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Adani power project sparks row in Sri Lanka

Official says Modi 'pressured' Gotabaya, later recalls charge

An Adani project in Sri Lanka is yet again at the centre of a controversy, after a top official of the Ceylon Electricity Board (CEB) told a parliamentary panel that a renewable energy project in the island's northern Mannar district was given to the Adani Group after Prime Minister Narendra Modi "pressured" President Gotabaya Rajapaksa.

CEB Chairman M.M.C. Ferdinando made the remark on Friday before the Committee on Public Enterprises (COPE), but soon withdrew it, saying he had been "emotional".

President's denial

Between his statement on Friday and swift withdrawal was a tweet from Mr. Gotabaya on Saturday that said: "Re[garding] a statement made by the #lka CEB Chairman at a COPE committee hearing regarding the award of a Wind Power Project in Mannar, I categorically deny authorisation to award this project to any specific person or entity. I trust responsible communication in this regard will follow."

The President's office followed up with a statement "vehemently denying" the CEB official's remarks. "Sri

Lanka is currently in an acute shortage of power and President desires to expedite implementation of mega power projects. However, no undue influence will be used in awarding such projects. Project proposals for large-scale renewable energy projects is limited, but special attention will be paid to the selection of institutions for the projects, which will be carried out strictly in accordance with the transparent system by the government of Sri Lanka.

The development comes days after Sri Lanka amended its electricity law, effectively eliminating competitive bidding. The move drew flak from critics. In the parliamentary debate on the Bill, subsequently passed, Opposition lawmaker Nalin Bandara flagged concerns

that competitive bidding was being done away with "to make way" for projects such as the Adani Group's, according to the Colombo-based *Sunday Times*. This is not the first time that Sri Lankans have questioned the Adani Group's entry into the island's energy sector, or brought up Mr. Modi's name in this regard. Following an agreement between the Group and the CEB, to execute renewable energy projects in the northern Mannar and Pooneryn districts, Sri Lanka's main Opposition party, Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB), said the Indian businessman was making a "backdoor entry", and accused Mr. Gotabaya of "pampering" Mr. Modi's "notorious friends".

Protests on, more people arrested

Mob attacks train in West Bengal; house of activist razed in Uttar Pradesh

The protests against the controversial remarks on Prophet Muhammad by two now-sacked BJP spokespersons continued in several States on Sunday even as the authorities at Prayagraj in Uttar Pradesh razed the "illegal" house of arrested political activist Javed Mohammad.

Over 400 people – 316 in Uttar Pradesh alone – have been arrested in various States since Friday.

A mob attacked and damaged a local train at the Bethuadahari station in Nadia of West Bengal on Sunday even as prohibitory orders continued in parts of Howrah and Murshidabad districts.

In West Bengal's Bethuadahari, a police officer said, over 1,000 demonstrators threw stones, damaged houses and tried to put up blockades on roads. When chased by the police, a section of them went inside the

Bethuadahari railway station and attacked the train.

Another group of people vandalised the Dhubulia railway station in Nadia. Some employees of the station and passengers of the Krishna-Lalgola local train were

injured, an official of the Eastern Railway said.

In Purba Medinipur district, the police prevented Leader of the Opposition in West Bengal Assembly, Suwendu Adhikari, from visiting violence-hit areas of Howrah, where several BJP offices were targeted, "as a precautionary measure".

In Uttar Pradesh, the Prayagraj administration on Sunday demolished the house of Mr. Mohammad, who was arrested on charges of fuelling violence during a protest in the city on Friday after *namaz*.

The administration said the bungalow was an "illegal construction".

Modern Times: watches keep an eye on workers

GPS tracking a privacy invasion, say experts

Tied not only to their hands but also to their daily wages, GPS-enabled watches have kept *safai karamcharis* (sanitation workers) in Chandigarh under constant anxiety ever since the gadgets were introduced by the Municipal Corporation in 2020. With no laws or regulations yet to be formalised to check mis-

use of such monitoring devices, many legal experts feel that this "constant and dehumanising" surveillance must be stopped immediately.

The Corporation introduced the watches to glean attendance of these workers and check the misuse of the manual attendance system.

The sanitation workers, however, complain that the device has made them a modern-day slave.

Sheila, a sweeper attached with the Corporation, said she had been forced to wear the watch all

day and even forced to take care of its maintenance.

"Most of the time, I don't know if it is working or not. As per instructions given to us, it works automatically. We just have to wear it. But I get dizzy whenever I wear it," the 48-year-old, whose shift starts at 6.30 a.m. and ends at 11 a.m., said.

"I live in constant fear, as any fault with the watch could result in my salary getting cut. There have been several instances where my salary has been cut, without even giving a proper rea-

son," said Ms. Sheila, who has faced deductions up to ₹2,000 on her monthly salary of ₹14,000.

Darshna, 48, another sweeper, said there was the fear of wages being cut even while taking breaks. "It takes an hour and a half to charge the watch. Sometimes, it stops working. There have also been instances where it showed a location different from where I was working," she said, adding her salary was cut by ₹1,500 a month.

'Abnormal' dinosaur egg found in India

Discovery of 'egg-in-egg' leads to new link of reptilian and avian evolution

A team of researchers from the University of Delhi has discovered a unique set of fossilised dinosaur eggs, with one egg nesting within the other.

While eggs-within-eggs are a rare phenomenon, they are so far known to occur only in birds and never known in reptiles. This discovery brings out newer connections between reptilian and avian evolution.

The findings, published in the journal *Scientific Reports*, talk about the "egg-in-egg" phenomenon in a titanosaurid dinosaur egg found at Bagh in Madhya Pradesh's Dhar district.

Dinosaurs of the Sauropod family were among the largest land animals that ever lived and widespread millions of years ago in the territory that is now India. Fossils of these animals have been found in Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh and Meghalaya.

52 nests documented

The Upper Cretaceous Lameta Formation of Central India is long known for its dinosaur fossils (both skeletal and egg remains), and scientists, some of whom

were involved in the team reporting the latest findings, documented 52 titanosaurid sauropod nests near Padlya village close to Bagh town in Madhya Pradesh. One of these nests had 10 eggs, one of which was the "abnormal" egg.

The egg has two continuous and circular eggshell layers separated by a wide gap like that observed in birds. Until this discovery, no egg-in-egg fossil egg was found in dinosaurs and other reptiles such as turtles, lizards and crocodiles.

It was believed that dinosaurs had a reproductive function similar to that of turtles and other reptiles (unsegmented oviduct) in contrast to segmented reproductive tract of crocodiles and birds with separate regions of membrane and shell deposition.

Sequential laying of eggs

Though crocodiles have separate regions of shell membrane and mineralised shell deposition, they ovulate and release all the eggs simultaneously like turtles and other reptiles. In birds, ovulation is sequenced and eggs are laid one at a time.

"The new discovery of an ovum-in-ovo egg, which is characteristic of birds, in titanosaurids argues for a segmented oviduct like in crocodiles and birds, and possible sequential laying of eggs like in birds," the authors note.

Ink attack on rape victim in Delhi

Woman had filed complaint against Rajasthan Minister's son

A 23-year-old woman, who had accused Rajasthan Minister Mahesh Joshi's son Rohit Joshi of raping her, was allegedly attacked with ink and threatened to take back her complaint at Shaheen Bagh in south-east Delhi, the police said on Sunday.

The police said they had received a PCR call on Saturday about some unidentified persons throwing a blue liquid on a woman near Kalindi Kunj Road and fleeing from the spot.

"The blue liquid *prima facie* looks like ink. A case under sections of the Indian Penal Code pertaining to criminal intimidation and punishment for voluntarily causing hurt has been registered at the Shaheen Bagh police station. An investigation is in progress," said Deputy Commissioner of Police (South-East) Esha Pandey.

The police are scanning the CCTV footage from the area to identify the attackers, she said. The woman, in her statement, said she had come with her mother to

Delhi from Jaipur when two persons in an autorickshaw threw something at her and fled. The woman was examined at the AIIMS Trauma Centre, Ms. Pandey said.

Talking to Twitter on Sunday, Delhi Commission for Women (DCW) chairperson Swati Maliwal accused Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot of trying to shield the Minister's son. In a notice issued to Delhi Police, the DCW sought a copy of the FIR, details of the accused and an action-taken report. (With inputs from PTI)

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'Can't enforce RTE unconditionally on pvt. schools'

HC says petitioner, whose name was struck off the rolls for non-payment of fees, is free to take admission in a government school

The provisions of the Right To Education (RTE) Act cannot be unconditionally enforced on a private unaided school, the Delhi High Court has observed.

A Bench of Acting Chief Justice Vipin Sanghi and Justice Sachin Datta made the remarks while rejecting a plea challenging certain provisions of the Delhi School Education Rules, 1973.

Divyam Bhateja, a Class VI student in Bhai Parmanand Vidya Mandir here, was on February 11, 2022, told by the school that her name had been struck off the rolls over non-payment of fees since June 2021.

'Father lost job'

Bhateja, in her plea through advocate Khagesh B. Jha, had stated that she was paying

the school fees regularly until her father, working with a private firm as an accountant, lost his job during the COVID-19 pandemic.

She had challenged Rules 35 and 167 of Delhi School Education Rules, 1973 against the right of children to free and compulsory education under the RTE Act. Rule 35 provides for strik-

ing a student off the rolls on account of non-payment of fees and other dues for 20 days after the last day for payment. Rule 167 permits a school to strike off the name of a student for non-payment of fees and contributions.

The High Court noted that the Delhi School Education Rules were enacted for better organisation and deve-

lopment of school education in the Capital. The very purpose of this enactment is to improve the standard and management of school education, it said.

Right to education

The RTE Act was enacted in 2009 to provide for free and compulsory education to all children between the ages of

6-14 years.

"Given the independent and distinct framework of Delhi School Education Act and the Rules framed thereunder, and the RTE Act and the rules framed thereunder, there can be no question of Rules 35 and 167 of Delhi School Education Rules impinging upon the operation of the RTE Act," the High Court observed.

"The RTE Act guarantees the right to education. However, it nowhere provides that the said right can be unconditionally enforced against a private unaided school," the court also said.

"The petitioner (minor Bhateja) is free to take admission in a government school if he cannot afford to pay the fee of the private unaided school. If he is entitled to admission in the EWS category, he may apply under that ca-

tegory to seek a waiver of the school fee," the court observed.

The Delhi High Court also remarked, "If the claim of the petitioner were to be allowed, it would mean that even private unaided schools would not be able to charge any fee even though they have to meet all their expenses from their own resources and accretions. This is completely untenable."

"In the light of the aforesaid position, we reject the challenge to the vires of Rules 35 and 167 of the Delhi School Education Rules, 1973," the High Court ordered.

It, further, clarified that the other prayers made by Bhateja, such as her challenge to her school striking off her name from the rolls, would be decided by another bench of the High Court.

L-G, CM deliberate on revamp of Bhatti Mines

Area to be turned into a tourism hub

Lieutenant-Governor Vinai Kumar Saxena and Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal visited the Asola Bhatti mines forest area on Sunday and directed officials to prepare in 30 days a master plan to develop the area into a "world-class" eco-tourism destination.

According to the statement issued by Raj Niwas the L-G and the Chief Minister were in agreement on developing 14 existing pits (four large and 10 small), with a combined capacity to hold more than 800 million gallons of water, into reservoirs that would help recharge the city's groundwater.

Mr. Saxena had last month visited the area and directed officials to explore the possibilities of develop-

ing the area as a tourism hub. Following this he held a meeting with Mr. Kejriwal on the issue.

The statement from the L-G's office added that low-lying inhabited areas outside the forest reserve witnessed persistent waterlogging. The larger drains flowing right outside the forest area were also prone to overflowing during the monsoon, it was found.

The officials were directed to store the overflowing water by constructing a bund and to devise ways of pressure-lifting the collected water to the pits of the Bhatti mines area.

The eco-tourism component of the master plan will include provisions to create butterfly trails, wildlife trails, cycle tracks, walking tracks, bird-watching spots and ropeways, among others.

'Newspapers don't perform public function'

HC rejects plea against discrimination

The Delhi High Court observed that a newspaper or a press agency engaged in the dissemination of news cannot be viewed as performing a 'public function'.

Justice Yashwant Varma made the observation while rejecting the plea of an employee of a French news agency 'Agence France Presse' (AFP), alleging racial discrimination and harassment by his employer.

Racial discrimination

Prakash Singh, AFP's chief photographer in India, contended in his plea that he was discriminated against by the employer because of his colour.

Urging the High Court to act on his complaint, Mr. Singh argued that AFP had been constituted by an Act of Parliament of France, and

that it "clearly performs a public function".

Justice Varma, however, declined to entertain the petition saying it was "not maintainable".

"While it may be true that the second respondent (AFP) had been constituted by an Act by the Parliament of France, it becomes relevant to note that a newspaper or an agency engaged in the dissemination of news cannot be viewed as performing a public function," the court said.

The Bench further said, "The expression 'public function' and 'public duty' have been understood to be those which are akin to functions performed by the State in its sovereign capacity." It noted that the contract of service between Mr. Singh and the news agency was not imbued with any "statutory flavour".

In flames



Shops gutted: A massive fire broke out at Gaffar Market in central Delhi's Karol Bagh on Sunday, leaving at least a dozen shops gutted and injuring a firefighter, fire officials said. Delhi Fire Service chief Atul Garg said 39 fire tenders were pressed into service. Several buildings were also damaged in the blaze. The fire started at a shoe market in the area, the DFS said, adding that one of its firefighters sustained burn injuries while bringing the blaze under control. No other casualties were reported, the fire agency added. • SHIV KUMAR PUSHPAKAR

Delhi reports 735 new COVID-19 cases, three deaths on Sunday

Three people died of COVID-19 in the Capital on Sunday while 735 new cases were reported, according to data shared by Delhi's Health Department.

The city's positivity rate rose from 4.11% on Saturday to 4.35% on Sunday. Since

Friday the city has recorded over 600 cases daily with a positivity rate of over 3%.

The city's totally COVID-19 case tally increased to 19,12,798 while the death toll reached 26,221, according to the latest bulletin issued by the Health Department.

A total of 16,878 COVID tests were conducted in the

Capital on Saturday, it said.

The number of daily COVID-19 cases in Delhi during the third wave of the pandemic peaked at 28,867 on January 13 this year.

The city had recorded a positivity rate of 30.6% on January 14, the highest during the third wave of COVID-19 in the city.

The number of active COVID-19 cases in Delhi increased to 2,442 on Sunday from 2,247 recorded a day earlier, the bulletin stated.

Home isolation

As many as 1,613 patients are under home isolation, up from 1,360 as reported on Saturday, the bulletin stated

said, adding that there are 180 containment zones in the city.

The Health Department also stated that the city has 9,587 beds for COVID-19 patients in various hospitals, of which 100 were occupied.

Delhi had logged 655 COVID-19 cases and two fatalities on Friday, while the posi-

tivity rate was reported to be 3.11%.

The Capital is again reporting a positivity rate of over 4% after nearly a month. On May 10, the city had recorded 1,118 cases and one death, with a positivity rate of 4.38 per cent. Since then the positivity rate had gradually decreased.

Deadly heat stifles Delhi; mercury above 44° C

All but one of the weather stations in the Capital recorded maximum temperatures above 44 degrees Celsius on Sunday, as hot and dry westerlies swept across north-west India.

The Safdarjung Observatory, Delhi's base weather station, recorded a maximum temperature of 43.9 degrees Celsius — four notches above the season's normal. The maximum temperature settled at 46.7 degrees Celsius at the Sports Complex.

While Najafgarh and Mungeshpur stations recorded a high of 46.4 degrees Celsius and 46.2 degrees Celsius respectively, the weather stations at Pitampura and Ridge both recorded a high of 45.8 degrees Celsius.

The India Meteorological Department has issued a yellow alert, warning of a heatwave in parts of Delhi on Monday.

Weather experts said a major respite from the scorching heat is expected from June 15-16.

Starting afresh: how women at Tihar jail are upskilling, breaking stereotypes

Jail number 6 is helping women inmates fight trauma and prepare for a better future through vocational courses and counselling sessions

Tihar's jail number 6 is home to over 400 women prisoners who engage themselves in running a full-time kitchen and an in-house beauty parlour while also attending tailoring and embroidery classes. It has helped them shed their apprehensions and hope for a future in which they can earn and gain recognition using the skills they are learning here.

Unlike the men's section of the jail, which often grabs headlines for being a hub of extortion rackets, hit-jobs and frequent inmate scuffles, jail number 6 has an "environment of sisterhood and harmony" and has not witnessed any major offence in the past eight months, officers said.

An undertrial in a kidnapping case, 37-year-old Payal*, has been lodged in Tihar for a year now.

"The tailoring classes which taught me screen printing to applique work have kept me occupied; otherwise, I always kept worrying about

my 11-year-old son and eight-year-old daughter who now live with my cousin," Ms. Payal told *The Hindu*.

"The jail Superintendent and the staff encourage me to pursue tailoring professionally in the future if I am granted bail or acquitted," she added.

Maria*, 33, a Nigerian under trial in a drugs related case, said she stitches her dresses and is passionate about designing clothes not just as a hobby but as a life skill to help herself.

"I've been working on women's clothing for four months and can now differentiate between fabrics, the sizes and the different types of womenswear," said Maria, who has been in jail since last September.

For Mozambique's Gloria*, 30, painting classes have helped her from slipping into depression in the last three years.

Swirling her brush over a black and white painting of a flower, Gloria said she is hoping to be cleared of all charges soon. When that happens she plans to take up a job and pursue painting



as a part-time profession.

Cooking for prisoners Inside the full-time kitchen, the inmates, mostly convicts, cook three meals a day for fellow male and female prisoners.

"Their day starts at 6 a.m. The women inmates receive training before they become full-time kitchen employees. The food is also served to the undertrials," said Head

Matron Geeta.

Kiran, Deputy Superintendent of the jail, said that at the jail's in-house beauty parlour, inmates are taught everything from threading and pedicure to skin care treatment. "We have all the equipment and beauty accessories available at the parlour," she added.

When the women

prisoners are busy in their daily activities, the staff takes care of the inmates' 20 children in the jail's crèche, where children aged over three years are imparted basic education.

Counselling prisoners

Speaking about the diligent work of the women staff in the jail, Sandeep Goel, Director General (Prisons) said, "The women staff is working very dedicatedly. They understand the

problem of women inmates and are empathetic towards them.

"The staff also takes a keen interest in the reformation and other welfare activities for the inmates. They also counsel the inmates who require counselling," he added.

Many women prisoners who are staying away from their families and children suffer from anxiety. They are put through counselling sessions for their mental well-being.

Superintendent Krishna Sharma, 49, who worked as a Social Welfare Officer with the Delhi government before being posted here in November last year, said, "We have a lot of mothers who have been separated from their children. We provide all the necessary monetary assistance to such mothers."

'Risk-prone job'

Jail 6 is looked after by around 75 women staff, most of who have faced their fair share of challenges, both personally and professionally, on the jobs. Heading an infamous jail

in the country's capital is, for 50-year-old Ms. Kiran, a means of breaking the proverbial glass ceiling.

"A job in a jail is always frowned upon. But here it doesn't feel like we are working among criminals. Most prisoners here have started life afresh and are working hard to make their stay productive... There are hardly any complaints of inmate violence now," Ms. Kiran added.

Deputy Superintendent Raman Sharma, 56, who joined as an Assistant Superintendent at the jail 26 years ago, recalled how her family supported her in pursuing what people considered a "risk-prone job".

"Even though minor incidents and scuffles break out once in a while, there is a feeling of sisterhood. This jail dispels many of the preconceived notions of a prison. It is an example of how women inmates, headed by a female staff, can function independently," Ms. Raman Sharma said.

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Give us ED, even BJP will vote for Shiv Sena, says Sanjay Raut

'Central agencies misused to change outcome of Rajya Sabha election results'

Attributing BJP leader Devendra Fadnavis's triumph in the recently concluded Rajya Sabha election in Maharashtra to political "horse-trading" and "interference by Central agencies", Shiv Sena MP Sanjay Raut on Sunday said that if the ruling Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA) had control of the Enforcement Directorate (ED) for just two days, then even Mr. Fadnavis and the BJP would have voted for the Sena.

The BJP, led by Mr. Fadnavis, had rattled the tripartite MVA (of the Shiv Sena, the Nationalist Congress Party and the Congress) by achieving a surprise victory on the hotly-contested sixth Rajya Sabha seat in the State, which saw the BJP's Dhananjay Mahadik narrowly beating the Sena's (MVA's) candidate Sanjay Parwar by 41 votes to 39.

Mr. Raut "named" no fewer than six Independent MLAs as being responsible for the defeat of the Sena's candidate, while accusing the BJP at the Centre and the State of "misusing Central agencies" to change the outcome of the results.

"There is no question of our [the Sena] insulting any Independent MLA. We have merely expressed our feelings... Even the Independents and the BJP are aware of what we are trying to say. If the

reins of the ED were given in our [MVA's] hands for two days, even Devendra Fadnavis will vote for the Shiv Sena," said Mr. Raut, speaking in Mumbai.

Remarking that the MVA was aware of everything that the Maharashtra BJP leaders were doing "in the middle of the night", the newly re-elected Sena MP said: "We know how they [the Maharashtra BJP] were calling the Union Home Department and how the Home Department's phones were going to the Central Election Commission... We know how they [the BJP] were planning to make votes of MVA leaders to be 'invalidated'."

Mr. Raut's remarks against Independents has sparked strong resentment among the MLAs, who are expected to queer the pitch for the MVA in the upcoming polls to the Maharashtra Legislative

Council on June 20, where the Opposition BJP is said to have a clear edge.

Responding to Mr. Raut, the BJP and the Maharashtra Navnirman Sena asked how it was possible that despite the Sena's claims of Uddhav Thackeray being one of the most popular Chief Ministers in the country, the MVA government's own MLAs were disgruntled with the Thackeray government.

'Poll code violated'

Accusing Mr. Raut of having violated the code of conduct by naming MLAs who had not voted for the MVA, BJP leader Kirit Somaiya demanded a case be lodged against the Sena leader.

The BJP's Leader of Opposition in the Council Pravin Darekar, too, demanded a complaint be lodged against Mr. Raut for 'insulting' Independent MLAs.

Three elderly devotees die of heat at Bengal religious fair

CM Mamata Banerjee expresses grief at the loss of life

Three elderly devotees, including a couple, died while several others fell ill due to heat and humidity at an "overcrowded" religious fair in West Bengal's North 24 Parganas district on Sunday, officials said.

The incident occurred during the 'Doi-Chirey Mela' at a temple of the International Society for Krishna Consciousness (ISKCON) on the banks of river Hooghly in Panihati.

A doctor attending to the patients at a makeshift medical camp set up in a nearby school said that the deaths were due to excessive heat and dehydration.

Dhrubajyoti Dey, Joint Commissioner of Police, Barrackpore Commissionerate, said that three persons were taken to a hospital after they fell seriously ill owing to the heat amid crowding. They

were declared dead on arrival there.

West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee expressed grief at the loss of life in the fair.

"Distressed to know of 3 old devotees' death due to heat and humidity in Danda Mahotsav at ISKCON temple at Panihati. CP and DM have rushed, all help being provided. My condolences to the bereaved families, solidarity to devotees," she tweeted.

The festival, 'Doi Chirey Mela', is celebrated at Panihati every year on this day to mark the arrival of Shri Chaitanyadev from Puri on the way to his abode at Nabadwip.

Senior West Bengal minister Jyotipriyo Mallick claimed that 10 lakh devotees gathered there this year in place of the usual two lakh people.

Mr. Mallick claimed that high day temperature accompanied by humidity caused distress among the devotees, many of whom are elderly.

ISKCON Kolkata Vice-President Radharaman Das said that the Chief Minister called him up, conveyed her condolences, and assured him of all help from the administration that might be needed.

The deceased were identified as Debash Pal (70), his wife Shukla Pal (60) and their relative Chhaya Das (74), Das said.

Court awards life term to 4 NSCN members

They killed a member of a rival outfit

Extremist groups in the Northeast have been known to be the judge, jury and executioner of their own members and those of their rivals.

A local court in Arunachal Pradesh may have set a precedent by sentencing to life four members of a faction of the National Socialist Council of Nagaland (NSCN) for killing a member of a rival outfit more than five years ago.

On June 10, the district and sessions court in Arunachal Pradesh's Tirap found four members of the NSCN (Khaplung) group guilty of gunning down Tailai Wangpan, a member of the NSCN (Unification) in front of his wife.

The four had barged into the house in Tirap district's Pumaog village where Wangpan and his wife intended to spend a night after attending a local festival. His killing was said to be an outcome of inter-factional rivalry.

Identified by wife

During the trial, Wangpan's wife had identified three members of the NSCN (K) who had pumped a volley of bullets into her husband. They were self-styled second lieutenant Nahbi Wangsu and self-styled privates Palai Wangpan and Wangthuak Wangsu.

The court also prescribed life sentence for Bopa Wangpan, the self-styled lieutenant colonel who had ordered the hit on the NSCN (U) member.

Prohibitory orders in two districts of Assam

Protests over remarks by Nupur, Naveen

Prohibitory order under Section 144 of the CrPC has been promulgated in Cachar and Karimganj districts of Assam and all processions and rallies have been banned in the two districts, an official said.

Cachar district administration on Sunday promulgated various restrictions under Section 144 of the CrPC, while neighbouring Karimganj issued a similar order on Friday.

Issuing the order, Cachar Additional District Magistrate Dipak Jidung noted that "mass rallies and protests are being organised in various parts of the district since last few days involving huge gathering". He further stated that

some persons may indulge in anti-social activities and intimidate genuine public, causing annoyance.

"There is apprehension that this may lead to breach of public peace and tranquility," the ADM said.

Rallies banned

Karimganj Additional District Magistrate Rintu Chandra Boro banned all procession, rally, dharna, distribution of leaflets, banners and posters that may breach public peace and tranquillity.

Protests had erupted in several parts of the country over controversial remarks made by suspended BJP spokesperson Nupur Sharma and expelled leader Naveen Jindal on Prophet Mohammad.

Hectic efforts on to save boy stuck in borewell

Team of robot specialists reaches spot

More than 45 hours after an 11-year-old boy fell into a deep borewell in Chhattisgarh's Janjira Champa district, rescue teams were making hectic efforts on Sunday to save him, officials said.

The boy is conscious, they said, adding that a team of robot specialists from Gujarat has reached the spot and efforts are being made to pull out the child, who is stuck at a depth of about 60 feet in the abandoned borewell.

The boy, Rahul Sahu, fell into the unused 80-foot-deep borewell, located in the backyard of his house in Pihrid village in Malkharoda development block around 2 pm on Friday while he was playing there, officials said.

Army, NDRF present

The rescue teams, comprising over 500 personnel, including men of the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) and the Army, have been working tirelessly, using ultra-advance machines and vehicles to evacuate the child safely, they said.

Joint probe on into Moosewala murder: Maharashtra Minister

'Police teams from four-five States working on the case'

Police teams from four-five States are jointly working in the murder case of rapper and Congress leader Shubhdeep Singh Sidhu, known as Sidhu Moosewala, Maharashtra Home Minister Dilip Walse-Patil said on Sunday.

"I cannot publicly comment on the ongoing inquiry because it is a sensitive issue. The Maharashtra Police and the State Anti-Terrorism Squad are monitoring it," said Mr. Walse-Patil.

On June 7, the Pune Police

arrested Siddhesh Kamble known by his aliases 'Mahakal' and 'Saurabh', who is one of the eight suspects named by the Punjab Police in the Moosewala killing. The Delhi Police recently said gangster Lawrence Bishnoi was the mastermind behind the murder while identifying six shooters allegedly involved in the killing.

Investigators had also revealed that Kamble, said to be a member of the Bishnoi gang, knew that Moosewala was going to be murdered and was allegedly in touch

with gangster Vikram Brar a week before the killing. Kamble was picked up from Sangamner near the Pune-Ahmednagar border in connection with the murder of another history-sheeter Omkar Bankhele, which had occurred in Pune's Manchar taluk last year.

Kamble is said to have sheltered Santosh Jadhav - the second suspect from Maharashtra in the Moosewala murder - who is also the prime accused in the Bankhele case and is still absconding.

Study reveals child artists work for more than 12 hours a day

Child labour Act clearly mentions that no child shall be allowed to work for more than five hours in a day

A recent study reveals that a child below the age of 15 in the entertainment industry in India, works for more than 12 hours a day and casting agencies are violating The Child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act (CALPRA) that prohibits engagement of children in all occupations.

In 2019, India's Media and Entertainment industry was valued at ₹1.67 trillion from which children (up to 15 years of age) make up nearly 30% share of "impressions", which means that they account for a significant portion of those consuming films and television (regardless of the platform), as per the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industries.

A study titled 'Child Artists in India' by Child Rights and You, a non governmental organisation that works towards ensuring children's rights suggests that the overall number of child artists is estimated to be between 6,059 and 12,334 based on Media and Entertainment Skills Council estimates for 2017 and Census of India 2011 respectively.

There are no precise statistics available on the estimate of child artists in the country, a sample of seven casting agencies that contained a total of 41,392 profiles of artists online (across India), suggested that 24.9% were classified as child actors (i.e., under the age of 15).

agency portals, and 4,642 profiles of male child actors. The portal search also suggests that 8.7% of all male actors are child actors, and 15.7% of all female actors are under the age of 18, the study reveals.

While it is clearly mentioned in CALPRA, 1986, that no child shall be allowed to work for more than five hours in a day, and for not more than three hours without rest. The study has found that the work shift stretches to 12-13 hours for six days a week by production houses because guardians often do not interfere in the scheduling.

The provisions of CALPRA also state, at least 20% of the income earned by the child from the production or event is to be directly deposited in a fixed deposit account in a nationalised bank in the name of the child which may be credited to her/him on attaining majority. However, the study states the money is being utilised completely on the families. In cases where

the child artist is the sole breadwinner of the family or the family has come from outside Mumbai, keeping 20% of the payment in a fixed deposit is highly unlikely.

Education discontinued

Cine and TV Artists' Association (CINTAA), is governed by an elected committee that works on an honorary basis and it has a register to maintain a log of complaints and they have come across cases where the parents have discontinued formal education of child artists. Since education is looked at as the means to get employment in the future, when child artists get employment at a young age, their parents feel that it is their craft as an artist that needs to be worked on rather than their formal education.

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Anti-CM protests buffet govt. in Kerala

Pinarayi attends functions under high security

 Confrontational political protests demanding Kerala Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan's resignation buffeted the Left Democratic Front (LDF) government on Sunday.
 The protracted and bitter furore over Mr. Vijayan's alleged misuse of the UAE consulate's diplomatic channel for 'smuggling contraband metal and tranches of foreign currency' during the previous administration spurred the Congress and the BJP workers to attempt to waylay him on his way to attend public functions in Malappuram and Kozhikode.
 A cavalcade of police vehicles whisked Mr. Vijayan to the venues cocooned in several layers of VIP security. Along the route, Congress, BJP and Indian Union Muslim League (UML) workers greeted his motorcade with black flags and jeers.
 At Tavanoor in Malappuram, frenzied anti-government demonstrators scaled police barricades. They attempted to overrun the phalanx of law enforcers in anti-riot gear.
 Television news channels magnified the protests with real-time coverage. They also broadcast footage of the police stopping vehicles, barricading main thoroughfares, imposing traffic restrictions 'without notice', and forcing families to take detours to their homes.
 A few channels showed the police ordering passers-by to remove black masks and supplant them with coloured ones provided by the government. The 'clampdown' on black prompted Opposition workers to adopt the colour as a symbol of their resistance to the government. They waved black flags as they braved water cannons, toppled iron barricades, and skirmished with the police in North Kerala.
CPI(M)s stance
 CPI(M) weighed in with support for Mr. Vijayan. Polit Bureau member Prakash Karat perceived a Congress-BJP axis to target Mr. Vijayan by amplifying non-issues with no consequence.

Groundwater contaminated with fluoride, iron, coliform in Odisha

The Odisha State Pollution Control Board (OSPCB) has found contamination in groundwater at different places which is beyond the permissible level for consumption
 "Comparison of the groundwater quality with the drinking water specifications reveals that parameters like pH, nitrate, fluoride, iron, total coliform and faecal coliform at some quality monitoring stations do not conform to the prescribed limits," says the OSPCB report.
 The board has monitored the groundwater quality at 91 locations during April and October 2021. Of these, 47 stations were not conforming to the quality parameters.
 The groundwater is acidic beyond permissible level at Khandagiri, Kalpana-Laxmisagar area, Samantarapur, Chandrasekharpur, Capital Hospital area and Governor House. Iron content was also found to be high at Khandagiri, Kalpana-Laxmisagar area, Capital Hospital area. Fluoride was found in groundwater at Nuapada, Nayagarh, Angul and Balesore districts.

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False equivalence

Omnibus prosecution of offensive remarks will make original offence hard to prosecute

The investigation by the Delhi Police against 30 people for remarks allegedly hurting religious sentiments is an unnecessary attempt to create an artificial balance between the specific instance of controversial views being expressed recently on the Prophet and the unrelated opinions expressed online by others in recent times. The BJP has acted against its spokesperson Nupur Sharma and Delhi media unit head Naveen Jindal following global outrage among Muslims over their remarks on Islam. There is little doubt that their remarks came as part of a long-running trend among BJP functionaries and several Hindu organisations to vilify minorities, especially Muslims, and few would question any lawful action against them. The Delhi Police have chosen to register FIRs against Mr. Jindal and Ms. Sharma, but also added 30 other social media users. There may be a justification for the registration of a case against anyone if there appears to be a deliberate attempt to outrage religious feelings or inciting ill-will. However, registering an omnibus FIR that covers priest Yati Narsinghanand, journalist Saba Naqvi, AIMIM chief Asaduddin Owaisi, and Hindu Mahasabha activist Pooja Shakun Pandey, and others at one go defies logic. The police believe that many others cutting across religions had created animosity and spread inflammatory misinformation. This may be true in some instances, but clubbing of several such instances, instead of investigating and prosecuting them separately, gives the impression that these emanate from a general culture of hate and intolerance, and an endless cycle of tit-for-tat religious insults. Actually, some of these could be wilful transgressions of the law aimed at creating disharmony and inciting violence for political purposes.

Mr. Owaisi has questioned the registration of a case against him, maintaining that the Delhi Police are displaying 'both-sidesism' due to their fear of prosecuting the former BJP functionaries in isolation. Pursuing all these remarks in a single probe and trial would mean that material must be gathered from various social media platforms against all of them – leading to a prolonged trial. The tactic of putting a 'part-of-a-larger-plot' spin on specific offences is not new. The Bhima Koregaon case was transmogrified into a purported conspiracy to foment a Maoist insurrection; in the aftermath of the East Delhi riots, communal violence was linked with the Citizenship (Amendment) Act protests. If the idea was to open up the larger field of political dissent in those cases, the strategy now seems to be to drag those who made vocal responses into the criminal ambit so that the original offence appears diluted and becomes difficult to prosecute. Investigative agencies should pursue legal action against individuals in a proportionate manner and not through omnibus prosecutions just to give an impression of being 'balanced'.

Threat to democracy

The report of the House panel on Capitol riots might be toothless, but is a setback for Trump

The bipartisan Congressional committee looking into the deadly January 6, 2021, attack by a mob on the very seat of the Houses of the U.S. Congress has painted a clear picture of the attempt by former President Donald Trump and his allies to overturn the results of the 2020 presidential election, even if that meant he might damage the U.S. government and purposefully instigate violence to cling on to power, creating "a moment of maximum danger" for the foundations of American democracy. At the first public hearing by the House of Representatives committee, its chairman and vice chairwoman played multiple videos of Mr. Trump's Attorney General, William Barr; and his daughter Ivanka Trump, among others, making statements on camera that pointed towards Mr. Trump's role in fuelling the violence that day. The hearings made clear that Mr. Trump was responsible for several such critical acts of commission and omission, including ignoring intelligence reports that had been passed on to the White House beforehand that the protests could turn violent. Critically, Mr. Trump refused to intervene, for example by deploying the National Guard, as the rioting got out of control and far-right groups such as the Proud Boys, unleashed organised violence after a rally near the Capitol, resulting in some deaths, defacement of public property and an unprecedented security threat to members of Congress in the building.

The January 6 assault came directly on the heels of one of the most vicious election campaigns, waged by Mr. Trump and his Republican acolytes. It not only saw them denigrating minorities, women and the U.S.'s involvement in multilateral and regional organisations but also led to a targeted misinformation campaign against the poll results over the fact that ballot votes and runoff elections in some U.S. States impacted the final outcome of a win for President Joe Biden. The work of the House committee looking into the Capitol attack might be politically consequential, for it is a reminder of the extreme lengths to which Mr. Trump and his supporters will go to undermine the rule of law to stay in power. Yet it is ultimately toothless, because it has no constitutional path that leads to debarring him from standing for election again in 2024, an outcome that is looking increasingly likely given his persisting popularity and the absence of any other strong potential Republican presidential nominee. Having survived two impeachment attempts, and with a legal question mark hanging over the prospect of using the 14th Amendment to ban him from public office for his role in an insurrection against the U.S. government, Mr. Trump looks well-placed to run for the White House and resume his antagonistic politics, should he choose to.

Musings on 'Indic civilisation' and Indianness

India's civilisational heritage must be treated as a matter of pride – as one that unites every Indian

I have been musing about the nature of Indian nationhood for at least the last four decades, ever since a distinguished foreigner said to me: 'You Indians have allowed yourself to forget that there is such a thing as Indic civilization. And we are its last outpost.'

The words were spoken to me in 1982, when I headed the United Nations office in Singapore, by the Khmer nationalist politician and one-time Prime Minister, Son Sann, lamenting India's support for Vietnam in its conquest of Cambodia in 1979. To Son Sann, a venerable figure then already in his late seventies, Cambodia was an 'Indic civilization' being overrun by the forces of a Sinitic state, and he was bewildered that India, the fount of his country's heritage, should sympathise with a people as distinctly un-Indian as the Vietnamese. Given that Vietnam's invasion had put an end to the blood-soaked terror of the rule of the Khmer Rouge, I was more inclined to see the choice politically than in terms of civilisational heritage. But Son Sann's words stayed with me.

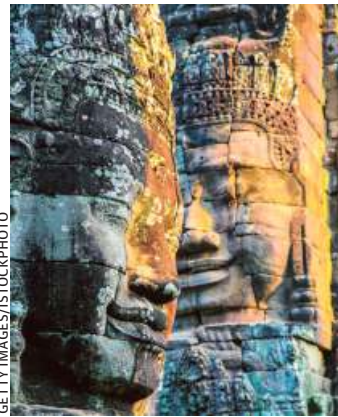
The long reach of culture

They came back to mind during a visit to Angkor Wat, perhaps the greatest Hindu temple ever built anywhere in the world – and in Cambodia, not in India. To walk past those exquisite sculptures recounting tales from the Ramayana and the Mahabharata, to have my Cambodian guide tell me about the significance of the symbols protecting the shrine – the *naga*, the *simha*, and the *garuda*, corresponding, he said earnestly, to today's navy, army, and air force – and to marvel at the epic scale of a Hindu temple as impressive as the

finest cathedral or mosque anywhere in the world, was also to marvel at the extraordinary reach of a major strand of our culture beyond our own shores. Hinduism was brought to Cambodia by merchants and travellers more than a millennium ago. It has long since disappeared, supplanted by Buddhism, also an Indian export. But at its peak, Hinduism profoundly influenced the culture, music, dance, and mythology of the Cambodian people. My Cambodian guide at Bayon, a few minutes' drive from Angkor Wat, spoke with admiration of a sensibility which, in the 16th century, saw Hindus and Buddhists worship side by side in adjoining shrines within the same temple complex. That seems inconceivable today in India, where contestations over places of worship have been reduced to winner-takes-all.

Last outpost standing

Perhaps Son Sann was right, and Cambodia is indeed the last outpost of Indic civilisation in a world increasingly Sinitified. But what exactly does that mean? At a time when the north of India was reeling under waves of conquest and cultural stagnation, our forefathers in the South and East were exporting aspects of Indianness to Southeast Asia. It was an anonymous task, carried out not, for the most part, by warriors blazing across the land bearing swords of conquest, but by individuals who had come in peace, to trade, to teach, and to persuade. Their impact was profound. To this day, the kings of Thailand are crowned in the presence of Brahmin priests; the Muslims of Java still bear Sanskritised names, despite their conversion to Islam, a faith whose adherents normally bear names originating in Arabia; Garuda is Indonesia's national airline, and Ramayana its best-selling brand of clove cigars; even the Philippines has produced a pop-dance ballet about Rama's quest for his kidnapped queen. Many Southeast Asian countries also



mirror the idea of a 'sacred geography': the old Thai kingdom of Ayutthaya derived its name from the Indian Ayodhya, and places in Thailand are associated with events in the Ramayana epic, such as a hill where Hanuman was sent to find the Sanjeevani. Since 1782, Thai kings are still named Rama in continuation of the Ramayana tradition; the current monarch, Vajiralongkorn, is styled Rama X. (The Javanese city of Yogyakarta in Indonesia is also a transliteration of Ayodhya).

Ideas that are inadequate

Indeed the pioneering French Indologist, Sylvain Lévi, spoke and wrote of '*le monde Indien*' or 'greater India', a concept echoed in the American Sanskrit scholar, Sheldon Pollock's 'the Sanskrit cosmopolis'. Both terms refer to countries whose cultures were Indic in the sense of having been strongly influenced by Sanskrit language and literature. For such scholars, the geographical idea of India (the subcontinent bordered by the Arabian Sea, the Bay of Bengal, and the Himalayan mountains) and the geopolitical idea of India (today the Republic of India; at its biggest extent, the British Raj as it was in 1914, or more pragmatically, the British India of 1947) are inadequate – for the civilisational idea of India is much broader.

In a perverse way, it is also narrower, for Indic civilisation was often not as well-entrenched in some parts of today's Republic of

India as it was in countries that were not, for long, part of any Indian polity, such as Myanmar, Thailand, Cambodia, Sri Lanka, Java, Bali, or Sumatra. These countries, at least during large parts of the first millennium CE, were 'culturally as much Indian as Andhra Pradesh or Bangladesh during that very period', argues the French Indologist, Gérard Fussman. 'In these countries, non-Sanskritic languages were spoken and local gods were worshipped. But the language of culture and politics was Sanskrit as in India proper, or Pali; the upper strata's cults were Hindu or Buddhist, as in India proper; artists and architects followed the precepts of Sanskrit technical treatises.'

But contemporary international politics has rendered all this much less significant than the modern indices of strategic thinking, economic interests, and geopolitical affinities. India is far less important to the countries that still bear such 'Indic' influence than, say, China, whose significance is contemporary, rather than civilisational.

The idea of India and beyond

Should we care, and what, if anything, does this have to do with the idea of India? Of course, we should care: no great civilisation can afford to be indifferent to the way in which it is perceived by others. But what, today, is Indic civilisation? Some have argued that India is a 'civilization-state' rather than a 'nation-state', but they anchor the idea of Indian civilisation solely in the Hindu dharma, with no regard for the multiple non-Hindu influences that have undoubtedly helped shape contemporary Indian civilisation. The Huntington idea that the principal fault lines in the world would be between civilisations rather than ideologies – over identity rather than ideas – appeals to votaries of the Hindutva movement, who see Hindu civilisation as the defining characteristic of the Indian nation. Atal Bihari Vajpayee had stated

bluntly: "For me, Hindu Nation and Indian Nation are synonyms." But this is a highly contestable proposition. Can we afford to anchor ourselves in a purely atavistic view of ourselves, hailing the religious and cultural heritage of our forebears without recognising the extent to which we ourselves have changed?

A hybrid

The examples I have cited are, after all, all from the Hindu tradition. But is not Indian civilisation today an evolved hybrid that draws as much from the influence of Islam, Buddhism, Christianity, and Sikhism, not to mention two centuries of British colonial rule? Can we speak of Indian culture today without recognising the influence of cricket, our de facto national sport? When an Indian dons a 'national dress' for a formal event, he wears a variant of the *sherwani*, which did not exist before the Muslim invasions of India.

When Indian Hindus voted a few years ago, in a cynical and contrived competition on the Internet, to select the 'new seven wonders' of the modern world, they voted for the Taj Mahal constructed by a Mughal king, not for Angkor Wat, the most magnificent architectural product of their religion. So, does not Indianness today – composed of elements influenced by various civilisations that have made their homes on Indian soil – subsume the classical Indic civilisation that Son Sann was referring to? It does, and we are all much better for it. Let us treat our civilisational heritage as a matter of pride, and not of parochialism; as a heritage that unites, rather than divides one Indian from another.

Survivor Boris needs more than Johnson's band-aid

The British Prime Minister is relying on populism to pull him through but political challenges loom large

Boris Johnson may have survived the vote of confidence called by his backbenchers on June 6, but his problems are far from over. The ballot revealed that two in five of his parliamentary colleagues voted against him, and though Conservative Party rules currently do not allow for another challenge within 12 months, there has been talk of amending this procedure. After the vote, Mr. Johnson spoke of 'rebooting' his premiership. But the disillusionment of the electorate, and the anger of his own party, including those backbenchers whose votes he needs to pass any legislation, still remain.

Self-created problems

Mr. Johnson's problems are almost entirely of his own making. He has been investigated for – and found guilty of – having broken the strict COVID-19 regulations he shepherded through. There is disgust that while ordinary people locked themselves away, Downing Street seemed awash in a series of alcohol-fuelled parties. Mr. Johnson was pictured at several, but clever legal responses to a police ques-

tionnaire on these gatherings meant that he was fined for only one – a celebration of his birthday, for which his Chancellor, Rishi Sunak, was also fined. The Metropolitan Police issued 126 fines to 83 people for 12 lockdown violations at No. 10 – including gatherings that Mr. Johnson attended. Rallying support before the confidence vote, Mr. Johnson replied to a backbencher's query on the parties with 'I'd do it again'. Bravo or hubris? It is difficult to tell, but what is clear is that for Boris Johnson, rules apply to the little people.

For some in his party, this 'culture of casual law-breaking' is the final straw. A former junior Minister, Jesse Norman, publicly called out the Prime Minister's disregard for the rules and agreements he has made, warning that he is weakening his party and the country in the process. Mr. Johnson is also causing disquiet by the personality traits that have served him politically so well until now: bluster and a keen populist antenna; a refusal to be bound by commitments; and a willingness to tear up the rule book.

The unspoken rule book laid down the expectation that Mr. Johnson would resign when he was fined for breaking the law. Mr. Johnson refused. Instead, he changed the Ministerial Code so that 'minor' breaches would not automatically become a resignation matter. One of Britain's most



respected contemporary historians, Lord Hennessy, has described this as 'a bonfire of decencies' and a challenge to a system of government and governance that, starting with the Constitution, relies heavily on unwritten convention.

Plans and likely hurdles

Seemingly to distract, Mr. Johnson is pushing ahead with a number of plans of doubtful legality. The first is his threat to tear up the Northern Ireland Protocol that he agreed with the European Union (EU) as part of the Brexit Withdrawal Agreement, and which was meant to overcome the obstacles posed by the 1998 Good Friday Agreement, which provides for peace in Northern Ireland by removing the border between Ireland and Northern Ireland. This unilateral rewriting of the agreement is probably illegal. It most certainly will damage Britain's credibility and relations with the EU, which is still its largest trading

partner, Brexit notwithstanding.

Mr. Johnson's government will also face legal challenges over plans to resettle refugees (who have been deemed to have entered the United Kingdom illegally) in Rwanda, a state whose human rights record the U.K. has disparaged. The plan has been criticised as unethical, uneconomical, impractical and possibly illegal by a range of public figures – from the Archbishop of Canterbury, former Prime Minister Theresa May, civil servants in the Home Office, and reportedly, Prince Charles. These concerns are secondary to Mr. Johnson. Those singled out for resettlement will not make a material difference to the total number of refugees, but this dog-whistle distraction will rally the party faithful to the old tried and tested cause of immigration.

Mr. Johnson is relying on populism to pull him through. To a country that is struggling with a cost of living crisis, rising inflation, falling living standards and a sense of dread over rising energy costs, Boris Johnson's promises to the country have been a pledge to return to imperial measurements and to dust off an old plan to offer home ownership to those currently relying on state support but without a plan to build more affordable homes in an already overheated housing market. The resurrection of imperial measurements is emblematic of Mr. Johnson's slipping hold on power. He en-

tered Downing Street on the back of Brexit promises of 'taking back control', returning Britain to its former (presumably imperial) glory, and making Britain a global powerhouse for trade and innovation by paradoxically relying on its historical greatness. Mr. Johnson rallies the faithful by summoning history. A return to pounds and ounces will not bring back the Empire and all the money that flowed to Britain from it. It will not even cause the former colonies to suddenly desire a trade deal with Britain unless it serves their interests.

There are concerns

Mr. Johnson now has to deliver. Perhaps he is only still in Downing Street because there is no obvious replacement. However, the Conservatives will almost certainly lose two by-elections later this month. He has also managed to upset almost every segment of his party for reasons that go beyond his COVID-19 rule breaking. Some disagree with his recent tax rises; others criticise Brexit for either being too extreme for the centrists, or not extreme enough for those on the far right; and yet more are deeply concerned about the personal failings of a flawed individual. For now, Mr. Johnson will limp on, but, barring a political miracle, it is only a matter of time before he is challenged again.

Afghan women's rights are at risk

The growing restrictions on women's rights debunk the myth that Taliban 2.0 is moderate or reformed

In a rare interview, broadcast by CNN on May 17, Afghanistan's Interior Minister and head of the dreaded Haqqani Network, Sirajuddin Haqqani, promised "very good news" soon on the return of girls to secondary schools that have remained shut since March this year, just hours after their reopening. However, any euphoria about this could be misplaced given the number of regressive steps taken by the Taliban to curb women and girls' freedom since they took power in August 2021.

The Taliban's true colours

The initial shock following the Taliban's seizure of power in Kabul is waning. The Taliban, who during the initial period of the takeover had demonstrated a modicum of moderation to gain international acceptability, funding and recognition, have now started showing their true colours. For long-term observers of Afghanistan, this is hardly surprising. Notwithstanding the U.S.-mediated 2020 peace deal, which seemed to erroneously pin hopes on a "reformed" Taliban to govern the country, many observers had issued warnings that the takeover of power by the Taliban would result in the loss of the fragile gains made in Afghanistan over the last two decades.

While there can be a debate over the gains made by the international community in Afghanistan in the last 20 years, it was unmistakable that opportunities for girls and women in education and employment had expanded vastly. Female participation in Afghanistan's labour force had climbed from around 15% in 2009 to nearly 22% in 2019. During my frequent visits to various provinces of Afghanistan, it was always heartening to see women play important roles in the government, parliament, the media, the health and education sectors, and in civil society. They had carved space for themselves in conflict-ridden patriarchal structures and systems. Though the various interventions by the international community on women's issues did not



transform the structures, they did provide opportunities for women to be enablers of change. In parliament, and in the provincial councils of Kandahar, Nangarhar, Badakhshan, Herat, Balkh and others, young women took grave risks in political participation and mobilisation.

Today, those voices are lost. A report from the International Labour Organization in January 2022 found that Afghan women's employment levels fell by an estimated 16% in the third quarter of 2021, compared with 6% for men. By mid-2022, women's employment is expected to be 21% lower than before the Taliban takeover, if current conditions continue. In a rush to reach out to the Taliban during the peace processes, protection of the rights of women were hardly emphasised as a red line. As fatigue towards the war developed within and outside the country, there were barely any concerted efforts in making women rights and human rights a non-negotiable part of the negotiations. The participation of a few Afghan women representatives in the intra-Afghan dialogue in Doha had raised expectations in the international community that the insurgents had reformed and would be willing to accept women's role in Afghan society and government. These hopes were, however, shattered.

There is speculation that the Taliban are in the process of the finalising the dress code in schools for girls. Haqqani did refer to the "requirement" that education should be based on Afghan "culture" and "Islamic rules and principles". He referred "more broadly" to the issue of women wearing the hijab. The Tali-

ban are not just identifying dress codes for girls and women; men too have been asked to wear particular types of clothes and grow a beard, which has led to hair dressers bringing down the shutters on their business. However, with regard to women, the Taliban's diktats have been particularly harsh.

A regressive mindset

Since the capture of power in Kabul, the Taliban have made a series of contradicting moves on the issue of return of women to public life. Initially they referred to the prevalence of chaos and insecurity and asked women to stay indoors. The Taliban's acting Prime Minister, Mullah Mohammad Hassan Akhund, claimed that women would be allowed to continue working under Sharia law, but female government employees in Kabul were then told to stay at home. Only women whose jobs cannot be performed by men were allowed to work. Subsequently, the regime brought in rules which forbade women from venturing out if they were not accompanied by a male relative. On May 7, the Taliban chief, Hibatullah Akhundzada, issued a decree making an all-covering burqa mandatory for women. It is, therefore, unlikely that Haqqani's assurance of "very good news" will reverse the group's regressive outlook.

It is clear that Taliban 2.0 is in no way different from the Taliban that ruled the country between 1996 and 2001. The stories of a "reformed" and "moderate" Taliban, which were narrated by sections of the media, were naïve. I had conducted an interview in May 2012 with Maulvi Qala-

muddin, former Deputy Minister for the General Department for the Promotion of Virtue and Elimination of Vice of the Taliban, a post in which he oversaw the implementation of extreme Islamic laws through religious police squads who kept a close watch of the Afghan populace, at the High Peace Council in Kabul, an Afghan organisation set up by President Hamid Karzai in 2010 to negotiate with the Taliban-led insurgency. When I asked him whether women's rights would be protected if the Taliban were to come back, he responded: "The west does not understand Afghan society. I am not against women working in offices or going out in public alone. Look, you are a foreigner. If you can cover your head and respect our culture, we appreciate and expect the same from Afghan women. The present breed of Afghan women appearing on TV without head scarves is not acceptable. Women need to adhere to the Sharia laws in consonance with the Afghan culture." His answers hardly denoted a change of heart.

The greatest impact of denial of rights for women in the workforce would be a sharp contraction in the economy. In addition to the loss of rights, many households run by women could be starting at a bleak future. As per the World Bank, in 2019, 36% of teachers in the country were women, the highest number for 20 years. But most female educators have been forced out of work by the Taliban's ban on education for girls in March 2022. By the end of 2021, fewer than 100 of Kabul's 700 female journalists were still working (Reporters Without Borders data).

As the war in Ukraine has grabbed and retained international attention, Afghanistan seems to have been forgotten yet again. Occasionally, the plight of Afghan women and the Taliban's atrocities find mention in the media. The Taliban do not shy from leveraging the issue to gain international attention. The international community, therefore, needs to make a concerted and coordinated attempt to protect the rights of Afghan women and girls and ensure that Afghanistan's de facto rulers are held accountable for their actions.

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Rein in the vigilantes

The only long-term and viable way forward for the BJP is through moderation not just in rhetoric but in its politics

The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) is at a crossroads. From a mere two MPs in 1984, it has acquired power across vast swathes of India and at all levels of the decision-making apparatus both within and outside government. Today, no State remains immune to the politics of the BJP. At the height of power, the question confronting the BJP is whether it should become more radically right wing to keep the electorate polarised or moderate its pitch to try and appeal to a diverse electorate. There are indications of both impulses in the BJP, but as the international row over the comments made against Prophet Mohammad by now-suspended members of the party shows, it will be a mistake to assume that a moderate stance can co-exist with radical rabble-rousing.

The party's rabble-rousing

The impulse towards radicalism and polarisation is evident not just in the explosion of hate speech against minorities, as seen in Dharam Sansads where there are open calls for mass murder, the "80-20" rhetoric in the U.P. election, and on other occasions, but in the repeated attempt to force conflict with Muslims and provoke reactions through the hijab controversy in Karnataka, the namaz issue in Gurugram, and the calls to search for shivlings in mosques. These issues are irrelevant to the assertion and consolidation of the Hindu identity unless the basis of Hindu identity is not its own rich cultural ethos but in playing an antagonist to a Muslim protagonist. Serious BJP leaders and supporters try to explain this rabble-rousing in two ways: first, by trying to distance the party from the most egregious instances by labeling such persons as "fringe" or lower-level leaders who are jostling to gain visibility or an upper hand against competitors in factional battles; and second, by dismissing them as one-off crude excesses by hitherto suppressed non-elites who are now finding their voice. These explanations are unconvincing as there is no condemnation of, or action against, these "fringe" actors. Instead, the cadre seems to find an identity and purpose by bullying minorities under the auspices of the BJP leadership.

This strategy is misguided and needs a rethink. The explosion of hate against minorities is against not just national interest but also the BJP's own long-term interest. Lead-

ers trying to establish new organisations often work outside the bounds of mainstream behaviour or law for various reasons such as lack of social or financial capital and increased visibility from shock value to attract committed cadres through sharp messaging, polarisation, etc. However, as organisations acquire power and influence and grow to a certain size, they seek legitimacy to further consolidate their position. In a democracy, winning elections provides legitimacy. But the pursuit of an overtly sectarian agenda delegitimises both the electoral victory and the governance record of the ruling party.

The path ahead

In the last eight years, the BJP has pushed back against any criticism as elite myopia. However, it should be evident that mainstream legitimacy cannot be gained by marginalising 15% of the country's population. This is for two reasons. First, embarrassing excesses are not aberrations but the inevitable tendency of politicians to exaggerate cleavages. If the leadership does not set and enforce boundaries of acceptable behaviour for its cadre, lower-level leaders will trend towards more obnoxious behaviour, thus moving the party outside of the present leadership's own comfort zone. This is already visible in the criticism of the BJP leadership by a section of its supporters online for the action taken against the two BJP office bearers. Second, the conflict that is being pursued by a section of the leadership with 15% of the population will inevitably strain the rule of law and impact governance.

In the absence of an assertive national opposition, it will be a mistake to assume that repeated electoral victories are vindication of divisive politics. There is evidence around the country of people becoming weary of the constant hate and the specter of widespread violence, but they lack a national political platform to channelise this disenchantment into meaningful opposition. Moreover, the kind of politics being pursued by the BJP now will also make it difficult for it to find allies in the future to counterbalance the inevitable anti-incumbency of two terms. The only long-term and viable way forward for the BJP then is through moderation – not just in rhetoric but in its politics. The strand of welfare-driven, cultural nationalism being pursued by the BJP is within the realm of mainstream politics and provides a ready template for the party of the future. How the BJP will evolve is for its leadership to decide. However, it must rein in vigilantes and make it clear that the path to advancement in the party does not lie in propagating hate.

It is Naveen Patnaik all the way

By defeating the BJP in successive elections, the BJD continues to be the dominant party in Odisha

In the Brajaraj Nagar bypoll in Odisha, Alaka Mohanty, the Biju Janata Dal (BJD) candidate, polled 61.24% of the votes, beating the Congress and BJP candidates hollow. This was the BJD's fifth bypoll victory on the trot. With this win, the BJD's strength in the 147-member Assembly has gone up to 113 and the Naveen Patnaik-led regional party has shown just how seemingly invincible it is at this point. In the March 2022 rural polls, the BJD had won nearly 90% or 766 of the 852 Zilla Parishad seats. The BJP and Congress had to contend with 42 and 37 seats, respectively. The BJD later swept the urban body polls too, by winning 76 of the 108 civic bodies.

What do these victories signify for the BJD? In the 2019 Lok Sabha polls, the BJD had won eight seats and secured 38.4% of the votes. In the Assembly elections that year, it dislodged the Congress from the second position by winning 23 of the 147 seats. It created a massive buzz around these victories. This apparently did not go down well with Mr. Patnaik, who is known as a silent yet ruthless leader in electoral politics. The BJD's victories in subsequent elections showed his determination in halting the BJP's march. The Brajaraj Nagar bypoll result is especially important as the Assembly segment is part of the Barghar parliamentary constituency, which the BJP had won in 2019. The BJD has been trying to re-consolidate its position in the districts of western Odisha, which are considered a BJP stronghold. In most of the bypolls after the 2019 elections, the BJD supremo did not campaign in person for the party. He sent out the message that the BJD has a robust election machinery and did not need him for canvassing every time.

For the BJP, the bypoll loss was humiliating as it had fielded Union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan. With the BJD's winning streak, the BJP appears to be losing the sig-

nificant inroads it had made into the regional party's bastions in the 2017 panchayat and 2019 Assembly elections.

Mr. Patnaik, who is serving his fifth term as Chief Minister, is the undisputed leader of his party. Political observers say the manner in which he reconstituted his cabinet after the Brajaraj Nagar bypoll victory was unprecedented. He directed all the ministers to tender their resignation. After the formation of the new council of ministers, Mr. Patnaik invited 11 of the dropped ministers to work for the organisation. No murmurs were heard against the decision.

If there is one issue which sent the BJD government into a panic in recent times, it was the controversy over its flagship beautification programme of the Shree Jagannath Temple, Puri, which the government is trying to develop along the lines of the Kashi-Vishwanath Corridor project. The BJP had alleged that the project would pose a threat to the safety and stability of the temple. However, the Supreme Court dismissed the petition challenging the project and provided relief to the BJD. Significantly, Jagannath Saraka, the tribal leader from Rayagada, was called to take oath ahead of others in the new ministry despite not being a senior minister nor holding a key portfolio. Mr. Patnaik is known for such symbolism. The Shree Mandira Parikrama Project, Mr. Patnaik's temple development programme, is aimed at blocking all of the BJP's efforts to challenge the BJD.

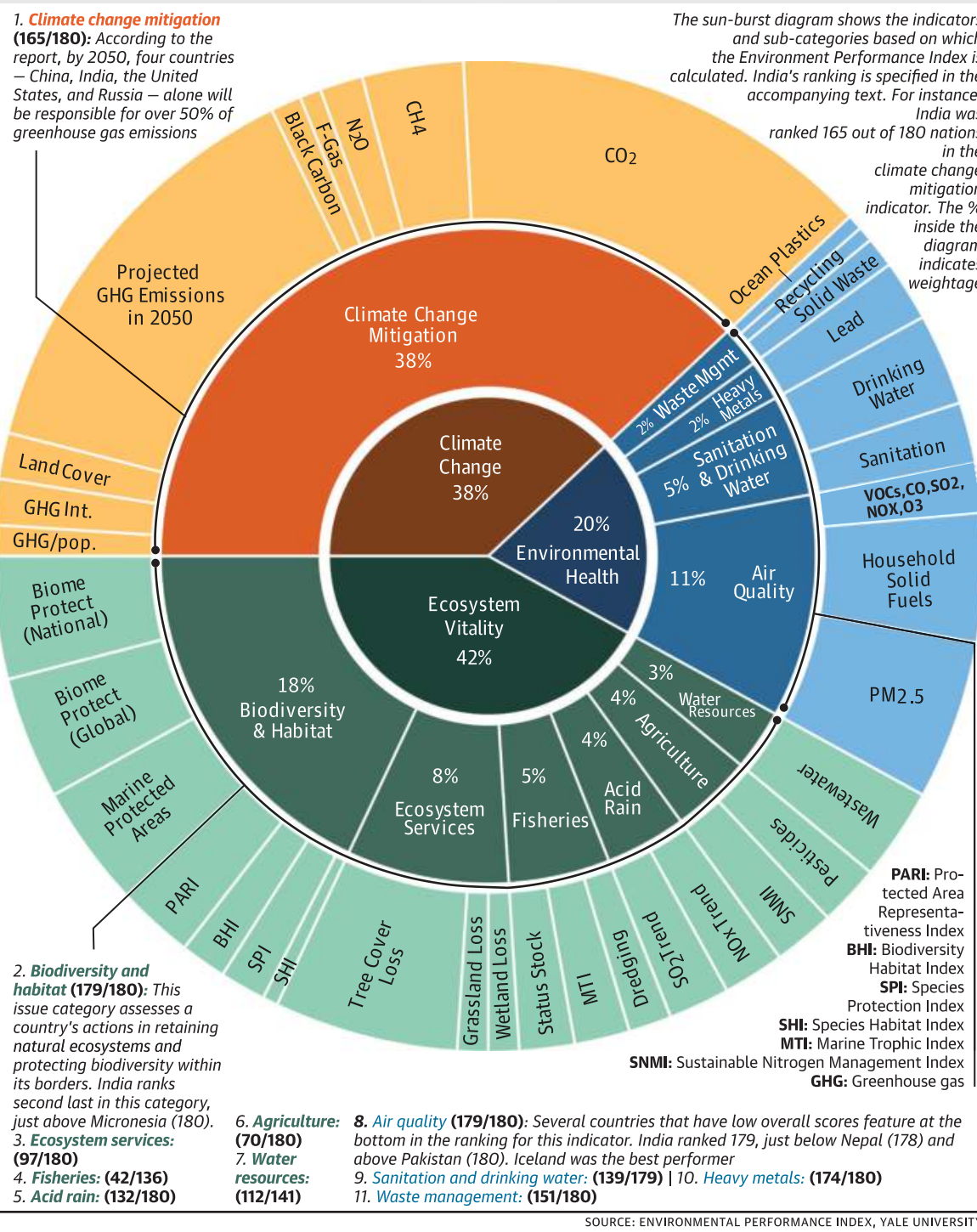
The bypoll victory, the reshuffle, and the redevelopment of the surroundings of the Jagannath temple appear to have energised Mr. Patnaik, who is said to be undertaking his first foreign tour in a decade at the end of this month. In 2012, the BJD supremo had faced a revolt when he was abroad. Ten years later, it is clear that he is in absolute command.

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DATA POINT

Environment index: India ranked last

India scored the lowest among 180 countries in the Environment Performance Index (EPI) 2022, published by researchers from Yale and Columbia Universities. Denmark ranked first with an overall score of 77.90, while India scored 18.90. The report assesses countries on 40 performance indicators which are further grouped into 11 issue categories. At the core of the report lie three policy objectives: environmental health, ecosystem vitality and climate change. The index scores countries between 0 and 100, from worst to best performance. A perfect 100 score indicates that the country has achieved an internationally recognised sustainability target or the expert consensus of good performance. Among the 11 issue categories, India's performance was poorest in air quality (179), exposure to heavy metals (174), quality of bio-diversity and habitat (179) and climate change mitigation (165)

FIFTY YEARS AGO JUNE 13, 1972

People abandon homes for fields

Vijayawada, June 12: Afraid of fire outbreaks, hundreds of people in some of the villages in Krishna district have abandoned their homes and are living in the open fields. Besides those rendered shelterless by the fires, there were also people who dismantled their thatched roof houses and moved with their families to the fields with conviction that it is easier to brave the hot sun than the devastating fires. A visit to Poranki, Vanukuru, Gosala Godavarru and Kolavenu villages – all of which have been hit by fires in the last one week – revealed that the villagers are haunted by fears of arson. They have formed squads and are keeping vigil round the clock. They would not allow a stranger to enter the village without interrogating them. They are taking extreme precaution in handling the ovens. This morning a woman in a vacant site at Kolavenu village was seen pouring a bucket of water to put out the fire in an oven. Vanukuru and Kolavenu saw the fires again devastate houses and haystacks on a much larger scale yesterday. With hundreds of haystacks destroyed, fodder has become a problem in the villages. Even palmyrah leaves, which are traditionally used for roofing, are not available in sufficient quantity.

A HUNDRED YEARS AGO JUNE 13, 1922

An ear to hear ants' talk

A remarkable sound-magnifying device has been produced says a correspondent. It is known as the radio phone, and is stated to be the most powerful sound-amplifier known. By means of it sounds that are just audible to the human ear are intensified many thousands of times, as is necessary in wireless telephony, but the instrument also enables sounds whose frequency is too high to affect our ear-drums, and which we consequently do not hear, to be so modified and magnified that they are audible. Hence, the radiophone should prove of great value to botanists and etymologists in enabling them to listen to the noises made by insects, which although normally inaudible, are nevertheless made, since the microscope has shown the presence of soul-producing organs. It may even be possible to detect some definite means of communication between ants, bees, and other insects who live in highly organised communities. It is known that such insects communicate by touch, but this does not entirely negativise the chance that they "speak" as well.

Legacy waste

<20 The percentage by which the legacy waste at the three landfill sites — Ghazipur, Okhla and Bhalswa — in Delhi has been processed since the project to flatten the mountains of garbage started in October 2019, while the deadline is just two and a half years away. Rising power demand

The region was considered a safe haven for Maoists as it is surrounded on three sides by the Balimela reservoir. A dense forest on one side connects it to Andhra Pradesh. **PTI**

Sinking low

3.32 lakh, the value at which Iran's currency reached on Sunday — its lowest value ever — as talks to revive the country's tattered nuclear deal remained deadlocked. The rial's new low came as U.S. sanctions against the country are still in force. Iran's economy is struggling because of the U.S. pullout from the 2015 nuclear deal between Iran and world powers that restored sanctions on Iran's oil and banking sectors. Understanding the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation

Why was the OIC established? What has been its role in the international arena?

THE GIST

■ The OIC was established at a 1969 summit in Rabat (Morocco). It endeavours to establish solidarity among member states, support restoration of complete sovereignty and territorial integrity of any member state under occupation; protect, defend and combat defamation of Islam, prevent growing dissent in Muslim societies and work to ensure that member states take a united stand on the international stage.

The story so far: On June 5, the General Secretariat of the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) "condemned and denounced" the comments on Prophet Muhammed made by two erstwhile national spokespersons of the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP). Referring to it as part of "growing spate of hatred and defamation of Islam in India", it sought that the perpetrators are brought to justice and held accountable. In response, Arindam Bagchi, spokesperson at the Ministry of External Affairs, stated that India rejected the OIC Secretariat's "unwarranted" and "narrow-minded" comments. He said that the views expressed by the two individuals did not reflect the views of the Indian government and that relevant authorities had already initiated strong actions against them.

What is the OIC?

The OIC claims to be the "collective voice of the Muslim world". It was established at a 1969 summit in Rabat (Morocco) after what it describes as the 'criminal arson' of Al-Aqsa Mosque in the disputed city of Jerusalem. The OIC endeavours to establish solidarity among member states, support restoration of complete sovereignty and territorial integrity of any member state under occupation; protect, defend and combat defamation of Islam, prevent growing dissent in Muslim societies and work to ensure that member states take a united stand at the UN General Assembly, Human Rights Council and other international fora. The OIC has consultative and cooperative relations with the UN and other inter-governmental organisations to protect the interest of Muslims, and settle conflicts and disputes involving member states, among them being the territorial conflict between Armenia and Azerbaijan and the status of Jammu & Kashmir. Presently based in Jeddah, the organisation plans to permanently move its headquarters to East Jerusalem once the disputed city is 'liberated'. Moreover, it aspires to hold Israel accountable for 'war crimes' and violations of international law.

The organisation adheres to a charter that lays out its objectives, principles and operating mechanism. First adopted in 1972,

the charter has been revised multiple times in line with emerging conditions in the developing world. The present charter was adopted in March 2008 at Dakar in Senegal. It enshrines that all members be guided and inspired by the noble Islamic teachings and values alongside committing themselves to the purposes and principles of the UN charter. Member states are expected to uphold and promote good governance, democracy, human rights, fundamental freedom and the rule of law — settling disputes through peaceful means and refraining from the use of threat or force.

In addition, the OIC carved out a 10-year Programme of Action (PoA). Last instituted for the decade ending 2025, the PoA calls for measures to combat all aspects of terrorism globally. It also talks of implementing social schemes to eliminate two-thirds of extreme poverty and spurring industrialisation, investment, trade and overall economic and social growth among member states.

How does the OIC function?

The Islamic Summit, composed of Kings and heads of state, is the supreme authority of the organisation. Convening every two years, it deliberates, takes policy decisions, provides guidance on issues relevant to the organisation and considers issues of concern to the member states. The Council of Foreign Ministers is the chief decision-making body and meets annually to decide on how to implement the OIC's general policies. In addition, this council also appoints, for a period of five years, the Secretary General, who is the chief administrative officer of the grouping. The Secretary General follows up on implementation of the decisions, directs attention to competent organs' specific issues of concern, creates a channel for coordination among the varied organs and submits annual reports on the work undertaken. Former Foreign Affairs Minister of Chad, Houssein Ibrahim Taha, is the current Secretary General, taking up the role in November 2021.

UN members with a Muslim majority can join the organisation. The membership is to be ratified with full consensus at the OIC's Council of Foreign Ministers. The same provisions apply for acquiring an observer status. All decision-making in the forum

requires a quorum defined by the presence of two-thirds of the member states and complete consensus. In case a consensus cannot be reached, decisions shall be made by a two-thirds majority of members present and voting.

The OIC is financed by the member states proportionate to their national incomes. Should a member fail to meet their obligations such that the amount of arrears equals or exceeds the amount of contributions due from it for the preceding two years, their voting rights are suspended. The member is only allowed to vote if the Council of Foreign Ministers is satisfied that the failure is due to conditions beyond the member's control. The OIC also has standing committees for cooperation on information and cultural affairs, economic and commercial matters, scientific and technological initiatives and for Jerusalem.

What has been the nature of India's relationship with the OIC?

India's association with the 57-nation grouping has not been easy. Even though the country has good relations with the United Arab Emirates (UAE) and Saudi Arabia, its membership and engagement has been constantly challenged by Pakistan. In 1969, Islamabad's opposition to Indian participation at the first OIC Plenary resulted in the Indian delegation being turned back from the venue at the last minute.

About 50 years later, External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj addressed the OIC Plenary of Foreign Ministers in Abu Dhabi as a guest of honour. The invitation was extended by the UAE's Foreign Minister Sheikh Abdullah bin Zayed Al Nahyan. In 2018, Bangladesh had proposed India be given the observer status at the OIC considering its sizeable Muslim population — a move which received support from Turkey but was opposed by Pakistan. Political analyst Ketan Mehta of the Observer Research Foundation wrote in 2019 that Islamabad's apprehension stems from the fear that India's involvement in the grouping could influence the opinion of other Muslim states — not boding well for its influence.

What have been the criticisms against the OIC grouping?

Brookings Institution analyst Turan Kayaoglu



wrote in 2020 that the OIC had become a premise for 'window dressing', more interested in the rights of Muslim minorities in places such as Palestine or Myanmar than the human rights violations of its member states. The author noted that the body lacks power and resources to investigate human rights violations or enforce its decisions through signed treaties and declarations.

Experts have also pointed to the fact that the organisation is largely restricted to arbitrating in conflicts where both parties are Muslims. This is because the organisation is centred around Quranic values, which, it believes, makes it a qualified arbitrator. The according of observer status at the UN to the Palestine Liberation Organisation is considered among its major successes.

Al Sharq Forum analyst Abdullah al-Ahsan, in an article in 2019 — the 50th anniversary of the organisation — noted that the OIC has failed to establish a cooperative venture among its members, who were either capital-rich and labour-scarce countries or manpower-rich and capital scarce. "...the organization has not evolved to become a significant player either in international politics or in the area of economic cooperation," Mr. Al-Ahsan wrote.

The FATF and Pakistan's position on its 'grey list'

How is Pakistan aiming to get itself removed from the Financial Action Task Force's grey list?

The story so far: Ahead of the plenary session of the Financial Action Task Force (FATF), the global financial crime watchdog, from June 14 to 17 in Berlin, Pakistan which continues to face an economic crunch, is hoping for some respite in the form of its removal from the FATF's 'grey list' or the list of countries presenting a risk to the global financial system.

In its last plenary meeting in March, the FATF had retained Pakistan's listing, asking it to expeditiously address the remaining deficiencies in its financial system.

What is the FATF?

The Financial Action Task Force is an international watchdog for financial crimes such as money laundering and terror financing. It was established at the G7 Summit of 1989 in Paris to address loopholes in the global financial system after member countries raised concerns about growing money laundering activities. In the aftermath of the 9/11 terror attack on the U.S., FATF also added terror financing as a main focus area. This was later broadened to include restricting the funding of weapons of mass destruction.

The FATF currently has 39 members.

The decision-making body of the FATF, known as its plenary, meets thrice a year. Its meetings are attended by 206 countries of the global network, including members, and observer organisations, such as the World Bank, some offices of the United Nations, and regional development banks.

The FATF sets standards or recommendations for countries to achieve in order to plug the holes in their financial systems and make them less vulnerable to illegal financial activities. It conducts regular peer-reviewed evaluations called Mutual Evaluations (ME) of countries to check their performance on standards prescribed by it. The reviews are carried out by FATF and FATF-Style Regional Bodies (FSRBs), which then release Mutual Evaluation Reports (MERs). For the countries that don't perform well on certain standards, time-bound action plans are drawn up.

Recommendations for countries range from assessing risks of crimes to setting up legislative, investigative and judicial mechanisms to pursue cases of money laundering and terror funding.

What are FATF's 'grey' and 'black' lists?

While the words 'grey' and 'black' list do not exist in the official FATF lexicon, they designate countries that need to work on complying with FATF directives and those who are non-compliant, respectively.

At the end of every plenary meeting, FATF comes out with two lists of countries. The grey countries are designated as "jurisdictions under increased monitoring", working with the FATF to counter criminal financial activities. For such countries, the watchdog does not tell other members to carry out due-diligence measures vis-a-vis the listed country but does tell them to consider the risks such countries possess. Currently, 23 countries including Pakistan are on the grey list.

As for the black list, it means countries designated as 'high-risk jurisdictions subject to call for action'. In this case, the countries have considerable deficiencies in their AML/CFT (anti-money laundering and counter terrorist financing) regimens and the body calls on members and

non-members to apply enhanced due diligence. In the most serious cases, members are told to apply counter-measures such as sanctions on the listed countries. Currently, North Korea and Iran are on the black list.

Being listed under the FATF's lists makes it hard for countries to get aid from organisations like the International Monetary Fund (IMF), Asian Development Bank (ADB), and the European Union. It may also affect capital inflows, foreign direct investments, and portfolio flows.

Why is Pakistan on the grey list?

Pakistan was retained on the grey list in March as it was yet to address concerns on the front of terror financing investigations and prosecutions targeting senior leaders and commanders of UN designated terrorist groups. Diplomatic sources in Pakistan told *The Hindu* that steps had been taken in this direction such as the sentencing of terror outfit chief Hafiz Saeed, prosecution of Masood Azhar, arrest of about 300 other designated terrorists, and the seizure of more than 1,100 properties owned by terror groups. India meanwhile, a member of FATF, suspects the efficacy and permanence of Pakistani actions. Pakistan is currently banking on its potential exclusion from the grey list to

help improve the status of tough negotiations with the International Monetary Fund to get bailout money.

Pakistan has found itself on the grey list frequently since 2008, for weaknesses in fighting terror financing and money laundering. In 2009, the country began to cooperate with the FATF-like regional body, Asia Pacific Group (APG), for a ME process.

On completion of the ME in June 2010, Pakistan made a "high-level political commitment" to the FATF and APG to address its strategic AML/CFT deficiencies. It was given an action plan which required demonstrating adequate criminalisation of money laundering and terrorist financing as well as showing adequate measures to identify, freeze and confiscate terrorist assets.

It was taken off the list in 2015 owing to its progress but was put back on it in 2018. It was given a 27-point action plan to restrict terror financing activities. After warnings and two deadline extensions on the first plan, Pakistan was prescribed another seven-point action plan by the APG in 2021, focused specifically on combating money laundering. In March, Pakistan informed FATF that it had completed 32 of the total 34 action items in the two plans but was retained on the list. The FATF gave it time till January 2023 to complete the 2021 plan.

The crypto conundrum

Bitcoin and other cryptocurrencies may be scarce but it is questionable whether they possess any use value or exchange value

THE GIST

■ Bitcoin and other cryptocurrencies neither offer direct use value nor possess significant exchange value – bitcoin can buy you very few real goods and services. In short, cryptocurrencies possess no significant fundamental value to sustain their current high prices.

Sticking true to its unpredictable nature, cryptocurrencies are registering huge losses in value. From the fall of Terra (Luna), the current bear market is showing a downfall for most cryptocurrencies like Bitcoin, Ethereum etc. In this article dated November 1, 2021, Prashanth Perumal talks about the fundamental lack of value offered by cryptocurrencies which make them risky assets as well as volatile investments.

Bitcoin and other private cryptocurrencies have been on a bull run recently. Unlike previous rallies, the current rally in bitcoin has witnessed the increasing participation of retail investors in India. Since 2020, when the Supreme Court overturned an order by the Reserve Bank of India dated April 6, 2018, restricting the use of cryptocurrencies, traffic in domestic cryptocurrency exchanges in India has grown many-fold. Yet, the future of bitcoin and other cryptocurrencies is unlikely to be as bright as many believe it to be.

A case of speculative mania?

The most important feature of cryptocurrencies that is flaunted by their enthusiasts is their limited supply. In a world where central banks create a lot of money out of thin air, it is natural for investors who are looking to protect their wealth to seek abode in alternative assets whose supply cannot be cranked up as easily. Money creation by central banks causes the price of all goods to rise and also tends to accelerate the adoption of alternative assets as currencies. When central banks create a lot of money, it leads to an increase in the prices of not just goods such as food and cars but also that of commodities such as gold and silver, considered to be alternative forms of money. Yet, for various reasons, the rally in bitcoin may be no more than a case of speculative mania.

For one, scarcity alone is not sufficient to

facilitate the adoption of cryptocurrencies as money. Any asset must have either use value or exchange value in order for it to possess any fundamental value. This fundamental value, in turn, is reflected in the price of these assets in the long run. Stocks and bonds, for instance, possess exchange value that is based on the expected future cash flow from these assets. Commodities such as oil and steel possess use value because these assets are used to run vehicles and build real estate. Bitcoin and other cryptocurrencies may be scarce but it is questionable whether they possess any use value or exchange value. Gold and silver have traditionally served as hedges against inflation because they possess fundamental value derived from their use as jewellery and money. But bitcoin and other cryptocurrencies neither offer direct use value nor possess significant exchange value – bitcoin can buy you very few real goods and services. In short, cryptocurrencies possess no significant fundamental value to sustain their current high prices.

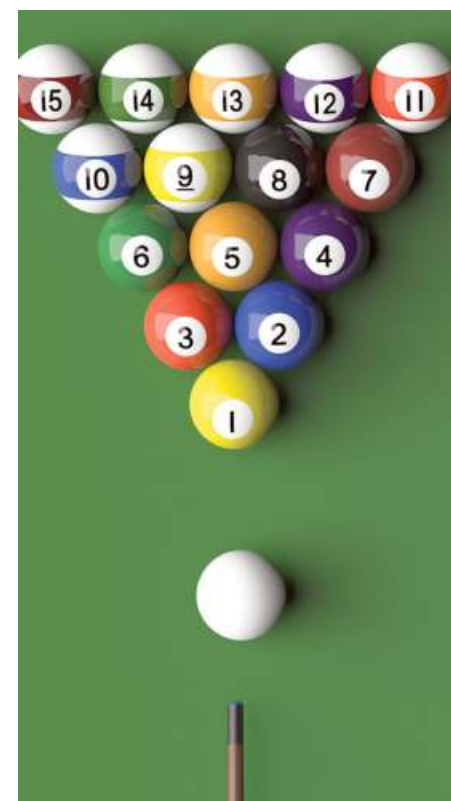
Yet, many believe that the rising prices of cryptocurrencies reflect their likely future value as a currency. It is possible that investors are bidding up the price of bitcoin because they foresee a future in which private currency is widely accepted as money. After all, all investments are forward-looking. One may also grant that the extreme volatility seen in the price of cryptocurrencies, which seems unrelated to any similar fluctuations in their fundamentals, may be due to the nascent, illiquid nature of the cryptocurrency market. However, the more cryptocurrencies are accepted in exchange for

goods and services, the greater the chances of governments cracking down on them.

Issuance of money

The monopoly that governments (and central banks) possess over the issuance of money is at the root of their power and influence. This allows governments to fund their budget deficits, particularly during times of crises such as the current pandemic when tax revenues have taken an unprecedented hit. It also allows central banks to tinker with the money supply under the mandate of managing aggregate demand in the economy. In essence, monopoly control over money allows governments to indirectly tax citizens by increasing the supply of currencies, thus devaluing them. If cryptocurrencies like bitcoin are going to challenge fiat currencies like the U.S. dollar as a medium of exchange, they would essentially be challenging the authority of the government to print and spend. This is not an assault that governments will tolerate for long. They will allow cryptocurrencies to exist only as long as these currencies remain a speculative asset and not a medium of exchange.

This is not to say that governments are justified in their crackdown against cryptocurrencies. China recently imposed a complete ban on all cryptocurrencies and plans to issue its own central bank-issued digital currency. Private alternatives to fiat currencies offer people greater choice in what currencies they choose to use as a medium of exchange. The benefits of free market competition in money were elaborated by economist Friedrich Hayek in *The Denationalization of Money*. Most notably, competition between currencies to cater to the demands of customers would ensure that fiat currencies that are printed indiscriminately simply go out of use. This is the outcome that governments fear and would fight to avoid at any cost.

Behind the eight ball

I hope you don't take a hiatus from learning English

What is the meaning and origin of 'behind the eight ball'? (R.V. Nagesh, Hyderabad)

This expression is mostly used in American English in informal contexts. When you say that you are 'behind the eight or 8 ball', you are implying that you are in big trouble; you are in a difficult or a disadvantageous situation, one from which you are unlikely to escape. You feel doomed because you don't see yourself finding a solution to the problem.

Poor Anita. She got COVID a month ago, and now she's behind the eight ball with all her assignments.

If the company continues to spend money the way it's doing now, it'll soon find itself behind the eight ball.

Many of the idioms that we use in everyday contexts come from the world of sports. The same is true of the expression 'behind the eight ball'; it comes from the world of pool or pocket billiards. The balls used to play these games are usually numbered. In one version of the game, a player has to pocket the balls sequentially – in other words, he is supposed to pocket the ball marked one first, and then two, and so on and so forth. The eight ball is to be pocketed last – and till such time, no player is allowed to touch it. If the cue ball touches the eight ball at any time, the player is penalised; and if a player accidentally pockets the eight ball before the other balls have been pocketed, he automatically loses the game. So, when a player finds the cue ball behind the eight ball, he is in serious trouble – he may find it difficult to make a shot without touching it.

How is the word 'hiatus' pronounced?

(K. Reema, Bengaluru)
The word consists of three syllables. The first sounds like the word 'hi', while the 'a' in the following syllable is pronounced like the 'ay' in 'pay', 'hay' and 'say'. The 'u' sounds like the 'a' in 'china'. The word is pronounced 'hi-AY-tes' with the stress on the second syllable. It comes from the Latin 'hiatus' meaning 'opening' or 'gap'. Nowadays, the word is mostly used in formal contexts to mean 'a break in an activity' – a break which could be intentional or accidental. A hiatus suggests the complete suspension of an activity – the duration of which can vary from a few days to several years. A five-minute break from an activity cannot be considered a hiatus.

In terms of grammar, is it okay to say, 'I'll be returning back to Hyderabad on 30 June'?

The simple answer to the question is yes – there is nothing grammatically wrong with the statement. The problem here is not one of grammar, but of usage. Dictionaries define 'return' as 'to go back or come back'. In other words, 'back' is implied when we use 'return'. It is for this reason that careful users of the language argue that 'back' is unnecessary in the sentence. It is redundant.

Adani power project sparks row in Sri Lanka

The energy project is the second major venture in Sri Lanka involving the Adani Group, after it bagged a strategic port terminal deal in Colombo. The Group was brought in to execute the West Container Terminal project at the Colombo Port, with majority stakes, after Colombo unilaterally cancelled a trilateral agreement among the governments of Sri Lanka and India and Japan to jointly build the East Container Terminal at the same port.

The Adani Group, Sri Lankan Ministers have said, was the Indian government's "nominee" in both cases, indicating there was no competitive bidding process. Similarly, there is no information of a tendering

process having preceded the energy agreement signed by the Group and the CEB. Even the agreement was not officially publicised by either side, and came to light only after Sri Lankan media reported on the development.

Further, India is also executing hybrid energy projects in three islands off Jaffna Peninsula, after displacing a Chinese energy project.

Though China had won the contract for the project through an Asian Development Bank-backed international competitive bid, Sri Lanka opted for the Indian grant project, following New Delhi's "concerns" with a Chinese project close to India's southern coast.

Protests on in Bengal, more people arrested

While Mr. Mohammad's family accused the administration of vendetta and said their house was demolished without any legal sanction, Prayagraj District Magistrate Sanjay Kumar Khatri said the demolition was carried out following the "laid-down procedure" after issuing proper notices to the house owners.

The family, however, said they were not aware of any such proceedings apart from a notice carrying backdated information stuck on their house the night before the demolition.

Mr. Mohammad is a member of the federal committee of the Welfare Party of India, headed by SQR Ilyas, father of jailed JNU student leader Umar Khalid. His daughter Afreen Fatima is a student-activist based in Delhi.

Senior Superintendent of

Police (Prayagraj) Ajay Kumar said Mr. Mohammad had emerged as the "facilitator" of the stone-throwing and other violence in the Atala area of Prayagraj on Friday. While the police had earlier blamed him for organising the protest and sent his mobile phone for forensic probe, on Sunday, Mr. Kumar said they recovered "illegal weapons," a 12 bore illegal country-made pistol, a 315 bore pistol and some cartridges, and "objectionable posters" from the building.

AIMIM president Asaduddin Owaisi joined a large number of social media users to condemn the demolition. Samajwadi Party chief Akhilesh Yadav said the demolition did not have any sanction. The family later filed a petition in the Allahabad High Court.

Sonu Vinod Kumar, 25, said his blood pressure fluctuated whenever he wore the watch. "When I complained about this, the authorities said I have to keep wearing it while working; else, my salary will get deducted," he said.

Krishan Kumar Chadha, the former president of the Chandigarh Sanitation Workers' Union, said, "This [GPS watches] is a sword hanging above us. They are after our *safai karamchari* community. We want this to stop."

Several times, the GPS watches showed locations wrong, Mr. Chadha said, citing instances when sanitation workers working at Sector 20, Chandigarh were shown to be located in Ludhiana, Badrinath, Ambala and elsewhere. "This has made us a slave. We are not free," Mr. Chadha said.

Bhuvaneshwar Kewat, a workers' union leader in Ranchi, said the civic body in the city had bought 900 GPS-enabled watches. "They have not yet been forced upon the workers," Mr. Kewat said adding that most of them belonged to the Dalit community.

"There was a time when the people from the Dalit community were made to attach a broom around their waist, just to indicate that they are from a particular community. These GPS watches are a new form of suppression," Mr. Kewat said.

Recently, the All India Lawyers' Association for Justice (AILA) and the Internet Freedom Foundation wrote a joint letter to the National Commission for *Safai Karamcharis* (NCSK) over the increasing surveillance of these workers in the country. The two organisations expressed concern over the effect of these actions on the privacy, dignity and auton-

my of the workers. "We have not seen any notification or order on the basis of which they are doing it. They are definitely violating the fundamental right to privacy of these workers," Anushka Jain of the foundation, told *The Hindu*.

"The sanitation workers are being made to work more as a result of this tracking device. We don't know how they [Corporation] are ensuring that work is being done just by tracking the workers' location. A worker might go to his or her place of work and just loiter," Ms. Jain argued.

"While there is no law specifically which talks about these issues in India, the Supreme Court's landmark judgment on the right to privacy is being violated in this situation," she said.

AILA national convener Clifton D'Rozario, said: "While privacy is not an absolute right, any State intrusion into privacy has to satisfy the thresholds of legality, necessity, and proportionality, laid down by the Supreme Court in the Right to Privacy decision. However, the use of tracking devices on *safai karamcharis* fails to satisfy these thresholds as there is no anchoring legislation or legal framework."

Mr. Clifton said sanitation workers continue to suffer under the contract system. "Instead of addressing basic issues, new forms of surveillance are introduced."

2 arrested in connection with Jama Masjid protest in Delhi

Sections pertaining to promoting enmity between groups added to FIR, say police

Two days after a brief protest was held at the Jama Masjid against the remarks made by suspended BJP spokesperson Nupur Sharma on Prophet Muhammed, two persons have been arrested by the Delhi Police in connection with the agitation, officers said on Sunday.

The police have also added Sections of the Indian Penal Code pertaining to promoting enmity between different groups on grounds of religion to the existing first information report lodged on Friday, under Sections pertaining to order duly promulgated by public servant.

Over 300 persons on Friday staged a protest at the Jama Masjid following the Fri-

day prayers, demanding Ms. Sharma's arrest. The police had lodged a case against the protesters for holding the agitation without permission and promoting enmity between

different groups. The protesters were later removed by the police.

Deputy Commissioner of Police (Central) Shweta Chauhan said Mohammed

Nadeem, 45, an electrician and Faheem Khan, 37, a vegetable vendor, were arrested on Saturday night.

"After the Friday prayers, Khan was seen with a poster and was raising slogans. He was also seen hooting and shouting, protesting against Ms. Sharma and Naveen Jindal during the unlawful assembly at Jama Masjid. Nadeem was also seen raising slogans in the crowd," Ms. Chauhan said.

Senior officers said the protesters were mobilised through WhatsApp groups and more details about such groups were being gathered. Ms. Chauhan said the protests were planned and that since the protests took place without permission, appropriate action would be taken against those identified.

'No compromise on honour of the Prophet'

Bangladesh Minister Hasan Mahmud hopes India will take action against former BJP leaders

"We have had no success in locating them despite immediate and extensive searches involving aerial reconnaissance and tracker dogs," the spokesperson said.

'India in talks for more Apache, Chinook choppers'

F/A-18 E/F Super Hornet fighter has distinct advantages over Rafale-M, says Boeing official

The F/A-18 E/F Super Hornet fighter jet has distinct advantages in terms of capability over the competitor French Rafale-M jet to operate from the Indian Navy's aircraft carriers, says a senior official from aircraft manufacturer Boeing. India is also negotiating the purchase of additional Chinook CH-47F(I) Chinook heavy-lift helicopters and AH-64E Apache attack helicopters, according to Torbjorn (Turbo) Sjogren, vice-president, International Government and Defence, Boeing.

"One thing we are very confident about is the capability that readiness and the proficiency of the product.

The F/A-18 and F/A-18F can operate off Indian aircraft carriers. That's a clear discriminator we've got over the French," Mr. Turbo said in a virtual interview to *The Hindu*, pointing that the twin seater trainer variant of the Rafale-M cannot operate from carriers and would be sitting on the ground. The number of trainer aircraft within the deal is not an insignificant number, he noted.

Elaborating, he said the size of the carrier, the logistics of the aircraft, in terms of how many aircraft and how to move the aircraft around the carrier, there are challenges. "We have solved that problem. Our team down in Bangalore solved

the problem, and we have a solution for that... So there is some tailoring needed, more so in terms of the logistics on board," Mr. Turbo said.

The Navy had originally projected a requirement of 57 aircraft under the deal,

but the number is likely to be revised to 26 within the backdrop of a new indigenous twin engine carrier-based deck fighter being designed and developed indigenously. "We are eager to see when they define what the need is going to be and then how to do it," he said.

With the indigenous carrier *Vikrant* set to be commissioned in August, the Navy is in urgent need of carrier based jets to operate from both the carriers.

Last month, two Boeing F/A-18s were in Goa to demonstrate their compatibility and suitability to operate from Indian aircraft carriers by conducting trials from the Indian Navy's Shore Based Test Facility (SBTF). Ra-

fale-M had carried out similar demonstration earlier this year.

The Indian Air Force operates 22 Apache attack helicopters and 15 Chinook heavy-lift helicopters procured from Boeing through the Foreign Military Sales programme of the U.S. government under a \$3 billion deal in September 2015. Further, during the visit of U.S. President Donald Trump in February 2020, India signed a deal for six more Apaches to cost around \$800 million.

Talking of the large portfolio of products with the Indian armed forces, Mr. Turbo said, "The performance of our products is instrumental in terms of those campaigns going forward."

Three Lashkar militants killed in Pulwama, another near Srinagar

Three militants of the Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) were killed during an encounter in Pulwama district of south Kashmir, the police said on Sunday.

"Incriminating material, arms and ammunition, including two AK-47 rifles and a pistol, have also been recovered," he said.

Report on 50-km BSF jurisdiction limits ready

A blueprint that defines the extended jurisdiction of the Border Security Force (BSF) and its new logistical requirements in frontier States has been prepared and is soon expected to be submitted to the Union Home Ministry, officials said.

While in Punjab, West Bengal and Assam, the BSF jurisdiction, from the border towards the hinterland, was enhanced from the earlier 15 km to 50 km, in Gujarat the same limit has been reduced from 80 km to 50 km, while in Rajasthan the limit has been kept unchanged at 50 km.

Ministry seeks feedback on disability policy

The Social Justice and Empowerment Ministry has invited public feedback till July 9 on the new draft national policy on persons with disabilities (PwD), which proposes interventions in disability prevention, education, healthcare, social security and accessibility.

The draft said the current

national programme on prevention of disabilities run by the Health Ministry focused on "traditional causes", but there were other causes of disability, such as malnourishment, medical negligence, socio-cultural factors and impairment caused by disasters.

The Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016, also expanded the number

of disabilities from seven to 21.

The policy said the States and Union Territories should add a provision on compliance with the RPDA Act when granting permission or recognition to educational institutions. A module on disability should be included in MBBS and other medical courses, it said.

To make vehicles more ac-

cessible, the policy said: "The Ministry of Road Transport and Highways will issue necessary guidelines for making modification in the personal vehicles being used by persons with disabilities as per requirement."

Presidential poll: Nadda, Rajnath to reach out to allies, Opposition

They will hold talks with NDA partners, UPA constituents, Independent MPs

The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) on Sunday said it had authorised party president J.P. Nadda and Defence Minister Rajnath Singh to hold consultations with NDA partners, UPA constituents and Independent MPs with regard to the presidential election scheduled for July 18.

BJP general secretary Arun Singh put out a statement on this effect on Sunday afternoon, adding that the two leaders will be starting the process of consultation very soon.

This comes not just after the Election Commission's announcement of the schedule for the presidential election, but also with West Bengal Chief Minister and

Trinamool Congress chief Mamata Banerjee writing to leaders of political parties and Chief Ministers for an Opposition meeting at the Constitution Club in New Delhi on June 15, with a view to settling on a common nominee from the Opposition stable. Congress president Sonia Gandhi too had

reached out to NCP leader Sharad Pawar for the same.

While the numbers are in favour of the NDA, despite the alliance being in power in fewer States than before, the consultation process in both camps is for larger acceptance of their candidates.

A committee to consult other parties had been set

up even in 2017, when President Ram Nath Kovind was elected to the post. At that time, party president Amit Shah had authorised current Vice-President of India, M. Venkaiah Naidu (he was Minister for Urban Development then), then Home Minister Rajnath Singh and the late Arun Jaitley (then Finance Minister) to consult various parties.

The BJP is anxious about not just its allies like the Janata Dal(U) but also fence-sitting parties such as the Biju Janata Dal (which had supported Mr. Kovind for President, but not Mr. Naidu as Vice-President) and the YSRCP. Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan met Bihar Chief Minister and JD(U) chief Nitish Kumar on the issue in May.

Trinamool MP speaks to senior Congress leaders

Mamata's party keen on fielding senior leader for President

A day after West Bengal Chief Minister and Trinamool Congress chief Mamata Banerjee invited Opposition leaders to attend a meeting in Delhi on June 15 for the upcoming presidential election, Trinamool leader in the Rajya Sabha Derek O'Brien on Sunday reached out to Leader of the Opposition Mallikarjun Kharge and Congress general secretary K.C. Venugopal.

Though the details of the discussion are not known, the Trinamool Congress is said to be keen on putting up a senior leader as the Opposition's presidential candidate.

Mr. Kharge has been appointed as the key points person by Congress president Sonia Gandhi to coordi-

nate with Opposition leaders to decide on a common candidate.

Letter to leaders

However, Ms. Banerjee wrote a letter to her counterparts in Maharashtra, Uddhav Thackeray and M.K. Stalin in Tamil Nadu. She had also written letters to other top Opposition leaders like NCP chief Sharad Pawar.

This prompted Congress communications chief Randeep Surjewala to issue a statement late on Friday to assert that Ms. Gandhi had already spoken to Opposition leaders, including Ms. Banerjee.

"The Congress party is of the opinion that the nation needs a person as the President who can protect the Constitution of our country, our institutions and citizenry from the ongoing onslaught by the ruling party. This is the need of the hour. While the Congress party has not suggested a particular name for the President, we owe it to our people to elect a President, who can apply a healing touch to its fractured social fabric and defend our Constitution," Mr. Surjewala had said in the statement.

Bishnoi blames Congress for selective action

A day before former Congress president Rahul Gandhi appears before the Enforcement Directorate (ED) in a money laundering case, the Congress on Sunday held press conferences in multiple cities to allege political vendetta by the BJP.

On Monday, senior leaders, including the Chief Ministers of Congress-ruled States, are expected to march to the ED office when Mr. Gandhi appears to record his statement in the National Herald case. The State units will also do *satyagraha* in front of the ED offices in their respective States.

The case to investigate alleged financial irregularities in the Congress-promoted Young Indian Private Ltd. that owns National Herald under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) was registered about nine months ago.

"I speak as a Congress member and an advocate. The ED's summons to Mr. Rahul Gandhi under PMLA is baseless," former Finance Minister P. Chidambaram told the news agency PTL.

Mr. Chidambaram said the offence of money laundering required "money" and "laundering of money" whereas in the *National Herald* case, there was debt-to-equity conversion, something which lending banks do on a regular basis.

"It is like accusing a person of 'purse snatching' when there was no purse and no snatching," he argued.

Chhattisgarh Chief Minister Bhupesh Baghel, who will participate in the march to the ED office, told reporters in Raipur that the *National Herald* case was being used to harass the Gandhi family. "The Central government wants to misuse the ED, CBI, Income Tax department to silence the Opposition. We will oppose this," Mr. Baghel said.

Addressing a press conference in Lucknow, senior leader Sachin Pilot questioned why the Central probe agencies have never ever investigated any BJP leader.

Other senior leaders such Pawan Khera in Ahmedabad, Vivek Tankha in Raipur, Sanjay Nirupam in Shimla addressed a press conference.

Sonia Gandhi hospitalised for post-COVID issues

She tested positive on June 2

Congress president Sonia Gandhi has been hospitalised because of COVID-related issues but is stable, the party said on Sunday.

"Congress president, Smt. Sonia Gandhi was admitted to Ganga Ram Hospital today owing to COVID-related issues. She is stable and will be kept at the hospital for observation. We thank all the Congress men & women as also all well-wishers for their concern and good wishes," party's communication chief Randeep Surjewala tweeted.

ED summons

Sources indicated that the Congress chief had visited the hospital for a post-COVID check-up.

Ms. Gandhi, 75, had tested positive for COVID-19 on June 2 and could not appear before the Enforcement Directorate (ED) to record her statement in the *National Herald* case.

Following Ms. Gandhi's

request for more time, the agency asked her to appear on June 23. Both Ms. Gandhi and her son, Rahul Gandhi, have been summoned to record their statements under criminal provisions of the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA).

The case to investigate financial irregularities under the PMLA was registered about nine months ago after a trial court took cognisance of an Income Tax Department probe that was carried out on the basis of a private criminal complaint filed by former BJP MP Subramanian Swamy in 2013.

Patidars stage protest against stadium renaming

Issues raised during 2015 agitation remain relevant, they say

The Patidar trouble for the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) in Gujarat is far from over. On Sunday, the leaders of the Patidar Anamat Aandolan Samiti (PAAS) were detained while they were protesting against the renaming of the Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel Stadium as Narendra Modi Stadium.

This is just one among the multiple issues festering between the BJP and the Patidar community, which includes the BJP's stand on the differences among the Swaminarayan sects, the party's difficulty in placating community leader Naresh Patel and the overall crisis facing agriculture and the micro, small and medium enterprises (MSME) sectors controlled by members of this community.

"This agitation will go for long. Changing the name of Patel is like denigrating the

history of Indian freedom struggle. The government can name any other stadium in the name of the Prime Minister," said Dharmik Malviya, the convenor of PAAS.

Economic issues

Talking to *The Hindu*, Mr. Malviya said the issues the Patidars raised during the reservation agitation in 2015 still remained relevant. "In fact, the condition of the people in the community has become worse. The use of synthetic diamond and the issues in Russia have impacted the diamond business. The price of raw materials has increased four to five fold," he said.

Traditionally a farming community, the Patidars cultivated cash crops such as cotton, groundnut, tobacco, chickpea and sugarcane and invested the surplus they earned in small and medium industries. "The price of cotton is not enough. The input

cost has increased. Government offered to procure chickpea and groundnut from the farms but put limitations for procurement. So farmers had to approach private traders. The system is not functioning properly," Mr. Malviya said.

Hardik's entry

However, the BJP is trying to douse the anger in its own ways. Hardik Patel joining the BJP will have an impact against the critical voice given by Patidar leader Naresh Patel.

But even within the BJP, there is confusion whether Mr. Hardik's entry will benefit the party or not.

"He has been criticising the RSS and BJP leaders all through the agitation and after joining the BJP, I don't know if his entry will bring any benefit. But we can use him to counter Naresh Patel," said a top Sangh Parivar functionary.

BJP sweeps Assam tribal council polls

The Bharatiya Janata Party on Sunday swept the elections to the Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council (KAAC), winning all 26 seats.

The Congress drew a blank with some of its candidates finishing third behind Independents.

The KAAC is made up of 30 members, four of whom are nominated. The elections to the 26 seats were held on June 8. The BJP credited its "historic" performance to its "people-friendly" approach. "The Congress not only scored zero but failed to put up a contest. We won by a bigger margin of votes in most seats compared to the last time," BJP leader and Minister Dijuah Hazarika told presspersons.

Development of villages a priority, says Shah

With 1,803 new cases, surge on in Mumbai

Delhi reports 735 new infections and three deaths

Maharashtra on Sunday continued to report a steep surge in COVID-19 cases, recording 2,946 new infections. The number of active cases rose to 16,370. The State's case positivity rate rose to 9.73%.

The highest number of cases continued to be reported in Mumbai city, which saw a big case surge of 1,803, taking its total active cases to 10,889.

Delhi reported 735 new cases and three deaths, while the positivity rate increased to 4.35%, according to data shared by the city's Health Department. This is the third consecutive day that Delhi has recorded more than 600 cases and a positivity rate of more than 3%. The capital had on Saturday reported 795 COVID-19 cases with a positivity rate of 4.11% and zero daily deaths.

Earlier, Union Health Ministry data said India logged 8,582 new infections in the 24 hours to 8 a.m. on Sunday. The active cases increased to 44,513, an increase of 4,143 cases. The

daily positivity rate was 2.71% and the weekly positivity rate 2.02%, the Ministry said.

Two fatalities in Maharashtra took its total death toll since the eruption of the pandemic in March 2020 to 1,47,870. The State has been recording an average 2,500 new cases daily during the past week – its highest surge in more than six months. However, authorities said there was no cause for panic as most cases were akin to mild instances of influenza and were recovering within three or four days. A total of 1,432 patients were discharged.

After Mumbai city, parts of the Mumbai Metropolitan

Region (MMR) such as Thane and Navi Mumbai reported spikes of more than 280 and 240 cases, respectively.

While Pune district reported more than 150 new cases, the rest of western Maharashtra including districts such as Satara, Sangli, Kolhapur and Solapur remained largely unaffected by the fresh surge as did the Marathwada region.

West Bengal reported 123 fresh COVID-19 cases, a State health department bulletin said. The daily positivity rate was 1.6% as the 123 cases were detected out of 7,695 samples tested on the day. The State recorded 139 cases on Saturday.

After protest, gig workers find work drying up

They say they are facing 'targeted' action with their accounts 'shadow-blocked' or deactivated

Women working with Urban Company (UC) who led a weeks-long protest against the firm last year, now say they are facing "targeted" action by either having their accounts "shadow-blocked" or deactivated. This has led to work drying up for them over the past two or three months.

Last December, UC's subscription policy (Flexi scheme) asking service providers to pay a fee for job leads through their app had backfired, leading to over 300 women beauticians and salon service providers launching a sit-in at its Gurugram office.

The company offers a platform connecting service professionals (repair technicians, cleaning and other household service providers) to customers – much like an app-based cab service connects drivers to passengers. And like the ride-hailing apps, UC too refuses to recognise its service professionals as employees.

Reacting to the protests, UC sued the workers in a civil court to stop their agitation.

The Gurugram court

found the company's filings "devoid of merits", following which UC withdrew the suit on March 29 this year. But this has not stopped the company from acting against those who protested last year and anyone who continued their association with the women who led the protests, service partners allege.

"March 12 was when I got my last job from the app. Since then, nothing," Seema*, 35, said, adding that she had raised a complaint about this issue at least nine times on the app since then – the last one on May 17. Each of these complaints was marked "resolved"

within a day, but she got no new jobs.

When she repeatedly asked the company to tell why her account was blocked, "they would say I had poor performance". Seema's latest rating on the app was at 4.6 out of 5 and she had this year received a Silver Plus certificate of achievement from UC signed by Chief Executive Officer and co-founder Abhiraj Bhal himself.

Seema said that after the

jobs stopped, she was called for a meeting at the UC office on March 16. "I met my category manager who said I had been blocked for attending the protest last year," she said.

"I told them I was there only for one night. I pleaded with them but they said you are admitting to protesting, we can't do anything more," Seema said.

Court notice

Now, Seema has decided to take the company to court and has served a legal notice on it over her "effective termination".

In her legal notice, Seema has named two UC officials who told her that she was blocked from getting jobs

working with UC workers, said such "targeted action" was being taken against anyone who had been part of the protests last year.

The company had initially named four of the protesting women along with several "unnamed" women in its suit, seeking an injunction to stop the strike outside the office.

The Gurugram court had granted the company's plea and restrained the women from protesting. However, UC then went on to name 10 more women in an annexure, with an application to sue all protesting workers (including the unnamed ones), through the 14 women it had named, in a representative capacity.

Civil Judge (Junior Division) Harsh Kumar Singh found this plea "devoid of merits", noting that "it was incumbent upon the plaintiff to submit/annex the list of all the defendants against whom the suit had been preferred in the representative capacity but it is not so in the appearing circumstances".

Urban Company has not yet responded to multiple requests for a comment.

Mumbai's POCSO circular on hold

It's sending wrong message: police chief

Mumbai Police Commissioner Sanjay Pandey on Saturday held the circular that mandated permission from a Deputy Commissioner of Police before registering a first information report (FIR) in a Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act case in abeyance.

Mr. Pandey told a group of child and women rights activists and lawyers who were aggrieved by the circular issued on June 9 that he has friends who have known cases where children are being misused to settle property disputes. He gave examples of how two brothers were stuck in a property disagreement and there were POCSO cases on both of them by either side.

Talking about the circular that mentioned, "cases of molestation or sexual crimes involving minors should be registered only after recommendation from an officer of the rank of Assistant Commissioner (ACP) and permission from a DCP", he said, the circular is sending a wrong message and that a timeline needs to be added to it.

"I am saying the nod will take about three to four hours, it can be done through a phone call or even a WhatsApp message. If it goes beyond half a day, officers will be held up," he said.

He was attending a virtual meeting organised by Majlis, a non-governmental organisation working to protect and promote rights of women and children. Mr. Pandey said, "I am ready to appoint you (activists and lawyers) as special officers who will take full responsibility in such (POCSO Act) cases and direct the police officers to take the complaint. I assure you that it will be binding on the police." He said he would like to take it up in the 18 days to his retirement.

Agencies issue alert on smuggling of essentials to SL

'People in the neighbouring country are panicked by worsening economic crisis'

Intelligence agencies have issued an alert to the security forces in Tamil Nadu on the possibility of smuggling of essentials to Sri Lanka by sea and "intrusion of immigrants" as the country is bracing for a severe economic crisis. Referring to the Sri Lankan Prime Minister's statement in Parliament on

June 7 that it would be tough to obtain fuel/gas in the next three weeks and his appeal to people to restrict travel, the alert said people were panicked by the worsening economic crisis and the shortage of essentials.

While the rich had started hoarding, many were left with no stocks and unable to afford the increased prices of whatever was left in the

market, the alert said.

While a majority of the Sri Lankan Tamils were in dire straits, the condition of Tamil workers in tea plantations was worse.

Even the assistance extended by the Sri Lankan Tamil diaspora was unable to reach these remotely located people. This could result in starvation deaths, the alert said. About 90 Sri Lankan

Tamils who tried to illegally migrate to a foreign country were apprehended by that country's navy last week, the advisory said.

The alert called for enhanced vigil along the coast as not only Sri Lankan Tamils and Muslims but also other "extremist elements" might attempt to cross over to India by entering Tamil Nadu by sea.

Essence of simplicity

A great thinker and philosopher, Tiruvalluvar's concept of God is not related to any religious conviction or creed. In fact, a search for the meaning of God in the Tirukkural is likely to lead each eager reader to draw his own conclusion from whatever has been said on this issue by the poet, pointed out Sri Nallur Sa Saravanan in a discourse.

The first set of ten verses are dedicated to God, herein His incomparable and infinite nature are aptly indicated in the term 'en gunathan.' Many explain 'en guna' as the eight basic gunas or attributes of God spoken of in the agama sastra. Or it is explained on the basis of the broad classification of human nature into the three categories, satva, rajasa, and tamasa. But, considering the antiquity of the text, the ideal approach should factor the social and linguistic context of the author's time and era. Since this text lays emphasis on virtuous and righteous living, the author discusses 'gunam,' virtue, pambu, values, 'anbu,' love, 'ozhukkam,' righteousness, and such allied topics in depth.

In these instances, the term 'en' is used to convey the sense of simplicity, modesty, humility, and so on. On this basis, 'gunam' can be understood as that which is manifest as action guided by one's inherent knowledge of right and wrong. We know from experience that wrong behaviour and mistakes will only bring sorrow in one's life. Traditional values such as respect to elders, are found in various sections of the text. Whatever may be one's state in life, his vocation, family background, scholarship, and so on, it is modesty and simplicity that add excellence to a human being. The poet shows that the nature or dharma of the Supreme God is His infinite noble values, especially simplicity, a virtue that becomes evident as His accessibility and compassion.

Q. My wife and I both are 31 years old and currently working as teachers with the State government with a salary of ₹50,000 each in hand. My question is that as my NSCs will be maturing from this year, should I invest all maturity amount in ELSS funds or would you prescribe any other avenue? Our main goal is to accumulate a fund for our daughter's higher education. She is currently a year old. We also want to purchase a house in about 7 to 10 years' time.

A. You already have the building blocks of a good investment plan in place, with an emergency fund, life and health insurance policies, tax saving investments and both debt and equity investments. You also seem to have clearly mapped your goals in the form of your daughter's education and your home purchase. However, we do have a few suggestions on your plan.

Try to build up a slightly larger emergency fund equal to 6 months' expenses, as 3-4 months' expenses may be inadequate. Do keep this invested in bank FDs that can be broken quickly so that you can get access to immediate cash in case of need.

Ensure that your life insurance cover rises with your income levels. Its main purpose is to shield your family from a financial emergency in case of an unfortunate event happening to you or your wife. Increase your health insurance cover too as you both age.

In any good financial plan, it is good to start with definite goals and also work to a predetermined asset allocation. Asset allocation is essentially the process of dividing your investments between safe and risky vehicles so that if the risky vehicle fails you at a crucial time or is volatile, the part of your portfolio that is in safe investments will still keep your capital protected. Therefore, we would not suggest investing all your money in equity mutual funds or share markets, because they are currently giving better returns than NSC. In a year where the stock market crashes or is volatile, you can lose your principal value in shares or equity funds. But your NSC will keep your investments safe and continue to provide steady returns.

For your daughter's education goal which is more than 15 years away, you can explore a 70-30 allocation between equity funds and debt instruments. First, use a child's education calculator available on many websites, to estimate how much money you would need by the time your daughter turns 17 or 18, to fund her college education, after adjusting for inflation. For instance, if you think her higher education would cost ₹15 lakh at today's prices, this would amount to about ₹47 lakh, 17 years later at 7% annual inflation. An investment of about ₹10,200 per month earning a return of 9% per annum, can take you to that goal in 17 years' time. Now you can choose to invest about ₹7,100 a month in equity funds and about ₹3,100 in debt options. Instead of direct investments in shares we suggest you invest in index funds such as a Nifty100 Index fund for the equity portion. For the debt portion you can use PPF, NSC and short term debt mutual funds that invest in high quality bonds.

For your home purchase goal, which you plan in 7-10 years' time, you can adopt a more conservative allocation of 50-50 in equity and debt. Online calculators can help you arrive at the inflation adjusted value of your down payment.

Besides these you should also be saving towards other goals such as your retirement, where you should opt for a balanced asset allocation.

Q. I am a government servant and have an NPS tier 1 account as per government norms. What are your comments on opening a tier 2 account? Is it a safer option when compared with other investments options like mutual funds, FDs or post office RDs?

A. The main difference between NPS tier 1 and tier 2 accounts is that while the tier 1 account is a mandatory account for your retirement savings, tier 2 is wholly voluntary. Tier 1 account investments are also eligible for section 80C benefits while the tier 2 account offers no tax breaks. However, the withdrawal restrictions that apply to the tier 1 account don't apply to the tier 2 account. You can invest and withdraw at any time of your choice like with mutual funds. Your investments in NPS tier 2 go into market instruments of your choice like equity shares, corporate bonds and government securities. So, unlike your FD or post office schemes, your investment will be subject to market risks. There is no capital protection and both your returns and principal value can fluctuate over the years. You should consider NPS tier 2 if you are comfortable with volatile returns in the short run to invest towards long-term goals that are 10 plus years away.

Add spice to your portfolio

Consider sector and thematic equity funds that could give your returns a leg up, but don't ignore the risks

What can add a dash of spice to your mutual fund portfolio? A call on a fund that can soar well above your other funds, giving you returns a good leg up? Of course.

Sector and thematic equity funds fit this bill. IT funds, for example, returned in excess of 100% between 2020 and 2021!

But as tempting as returns may be, sector and thematic funds need to be used carefully in your portfolio. That's because while their return potential is high, so is their risk. The tenets you may use for other equity funds don't apply here either. Here's more.

Know the difference

Sector and thematic funds form a category under equity funds. This is a very big umbrella that houses a great variety of funds. Therefore, the first step in using these funds is to understand what type they are, helps grasp the nature of risk you will be taking.

The riskiest type of fund within this category is pure sector funds, or funds that focus on a single sector. This could be financial services, IT, or pharmaceuticals, for example. Next come thematic funds, which are broader in scope than sector funds. Thematic funds are built to fit a particular theme such as consump-

tion, manufacturing, infrastructure and so on.

Themes comprise multiple sectors. Consumption, for example, can range from FMCG to retailers to durables to paints and so on. The final type of fund is one that is akin to normal diversified equity funds.

These are funds where the theme is extremely general, allowing them to cover a wide variety of sectors. Examples here include ESG, opportunities, or business cycles.

Where's the risk?

Sector and thematic funds are the highest risk in equity funds and choosing them is also equally tricky. This is where your approach to the funds will differ from normal equity funds. One, sectors and themes fall in and out

of market favour. Getting into the sector at the right time is essential to allow you to gain those top-rung returns. It doesn't stop there. You also need to exit the sector at the right time to pocket those gains.

Once a sector is no longer fancied, returns can collapse. In other equity funds, you don't have to worry about sector movement and timing your investments as the fund itself will rotate allocations based on potential.

Two, a buy-and-hold long-term strategy does not work with sector or thematic funds. Once a theme moves out of market favour and returns decline, it is not necessary

that markets pick it up again. Returns may come back in another market cycle or may not come in at all. Simply holding on to the fund for years on end will not help you recoup lost ground. This is unlike other equity funds where holding through a performance slump can pay off if the fund course-corrects.

Three, picking sector funds is tough. Folks tend to be attracted by high returns in a sector fund and then invest in it. On the contrary, that's when the sector has already

delivered much of its return and may have very little potential left! Entering sectors and themes is better done when returns

are down, which allows you to ride the theme well.

And this calls for a firm understanding of markets, sectors, and trends. Choosing the wrong themes or sectors can weigh returns down instead of spicing them up.

How to use

For all these reasons, sector or themed funds need to be used carefully. So, first answer the question as to whether you need sector funds at all, no matter how attractive the returns may be!

While a theme or sector may do very well, in some market cycles, you can earn strong returns even through small-cap or mid-cap funds. If your portfolio is already well-diversi-

fied and you do not have market knowledge or advisers to identify the right sector at the right time, skip sector funds.

Also forgo these funds if your portfolio size is smaller. The usual mix of funds spanning market cap segments and investment styles provide sufficient diversification and return potential. More, wrong sector calls can hurt much more when your portfolio is smaller.

Otherwise, there are two ways to include thematic or sector funds. One is to simply improve portfolio diversification.

Here, look for broad thematic funds that pick stocks in a manner that your other funds may not – such as ESG, or opportunities, or MNC. Such an approach may

suit moderate risk investors or those

who don't have in-depth market knowledge.

The other is to focus on specific sectors and narrower themes in order to cash in on outsized returns. This calls for a very hands-on approach, where you will need to churn the sector funds based on opportunities.

Since this involves very high risk, it is best that the rest of your portfolio is in more moderate risk funds. You also need to be a seasoned investor in order to adopt this approach.

In general, though, don't go overboard on sector funds. The bulk of your portfolio should be towards diversified equity and debt funds. Measured allocations to sector funds will both help boost returns and keep a lid on risks.

When you pick funds, don't chase only those with high recent 1-year returns, but consider the full list of funds. This is why knowing which theme can find market favour is important! Look at fund portfolios to know their approach to the sector and which help you understand if it's well-placed to ride the theme.

A long track record is not an essential, but where you do have fund history, use it to know how the fund delivered during an upswing and how it manages over time.

POLICY JARGON

'Comprehensive' policy, an oxymoron in insurance parlance?

Technical terms in insurance often say one thing, but mean something different

Nothing is as good as its sounds, and nothing is as bad as it sounds either, say the wise ones. In many instances, this holds good for insurance as well, with this financial product being particularly opaque and misunderstood.

The product is basically a legal contract promising an intangible benefit at a future date should a specified event take place. So, the layer upon layer of puzzlement induced by it is only to be expected.

Fine print

It is often said in the context of insurance, that the big print giveth and the small print taketh away. Let us look at some of the big and small print that is somewhat misleading and confounding. Here is a term that sounds bad in insurance, but isn't.

While risk is bad, in insurance the word refers to

something that is covered. So that is good, right?

A life policy covers the risk of dying too soon, a pension policy covers the risk of living too long. Fire policies cover fire and allied perils, while hospitalisation policies cover the costs of hospitalisation. Since insurance presents the solution to managing risk, it has a positive connotation.

'All-risk' policy

Here is a related term that sounds good, but doesn't add up in practice.

The all-risk policy, typically covering construction and also fire and allied perils for large industrial projects, has a misleading name. Its breadth of cover is that it includes those risks not specifically excluded in the contract and, by that logic, standard exclusions like 'act of god' (an unforeseen catastrophe like flood, earthquake or

storm which can't be prevented or controlled by human beings), war or nuclear explosion are not part of the coverage and so, no, it does not cover everything under the sun, which is what we wish all insurance policies would do!

Communication is everything, as is presenta-

tion, and insurers have been trying to replace this term that puts the coverage in context. Alternative terms being used include multiple peril (meaning not all) and multiple physical risks (meaning not liability).

Easier said than done, because when it comes to a legal conflict, it is the la-

wyers and judges who have to be convinced.

Comprehensive policy

No. This one doesn't cover everything under the sun either! Take your motor comprehensive policy. It means it's a combination of the statutory third-party liability cover and the optional own damage cov-

er. While the former is a complete cover as required by the Motor Vehicles Act, 1988, the latter covers damage or loss of your car due to fire, floods and related perils, and also theft.

The bottom line is, if you do prefer a claim, will you get the full value of the damaged vehicle or damaged parts? Shouldn't that be the meaning of comprehensive? No. Depreciation will apply and cost of rubber parts are not partly or fully covered. The silver lining is that you can cover these by paying additional premium, but obviously not after, an accident.

'Not comprehensive'

Many policies have a compulsory deductible, a flat sum or percentage of each claim that you should pay out of your pocket. Decidedly not comprehensive!

Check your motor policy and you will find the sum insured is called In-

sured Declared Value (DV). In other words, the value for which your vehicle is insured is agreed upon at the time of insurance.

It may indicate that the value was declared by you, the insured, but in reality, the insurance company tells you the value of the model and make of your vehicle from a depreciation chart it has.

Even then, at the time of a claim, further depreciation for that year or part of the year will be applied and you will rarely get the full insured value of the whole car in case of a total loss or damaged parts in case of damage.

So, the IDV is only the maximum value payable and depreciation goes on ticking, somewhat like the writing hand that keeps moving on.

India wilts under the Klaasen blitz on a tricky wicket

The South African, in the company of Bavuma, resurrects the innings from a precarious 29 for three before launching into the host attack

Wicketkeeper-batter Heinrich Klaasen excelled on a tricky pitch in humid conditions to make his career-best score and take South Africa to a four-wicket victory in the second T20I against India at the Barabati Stadium on Sunday.

Klaasen, who replaced the injured Quinton de Kock, hammered a 46-ball 81 with seven fours and five mighty sixes as South Africa recovered from 29 for three to chase down 149 with 10 balls to spare and take a 2-0 lead in the series.

Tight spot

After restricting India to 148 for six, South Africa found itself in a tight spot.

Bhuvneshwar Kumar mixed his superb skills with immaculate precision to bowl three of the first six overs and claimed three top-order wickets to leave the visitors in big trouble in the PowerPlay.

The experienced Bhuvneshwar moved the ball both

ways and bowled Reeza Hendricks with an incoming delivery in the first over.

His slower delivery forced pinch-hitter Dwaine Pretorius to mistime a skier to deep mid-wicket in his second over. Bhuvneshwar then changed ends to breach Rassie van der Dussen's defence in his third over.

South Africa skipper Temba Bavuma (35, 30b, 4x4, 1x6) took some calculated risks to break the shackles.

Klaasen, known for tormenting India in the past, relied on his clean-hitting and smart shot selection to revive the innings with Bavuma. He punished Hardik Pandya and Axar Patel as 13 runs came in the 11th over and 19 in the 12th.

Yuzvendra Chahal broke the 64-run stand when Bavuma failed to connect a pull shot. However, the well-built Klaasen continued to unleash his strokes and took his team close to the target before holing out off Harshal Patel.

Earlier, the South African bowlers adapted to the conditions well and executed their plan to perfection.

IPL media rights: BCCI assured of a revenue over ₹43,000 crore

The Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) is set to be richer than at least ₹43,050 crore through media rights for the Indian Premier League's (IPL) media rights for the next five editions.

At the end of the first day's proceedings of the IPL media rights e-auction, the last bid for TV and digital rights package for India stood at ₹57 crore and ₹48 crore per game, respectively. With the next IPL rights cycle set to feature 410 games, the assured revenue has already crossed ₹43,000-crore.

The two categories will

continue for another round on Monday. Once each of the two categories has a winner, the TV rights for rest of the world and non-exclusive digital rights will be bid for.

While the BCCI will not issue a formal statement until all the proceedings conclude, multiple sources confirmed *The Hindu* that the "four major major" players continued to persist with loosening their purses during the seven-hour proceedings on day one. The major contenders are Disney, Viacom 18, Zee and Sony Group.

For the five-year cycle between 2018 and 2022, each IPL game fetched the BCCI ₹54.5 per game.

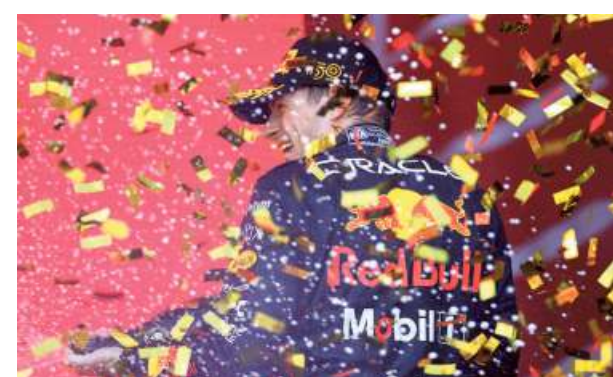

Head Coach Igor Stimac stated, "We were Blue Tigers in the match against Afghanistan, and that's what they need to be on the pitch. That's our intent, keeping the pride intact."

Abdul Sahal, who scored the winner late in the second-half, sounded ecstatic.
"The victory was earned in front of the fans, and hence, it tastes sweeter. I had to back myself, and placed it beyond the goalkeeper. And even before I could realise, the entire team was there to celebrate," he said.
