard money with greater intrinsic value (supposedly Bitcoin) and only use bad money (this label is generally assigned to fiat currencies). However, this claim has also been falsified as Bitcoin buyers were quick on the uptake to sell their holdings in exchange for fiat currency in the face of a loss of value.

The question is, if all the narrative elements of Bitcoin and other cryptocurrencies range from shaky at best, to blatantly false, how has it so effectively permeated general

society?

The answer lies in how most bubbles and financial narratives spread through society. The speculative nature of Bitcoin and cryptocurrencies is undeniable. Most of the small-time investors lured into buying and holding cryptocurrencies are those looking to profit from the massive surge in Bitcoin price by more than 400% from the year 2020-21. It is challenging to deal with the fear of missing out, popularly termed FOMO.

Information cascade

When one sees their peers make money, it is hard to resist the urge to mimic their actions. The accompanying effect of faulty de-

cision-making is called an 'information cascade'.

An information cascade causes people to value the judgment and actions of others in contrast to their own. Furthermore, Bitcoin and other cryptocurrency trading applications have been heavily advertised before significant sports events such as the IPL and endorsed by popular Bollywood stars whom people idolise. These apps also let the retail investor take on leverage, which has caused many people to lose their savings and more.

The way to escape viral financial narratives and fads as a small-time investor is to heed the advice of

timeless advice provided in the famous book 'The richest man in Babylon' by George S. Clason.

One of the most important rules from the book is to avoid investment opportunities which promise you supposedly great returns in a relatively short period.

The efficacy of the Bitcoin narrative was in the idea that the prices would keep rising and that the investor, no matter what the scenario was, would stand to gain a tidy profit. Additionally, another rule which the investor Warren Buffet also says is to avoid investment opportunities which you do not inherently understand well. Bitcoin and cryptocurrencies are just another brick in the wall of the countless previous narratives which have spread and collapsed in the history of financial markets.

An insurance premium rate increase isn't always bad!

It is an indication of something good because it is still a promise that your increasing losses will be reimbursed

Price rise is bad. It pinches you where it hurts the most. You have to rethink and regroup your life and plans.

However, when premium rates are raised, as in many things in insurance, it is not exactly what it seems to be.

An increase in premium is an indication of something good because it is still a promise that your increasing losses will be reimbursed.

Increasing claims

When insurance companies increase premium rates, they are catching up with increasing claims. The way it works in the real world, they rarely are ahead of that race.

There may be a higher number of claims (as during COVID-19 or a natural disaster),

claims of higher value (due to rising cost of healthcare or car repairs or whatever) or a combination of both.

Price rises as well as unfore-

seen events can through the economics of insurance into disarray. Add to this the complications of investment returns with interest rate drops and

tanking stock markets.

Higher claims logically lead to less profits or even in losses for the insurer. It's in our own interest that the insurer has a sustainable and profitable business because he and his company have to be around to pay our claims, for a few decades even in the case of life insurance policies and annuities. If increasing premium is the way for the insurance industry to ensure business continuity, then that is a good thing, for you.

Ponder this. When your motor insurance renewal premium comes around in the next few months. It will be higher because the third-party liability premium has been increased as part of a periodical review and reset to reflect losses.

This is one insurance where the premium you pay is loaded highly in your favour not only

in terms of any claims expense but also the legal work.

Worth the weight

The troublesome processes that go with a defending yourself in a motor accident case will make you realise the insurance policy, and its premium, is worth its weight in gold.

There is also a larger picture. Skipping this insurance is not only illegal, but skews the dynamics of third-party liability insurance.

A majority of the vehicles on the road have no insurance (illegally) and yet cause accidents that the industry pays for partially, but society pays more dearly for it leaves lives and families shattered and with no sure protection.

Coming back to knee-jerk reactions to insurance premium hikes, if you pass on your

insurance renewal, whether health, motor, home, life or pension, you are writing yourself out of the protection circle.

The problem you should solve is not that challenging. If you have a car between 1,000 and 1,500 cc engine capacity, your TP liability premium was ₹3,221 and will now be ₹3,416 at the next renewal.

Unnoticeable difference

This difference of ₹195 is something that you won't even notice. And premium hikes keep you covered for rising expenses you are likely to face when there is a loss. As I keep saying, the question you have to ask yourself while buying insurance is, is the premium expensive or the claim?

Novak Djokovic and Rafael Nadal headline the title chase at The Championships where eight-time champion Roger Federer, the world's top two players as well as valuable ranking points will all be missing.

Djokovic is bidding for a seventh title at the All England Club to move level with Pete Sampras. Nadal, fresh from a 14th French Open victory and a record-extending 22nd Major, is halfway to the first men's calendar Grand Slam in more than half a century.

The decision to ban Russian and Belarusian players in the aftermath of the invasion of Ukraine means there is no place for World No.1 Daniil Medvedev or eighth-

ranked Andrey Rublev.

Also missing is Germany's World No. 2 Alexander Zverev, who suffered ligament damage during his French Open semifinal against Nadal.

Djokovic and Nadal, ranked three and four, are therefore the top seeds meaning if they are to face each other for the 60th time, it can only be in the final.

Djokovic gets play underway on Monday against Kwon Soon-woy of South Korea, while

Nadal faces Argentina's Francesco Cerundolo in his opening match on Tuesday.

Should Djokovic or Nadal falter, then Italy's Matteo Berrettini, runner-up to Djokovic in last year's final, would be the most likely beneficiary.

In the women's section, Serena Williams, ranked a lowly 1,204 in the world and without a competitive singles match in 12 months, will sweep into Wimbledon targeting what would be her greatest triumph.

McIntosh, a Canadian 15-year-old, held off 16-year-old American Katie Grimes to win the women's 400m medley title. McIntosh, who won the 200m butterfly gold on Wednesday, claimed her fourth medal in Budapest in 4:32.04s.

Grimes was 0.63s back, while another American, Emma Weyant, was a distant third ahead of Hungarian 33-year-old Katinka Hosszu, the defending champion.

Sjostrom finished her sprint in 23.98s, 0.20s ahead of Pole Katarzyna Wasick, with Australian Meg Harris and American Erika Brown tied for bronze.

 The men's 50m backstroke gold medal was presented twice, with the US anthem

played twice. In the first race of the evening, Justin Ressa was disqualified after a video review for finishing entirely under water as he touched the wall first.

His training buddy Hunter Armstrong was awarded gold, winning in 24.14s.

"With some of the players enjoying 50% of the points earned in 2019 till the end of this year, the real ranking will take some more time to emerge.

"We may not get to play the Australian Open or the French. Wimbledon could be a good chance," said Jee-

van, who has competed in all the four Grand Slams, and three years in a row in Wimbledon.

He was grateful for the pillars of strength in his career - mother Kalyani and sister Swapna, who watch his matches on-line, stay in touch with him and boost his morale.

Jeevan did win the ATP Tour doubles title with Rohan Bopanna, and looks forward to the ATP Tour after the Challengers in July in Spain.

If they sustain the good work, Jeevan and Balaji would soon find themselves in the top-100 of world ranking, and plot their way into the higher echelons of the game.
